



Have you ever wondered where to get a particular piece of c/w attire? It can be a frustrating day of driving to all of the shops that claim to carry a selection of c/w attire. The following is a listing of some of the shops in the East and South Bay Area and what you can find there. The list only includes the shops that I have visited. If any of our members know of any shops that are not listed and would recommend, please let us know.

FREMONT LEATHER, 3199 Walnut Avenue, Fremont. Very good selection of boots, hats, pants, shirts, skirts, tops, and accessories. They are friendly and helpful and have a cobbler for any leatherwork. Show them your Club membership card and ask for our Club discount of 15%.

MILLER STOCKMAN, Newpark Mall in Newark, Stoneridge Mall in Pleasanton, and 1456 Northridge Center in Salinas. Fair selection of boots and hats, good selection of pants, tops, and jackets. They have a catalog to order from and several other store locations and are very willing to call all of them to locate a size or color that is not in stock. Your Club membership card or their discount card is good for a 15% discount.

CASTRO VALLEY WESTERN, 3736 Castro Valley Blvd., Castro Valley. Very good selection of boots and tops.

RON RICHARDS WESTERN WEAR, 2510 Telegraph in Oakland. They have the largest inventory of c/w wear that I've seen in the East Bay. If you don't see what you want on the floor, ask a sales person, as they also have a warehouse around the corner.

HELEN'S FOLK DESIGNS, 10225 San Pablo Av., Albany. I recently dropped into Helen's and was warmly greeted by Helen and Helen. This small shop caters to the dancer who wants something individual. They have a very good variety of men's shirts, women's tops, skirts, and dresses. If you are looking for matching outfits, this is the place to go. If they do not have what you want in stock, they will research through their catalogs to try to locate it. Some of their suppliers will work with them in changing colors and patterns. Alterations are available at Helen's. Prices are reasonable, and they offer discounts when purchasing six or more of any one item.

SAN JOSE FLEA MARKET. This is a great place to check out if you are looking for belt buckles or light-weight straw hats. You will have to cover a lot of ground to find all of the booths selling Western items. Prices vary from booth to booth.

THE SILVER BUCKLE, 275 E. Campbell Av., Campbell. Very good selection of tops, pants, skirts, and jackets for the women and a very good selection of shirts, jackets, and hats for the men. They carry a large variety of boots and accessory items. The styles vary from plain to very fancy. Prices are comparable when purchased with our newly acquired 15% discount. Just show them your Club membership card.

* * * * L. A. NATIONAL WESTERN DANCE FESTIVAL * * * * *

Back in November, 1986, I promised as editor that I would never write anything negative about anybody, and I will keep my promise. But I must also tell you in my articles the truth and not misrepresent any story by coloring it any way but the way it happened, so here goes!

As the Friday night (February 13) Valentine dance was winding down at Swiss Park, Sharon and I disappeared in a cloud of dust down the freeway heading for L. A. to continue a super birthday party and while in So. Cal., take in the C/W Invitational. We parked our motorhome at Vacationland located next door to the Disneyland Hotel and never had to move it again until we headed home, so true to the advertisement, the Hotel Ibis (headquarters for the event) provided free shuttle vans to and from the festivities. We used this service and recommend the Ibis Hotel for their courtesy and treatment.

Most of the dancers stayed at the hotel and walked across the street to the Bandstand Dance Club for their competition events; this was also well planned. The "Bandstand", if you have never seen it, is a super-duper place for dancing and is popular with the locals, featuring disco, rock, and c/w on selected evenings. Competition was held during the day and ended by 6:00 p.m. when a buffet was offered, and I heard good reports on the food. The evening dancing was hosted by the "Bandstand" and not by the Invitational committee which meant the place went public. WOW, what action! The place was packed, all three dance floors were full, and the band called "Western Union" played okay, but mostly west-coast swing numbers. Each dance floor was mirrored which gave a nice effect and video camera's picked up the action on all floors and reproduced your image on giant screens located throughout. This allowed you to dance on one floor and see what was going on at the others. The strobe lights flashed and color neon lights glittered on the ceiling; I have to say the noise level was piercing for this little guy from Pleasanton. As Sharon and I looked in awe at all this action complete with mini skirts and \$200 cowboy hats, we wondered "where are our Hayward friends, 'Country Fever'" who we came to cheer and watch their group performance. Well, unknown to us, Dance Director GANEAN was tucking her dancers in bed with strict orders and a wake up call in the wee hours of the a.m. for a final practice. Of course, I'm kidding, but I want you to know that this group (let's call them ours, okay!) did practice very hard to put their routine together in a short time. This proved very interesting and some clever routines were devised. An all-male couple competed in this division and danced well with matching Stetsons, shirts, chaps, "COUNTRY FEVER" of Hayward was introduced, and I must mention how nice the ladies looked in their more traditional country skirts and blouses and the men with their matching colored outfits (shirts, black jeans, boots, hats), a glowing tribute to GANEAN DE LA GRANGE who made all the outfits. Dance and dance well they did! I couldn't help but feel proud of this Nor Cal outfit as they shuffled, scooted, and grapevined their way around the center stage. 
Trophies and individual ribbons were presented. (More Hugs.)
