I once worked at a company where the morale among the employees was low. The company executives were concerned because it was affecting the quality of the work, so they decided to take a poll of the workers to see what they (management) could do to improve morale. As it turned out, almost no one

offered suggestions, leaving management scratching their heads. One of my co-workers said "It's apathy that'll kill this company. But, who cares?"

I am concerned about apathy among the Boots 'n' Buckles membership. For example, we have been asking for months for volunteers to join the board of directors. I suggest that they come to the Monday - Wednesday lessons to learn some of the "older" dances, yet attendance during the week is way down. For example, at the very first open board meeting of the year (in January) exactly zero dancers (notice I'm not saying members, but dancers) came to the meeting to meet the year 2000 board. Without your participation in this quarterly event, the board doesn't know what's on your mind. We don't know what you want for lessons, dances, decorations, etc. It makes it very difficult on us to know why you are not coming to the Friday night dances, or what we could do to get you to come every Friday night.

Do I sound concerned? You bet I do. Your current board is made up of dedicated, hard-working, and concerned Boots 'n' Buckles members who wonder if we are doing what you want us to do. I'm asking you to come to the next open board meeting on Friday, April 14, at 7:30 PM at Swiss Park. This is your chance

Washing instructions

for Boots 'n' Buckles merchandise:

DO NOT IRON DIRECTLY ON THE IMAGE.

Turn the item inside out.

Liquid detergents are less harsh on the image. Use cool or warm water only.

Do not use bleach or hot water.

Tumble dry at low setting and remove promptly. After Washing, colors may fade slightly, particularly 100% cotton.

To restore colors to their original brightness, place a sheet of regular paper over the image and iron at Low Cotton setting.



Once again on March 17, Boots 'n' Buckles hosted guest instructors Carmel & Ernie Hutchinson. Ernie was unsure of what they would teach and decided to wait until after they went to Sonora to discover dances that would be appealing to the Bay Area crowd. "Cowboy Cumbia" was the choice.

When Carmel e-mailed me the decision. I was afraid it might be too hard for the Friday Night, Lay Back, TGIF group, but Carmel assured me it was "fairly" easy. Just one or two tricky parts, but guess what? No tags!! So yes, Cowboy

It's a 32-count dance and it is done to Country music - the reason we all started doing "Country Line Dancing". On Friday night Connie Silva reviewed the dance for those of us who needed a refresher (ME). Connie will be reviewing all the line dances we learn the week after the lesson is taught. We are doing this because often the dances we learn on Friday night are not always the one

that are taught at Swiss Park by Charlotte Skeeters on Monday and Wednesday. I don't know about you, but I need reinforcement - lots of it.

Speaking of Charlotte Skeeters, Charlotte taught a great dance last Monday called "Whirl-Y-Reel. The dance will remind you of "Mambo #5" because it is broken into sections with section "A" repeated throughout the dance. You also do section "B" a couple of times and then you do a "Bill-ish" at the end. Charlotte is calling the end "Bill-ish after the choreographer " Bill Bader". The dance is done to Afro-Celtic music and is really going to be a smash. I think I remembered two-thirds of it when normally one half is what I usually get.

Charlotte brought her cue signs for the walls to our Friday night dance and she will be reviewing the dance again on March 27th at Swiss Park. It will also be scheduled as a "Second Time " teach in April, so try not to miss it.

MOSCOW -- Anything I say in the space available here wouldn't begin to do justice to this large city, but I will try to give you a sense of what it is about. Moscow is as busy as any comparable city of ours with horrendous traffic all hours of the day. Commute hours are as bad as we are used to if not worse. The center of the city is taken up by Red Square and the Kremlin. Red Square is as large as you imagine, surfaced with cobble stones and bordered on three sides by the Cathedral of St. Basil the Blessed, Gum Department Store and The State History Museum. The fourth side is bordered by a wall of the Kremlin. Lenin's tomb sits in the center near the Kremlin wall and is still occupied by the old boy looking really waxy. Stalin's body has been removed in disgrace.

The Kremlin, more or less triangular shaped, is enclosed by enormous red brick walls that are absolutely awesome not only in their immense size but beauty. There are some 20 towers along the walls with three gates that I could see. Inside the Kremlin walls there are six beautiful churches along with the Poteshny Palace, the Grand Kremlin Palace, the Armory, the State Kremlin Palace, a building called the Arsenal , a Senate building and no doubt some other things. It rather surprised me that tourists are actually allowed inside the walls though you do get carefully scrutinized upon entering. The main attraction inside is the Armory and the Grand Palace. There is such apulence displayed there it baggles the imagination. If you think the British Crown Jewels are nice, Peter the Great's horse was better be jeweled. Diamonds, rubies, sapphires, jewels I don't even know the name of were all over their chairs, clothing, books, carriages, swords, horse saddles, ankle bracelets and bridles. Good grief!, unbelievable. The horse driven carriages that they rode in must have weighed tons with all the gold leaf applied to the hand carvings. If you think Disney invented Cinderella's ornate carriage, not so. They actually exist and were used by the Russian Imperial families and are still on display.

The subways of Moscow are quite remarkable. They are extremely deep under the city. Though the cars are rather rickety and noisy, they are quite efficient. The stations have been lavishly decorated with sculptures, paintings, all sorts of Russian art. Stalin was responsible for this declaring that the workers deserved to enjoy at least a few of the finer things.

The Russian guides are quite proud of the city and constantly point out their "Sky Scrapers". I don't think they have ever been to New York or Chicago or they wouldn't call them that as they look to be only about 50 stories high, if that. All the large apartment houses appear quite nice from a distance, but when you get close, they are all badly run down and in need of repair. Most are about 16 stories high and have no elevators. New ones are being built in great numbers however. There are some (at least two) very fine hotels in the city that appear to give high quality service but I am not entirely sure. The lobbies were very pretty and the food quite good even by western standards. Personal service for everyone, however, is a concept that is not completely understood by Russians.

A main attraction in Moscow is, of course, The Circus!! Breathtaking acts, ice skating bears and comedy in any language are done to perfection. The building is wonderfully engineered and is used only for the Circus. It is built in a circle as the name implies and has various stage floors that rotate in and out depending on the act to be performed. For me, this was a highlight of our stay there.

Shapping in Moscow was also an experience. There was an underground Mall though we didn't go there so I can't say what it was like. The walking mall was enjoyable and most everything was available to some extent. It was tempting to buy Russian art objects but we were warned that anything they considered to be an Icon would be confiscated at the airport. Their definition of an Icon was rather loose so you might loose almost anything pretty that you bought.

In contrast to the small airport at St. Petersburg, the Moscow Airport is moderately large and unbelievably busy and crowded. Long, long lines are everywhere and there is no word in Russian for expedite or hurry. By some miracle, our travel directors managed to get our luggage through customs without inspection, but getting us through was another matter. We waited in an endless line for what seemed like an eternity just to get our boarding passes; visas and passports were painstakingly examined. Then you had to get into another long line for immigration. They were very interested in how much money you were taking out of the country and compared it to what you declared upon entering. Visas and passports were again scrutinized and you were looked at in a very intimidating manner (or maybe I was paranoid).


