





more members were in attendance so that we could be assured of meeting the wishes of the majority. However, that didn't happen, so I feel that those who weren't there, have no right to express any opposition at this juncture.

The Boots 'n' Buckles Club membership is probably the largest of any dance club around and the attendance at the Friday night dances is always quite good. However, there seems to be no underlying club spirit. No overall club camaraderie. There are a few groups of individuals who express concern over this or that, but I believe that a club with a membership of this size should be more dynamic. I think that a club of this size should have a sizable dance team with much more visibility to its own members. I think that a club of this size should be planning and getting involved in more activities (as a club, not individuals) which promote more interest in country dancing. Not nacessarily in the competitive area.

These are some of my ideas; but in order to have a club of this type, people have to be interested in these things. Sometimes I wonder what the point of having a club at all is. If there were no club, just as many persons would surely show up on Friday night to dance. They could bring their kids; their kids could bring their friends and everyone could have a grand old time.




