

How many Friday nites have we closed our dances with the song "Happy Trails To You" as we clutched our dance partner's hand and took a moment to review the evening and how much fun it is to get out on the floor and do Tumbleweed, Slappin' Leather, Bonanza, the Waltz, Swing, Two-Step, and the "Texas Freeze" to the c/w national anthem "ELVIRA". Yep, we all agree that c/w dancin' is our love, and why didn't we do this ten years ago. Where were we ten years ago and what were we doing? Some of us can remember and some can't, but as we were all caught up in our own private activities, a single solitary person was preparing the ground work for the future which, unknown to us at the time, would affect each of our lives. His name . . . C. W. PARKER! C. W. had his own dream of reviving the dances which plain folks did in their parlors on Sunday afternoons while ending a week of hard work on the farm, factory, or saw mill. He visualized how these dances in its simplest form could be put to music and show the cultural link of our heritage, bound together, and be called "good ol' country dancin'." This he set out to do and many obstacles beset him in achieving this goal. Along the way he made many friends with his quiet, congenial and almost shy personality. Slowly he convinced people that this style of dancing was "AMERICA" and should be spread far and wide. This road or trail I keep mentioning finally brought him to Fremont, California where C. W. started to contact local folks as to "what's going on?" . . "where's the country or western (cowboy) people dancing at?"

At the time, a few honky tonk's were the only places a guy could go to dance "country," but these places weren't a great place for a "lady." C. W. realized this and began looking for a club or rec. hall to hold dances and teach the many c/w dances he was gifted with. Again, more obstacles; no one would give, or rent at a low rate, a place to dance, but this did not stop C. W. About this time C. W. became acquainted with RICK and JOAN BOWEN, JERRY and ROBERTA FOGEL, BOB HUBBARD, and more pioneers of c/w dancing (I appologize for not naming them all). These people have told me of the small hall's, studios, or postage stamp sized bar room dance floors which were used by C. W. and friends to teach country dancing. Slowly small classes were taught and graduated up to intermediate level and these people went out and spread the word of the presence of C. W. PARKER.

In Livermore, NORA WILT was valiantly keeping her classes going with sometimes only a few students. In San Jose, others were beginning to teach a standard type of country dancing which C. W. convinced them to do. The days of free lance honky tonk dancing were numbered; C. W. had seen to that! Stories passed on to me by people who were with C. W. in the early 1980's are about long drives in a crammed Chevie coupe holding three couples, including C. W., headed for Salinas to put on a c/w dance exhibition at some club. Upon arriving came the disappointment of not being expected that night, or NO band, but "go ahead and dance to the juke box!"

Time after time, C. W. told people don't give up, people will soon be won over. Then came the "BIG" dance given at the RENDEVOUZ on Mowry Road, complete with live music, lessons, and

hopefully large turnout due to C. W.'s advertisements. Well, about thirty people showed up, and the event was a financial catastrophe; again, this did not stop C. W.

Fate has it's own way of presenting itself when it's damn good and ready, and this occurred one day as C. W. PARKER stood in front of ANDY ANDERSON at Swiss Park in 1983 . . . "Sir, I represent the best group of dancers in America who desperately need a place to meet, hold lessons and dances!" As told to me by ANDY and I quote . . . "Something about this guy told me he was sincere and I agreed to let him use the club and to this day I do not regret doing so!"

So it began, lessons every Monday night which soon expanded to Wednesdays with dances every other Friday nite. Finally, c/w dancing had its first home in C. W. PARKER'S quest. About this time a fella named BOB HUBBARD was recovering from a severe back injury and had not worked for many months. C. W. PARKER approached this young man and asked if he was interested in being a "DJ" while convalescing. "Hey, man! I've never done that before, but I'll do it for you, C. W., just to help out." Together this duo has written two books and are known and respected far and wide by their peers.

BOB tells of one of his first dances as DJ that fifteen bucks was the net door receipts and how C. W. PARKER insisted that BOB take all of it for his efforts.

In 1984 the name Boots "N" Buckles was formed from C. W.'s Country Kickers group. RICK BOWEN was the first president under this banner, and C. W. was instrumental in setting the governing body and rules which we use today.

Other presidents followed (Neil Hale, Dave Coffman, and yours truly) and BNB kept growing, but always with the presence of C. W. PARKER. Monday and Wednesday nite lessons were at near capacity in 1985 and many new instructors were introduced who were groomed by C. W. What was happening and we just didn't realize it was that C. W. had worked for, and was now giving, for us to manage, a socially oriented c/w dance club which he unselfishly was slowly backing away from. He knew the time was nearing to head back home and start again in constructing his dream of standardization of country western dancing. C. W. is now president of NTA (National Teachers' Association) of c/w dance which he personally founded. Many more accomplishments are due to this man, but I'm unable to list them all.

Now, on March 28th we will lose him. His trail leads to the Midwest, and he will leave behind many fond memories and dance steps for us to be grateful for. Next Friday's dance when we hear the song "Happy Trails" let's inwardly thank C. W. PARKER for all he has done for us and wish him sincerely "HAPPY TRAILS TO YOU UNTIL WE MEET AGAIN!!"

