A BIT ABOUT FILE SHARING

Members of the line dance community who are interested in shariang music and video files might find it worthwhile to investigate bitTorrent, a relatively new Internet-based technology that is becoming quite popular. Napster is ancient history. Kazaa was acquired by unscrupulous purveyor of sleazy spyware. bitTorrent is the newest new thing.

Widespread file sharing on the Internet started in about 1999 with the release of Napster. This program was free and used by millions of people, primarily to share MP3 files containing popular music. The MP3 file format allows for very high compression for digital audio recordings, so that a typical 3 minute song can be stored in a file as small as about 3 megabytes. During installation of Napster, the user would designate a folder on his computer to contain the MP3 files he wanted to share. When run, the program would read the directory of this folder and upload that information (file name, size and type) to a central database. The Napster client featured a search facility that allowed users to scan through the central database to locate files of interest shared by other users. For example, a search for the word 'Marley' would yield a long list of files on other computers, many of them MP3 files containing songs by Bob Marley. The user would select one of these files, which initiated a direct connection to another user's computer and the transfer of that file. While a user was downloading files to his computer, uploads would also take place as other users transferred files from the shared folder on his computer.

Napster was one of the first widely-used peer-to-peer (P2P) file sharing services, but it relied upon central servers for searches and the information needed to connect users to one another. Napster maintained the central servers, and was forced to shut them down in 2001 as a result of copyright infringement lawsuits brought by recording companies.

As Napster was shut down, other P2P file sharing services arose to fill the void, most of them decentralized to avoid the legal risks associated with maintaining a central server. Prominent among them was Kazaa and the FastTrack network. Kazaa was originally a free program that allowed its users to search for and share files with one another, using a series of decentralized supernodes to maintain indexes of files available on the FastTrack network. From the user's perspective, Kazaa worked in much the same way as Napster had worked. However, the Dutch company that owned Kazaa was also hit with copyright infringement suits, and sold the application to Sharman Networks of Australia. Sharman Networks has tried to cash in on the popularity of Kazaa by bundling a large number of truly obnoxious adware and spyware programs into the application. These programs include Cydoor, B3D, Altnet, GAIN, InstaFinder and others that record and collect your web surfing behavior, display popup advertisement on your computer screen, and redirect your browser to their own sites. They leach valuable CPU resources and bandwidth, run on your computer even after you exit from Kazaa, and cannot be removed by uninstalling

Kazaa. Current Kazaa victims might be interested in a free Kazaa removal application that is widely available on the Internet and appropriately called Kazaabegone.

A far better solution than Kazaa is Kazaa Lite Resurrection, a free application that allows its users to connect to the FastTrack network and share files with Kazaa users without installing any adware or spyware (get it at http://www.filesharingplace.com/downloads/kazaa_lite_resurrection.php.) Kazaa Lite Tools K++ is a more sophisticated application for the same purpose (available for free at http://www.klitetools.com/MM/index.htm). Both programs were developed independently from Sharman Networks.

Another P2P network widely used for file sharing is Gnutella, which operates in a manner generally similar to FastTrack. Clients that can be used to access this network include Bearshare, Limewire, and Frostwire. Bearshare is available at a cost of \$3.29 per month, and there is also a free version that features more limited functionality and commercial advertisements. Limewire offers a free version, which for a time was bundled with spyware, but now apparently contains only adware, and a Pro version without ads that sells for \$18.88. A better solution for accessing the Gnutella network might be Frostwire, a free and ad-free Limewire clone available at www.frostwire.com.

Over the past two years or so, a different method of file sharing called bitTorrent has become quite popular. To access this technology, you need a bitTorrent client program (one of the most popular clients is µTorrent, pronounced 'mirco-torrent' and available without charge at www.utorrent. Next, you need to locate and download a .torrent file, a small pointer file that describes the file to be shared and the Internet location of a 'tracker' program that manages its distribution. The tracker keeps a list of all users who have the file or want to acquire it, in effect creating a small, ad hoc network that is called a 'swarm'. Executing the .torrent file on your bitTorrent client will cause your client to contact the tracker server, which adds you to the swarm and connects you to other members of the swarm to initiate the downloading of the desired file. Files are transmitted in segments, usually about half a megabyte in size. Even as you are downloading all the segments needed to complete the file, other users in the swarm are uploading from your computer the segments you have already received. In this way the technology discourages 'leeching', the antisocial behavior of those who try to download files without offering uploads. It is also rather remarkable, because the more demand there is for a given file, the larger the swarm and the easier and faster it will be to acquire the file.

bitTorrent users must have a way to search for .torrent files that point to the files they wish to download, and a number of websites have sprung up to fill this need. On the following page is a list of sites that offer collections of .torrent files and/ or search engines to locate .torrent files. Happy hunting!

TREASURER'S REPORT

Boots 'n' Buckles closed the books for the year 2005 with no further adjustments to the preliminary financial statements for December shown in last month's Roundup.

Much of the tax work for 2005 has been completed. Our forms 1099 and 1096 (reporting miscellaneous payments to the IRS) have been mailed. Our 2005 form 199 (the annual informational return to the California Franchise Tax Board) has been filed. The information for form 990-EZ (IRS return for exempt organizations) has been prepared, and will be submitted when the IRS releases the final format for the 2005 form.

All receivables outstanding as of year-end 2005 have been collected. However, the January financials are not ready as of publication date (January 26), because there will be one more dance in January (January 27).


Dear Bill,