The second annual North Bay Country Western Dance Invitational is now history, and for many of us who traveled to Santa Rosa over the March 20, 21, and 22 weekend were left with some fond memories and lasting impressions.

First of all, the facility was very good as far as location and provided immediate amenities such as meeting rooms for judges, separate dance classrooms and enough space to set up c/w vendors displaying the latest in western fashions. The two dance floors were a little small (but how do you plan for an unknown number of dancers?) so bottom line is an "A-" for the El Rancho Tropicana.

Organizing this event is the main topic of this article, so I'll start by sincerely congratulating MOE PADDEN for the great job she did in taking on an extremely difficult task to put together a c/w event for all to enjoy. Her committees' are to be commended for their unselfish committal to provide the help which MOE needed to put on a near "NATIONAL" class of dance invitational. So my choice for the garland of roses is MOE PADDEN whose tenacity carried her through the rough spots and procrastinations that a promoter encounters. If you have ever planned a large party for a hundred people, well, multiply that effort by twenty, to visualize the hard work and scheduling.

MOE! Wear your crown graciously for you have taken your event alongside all the other "BIGGIES" which promote c/w dancing. Again, I congratulate you . . . The Rose in Santa Rosa!

With every event no matter how well planned, are the people who take popshots at the promoter or try to link some trivial encounter to discredit the organization. These folks will always be there whispering negativisms, not realizing that the promoters of an event  $\underline{DO}$  want to hear constructive criticism. With this in mind, I want to go on record by pointing out one negative item which could hardly be blamed on the Santa Rosa Invitational Committee, but more on ourselves.

This item is DRUNKEDNESS! Most events have alcoholic beverages available for us to enjoy and nobody enjoys having a few like I do. Two small groups brought in their own liquor supply and proceeded to get "RIPPED" and turned the event "UGLY". This happened on Saturday night. MOE, I don't know if you were there around 10:00 p.m., but my guests and I left the dance, with me giving every excuse possible that all of country/western is not like this. Alot of good folks were appalled at the drunken display put on by the few who chose that route to impress. Floor etiquette was forgotten, and the dance floor became a dangerous place. I saw one lady limp off, kicked hard by an intoxicated dancer and not even an apology or an "oops" was extended.

How do you keep this situation in control? I can only offer one suggestion without entering my own personal feelings so here it is . . . don't allow the music (live or DJ) to throw fuel on the

fire by playing "hotter, faster, and louder tunes", but instruct them/him to slow it down, play more line dances which takes less floor movement and a more stable mind to participate in. This explosive situation was almost out of hand that nite, and sure doesn't help the c/w image. (End of sermon!)

On Sunday the place was packed to watch the finals and award ceremonies. The crowd was treated to some fine team competition, which I must mention the group from Clovis, CA called JIM'S PLACE who won 1st place and took about every other award given. CONGRATS - GREAT PERFORMANCE!

In the couples categories, the finals were well represented by NorCal COUNTRY dancers. Mentioning some . . . CHARLOTTE SKEETERS and NEIL HALE (Fremont); DEBBIE BOYER and ANGELO SEGRETTO (Gilroy); DEBBIE and GEORGE SHATTLE (San Jose). A young, talented couple from Smyrna, Georgia named TAMMY and EDDIE HARPER who were in California visiting THERESA and JOE TOWNSLEY of Fremont almost stole the show and became the crowd's sentimental favorite with their repertoire of precision moves. This fine pair received at least three standing ovations after their performances in the various categories.

The winners in each category were repeated with sometimes a slight change of order which points out the difficulty the judges had in determining the GRAND CHAMPIONS. MOE PADDEN saw to it that no mix up prevented the true champions from being crowned so she drafted the help of DAVE COFFMAN and his computerized scoring system which came up with the final standings. Master of Ceremonies MARLIN KENTOPP asked for silence and quickly received it as he announced . . . Grand Championship Overall . . . 5th Place, VERONICA TROUT and DAVE CONNER (San Jose); 4th Place, GLORIA CASEY and TERRY KRAUSE (Sacramento); 3rd Place, TAMMY and EDDIE HARPER (Smyrna, Georgia); 2nd Place, LORI HANCOCK and RON SLACK, JR. (Novato); and in 1st Place . . . Our 1987 Santa Rosa Invitational Grand Champions, LINDA ADAMS and RICH SMALL (San Jose/Concord). Yes, they did it again! LINDA and RICH were magnificent in all categories, placing 2nd in the Two-step; 1st in the Shuffle; 4th in the Swing; and 1st in their specialty, the This dancing pair has consistently been the frontrunners of c/w dance, and we feel fortunate to have them as members of the Boots "N" Buckles Dance Club!

Even though many contestants were representing at least eight States of the Union, the final results show that Northern California is the centerpiece of pure c/w dancing. I congratulate all winners, finalists, and participants who contributed to this great country weekend.

MOE! Let's do it again in '88! You certainly will have the backing of all the friends you made in the "City of Roses."


