

We are diligently planning the upcoming fifth annual workshop and social, scheduled




If you are unlucky enough to have to drive around in the bad weather, please drive carefully. We want to see you all on Friday night!

As some of you have probably noticed, the first month of dances in the year 2001 hasn't been particularly will attended, and that is reflected in the financials for the month. The

club made \$1 in the third week of January, and all other dances resulted in a net loss for the

night. That equated to a \$234 loss in dance revenue, and a \$1037 loss overall for the month. While I know some of you don't like to see a negative message, I have to report the facts, and the fact is we lost money in January. The good new is, we still had a comfortable balance of \$9538.03 in the bank at the end of the month. Historically, the first couple months of the year have not been particularly profitable, but as we approach the summer months and our annual workshop, things definitely seem to pick up. I expect that will happen again this year. It also makes me very thankful for the weekly raffles and our fund raising events, as they really help sustain us through the lean months. Thank you to all of the folks who dic attend the January dances, and I hope we will see more of you and the rest of our membership during the coming months.

Results of February's Two-part Opinion Poll are in!

In February we sent out a two-part opinion poll at the request of dancers who came to the January open board meeting. We sent out 126 requests for feedback (each member received one in their issue of the Round Up). The responses came pouring in and I have completed my final tally.

I want to thank the three people who sent back a response. I am sincere in my thanks, although you may have gotten a chuckle from my statement. The people who responded took the time to provide honest feed back to your Board of Directors so that the board can continue to give our members and guests what they want. Here

is what your three fellow members had to say.

The couple's dance opinions were overwhelmingly evenly divided: I counted one vote for each of the three choices. The one opinion on keeping the number of couple's dance lessons the same stated that their reasoning was that no one knows new partner dances. (My personal opinion: This seems to be true lately, that there aren't any new partner dances being choreographed. Perhaps, it is that new couple's dances are not appearing in the Bay Area. We seem to be a location that wants only line dances. We will be having one couple's lesson

during the June Workshop and Social.)

As far as the opinion on dances to people wanted to learn, two of the submitters requested more of the older (classic) dances and fewer new dances. The third response requested more West Coast Swing dances and suggested splitting the floor more often with line dances in front and West Coast Swing in the back. One respondent took the time to write about the lack of dance floor etiquette by the line dancers towards the couples trying to dance around the outside. (Hey! This is what was written by a club member, not me. Personally, I find myself somewhat in agreement on this. Lynette and I try to retain our couple's dances by doing as many of them as we can as often as we can, and we have noticed that the line dancers take possession the whole floor when there could be room left for the couples by having shorter lines, but more of them. Many times we notice that there is a lot of room in the back for more lines, while in the front there is barely room to squeeze between the dancers and the sitters. When we have a large crowd, we respect the line dancers by not doing couple's dances as we can see that no matter how the lines are structured, there simply won't be enough room for both of us.)



Hi gang, more on our trip. We were on the road to Brighton for a day staying at the Hilton facing the English Channel. Arrived late in the day, so only had time to take walks on the beach which was a rock beach instead of sand. They had a long pier that was a Carnival with rides and games on it. Hit the Pub for some good beer and onto Plymouth next day. On the way to Plymouth saw beautiful countryside with hedgerows every where. A hedgerow is a planted hedge in place of a fence that was planted many years ago and is not allowed to be removed in today's modern world. Saw Stonehenge were there were huge stones standing on end, with stone bridge across the tops connecting them to each other. They have no idea what they are for and how they got there, about one to two thousand years ago. Next in Plymouth for three days. The Mayflower left from here in 1620 taking the pilgrims to the New World. We were actually able to stand on the stone steps that were used by the pilgrims to go down to the ship. England also keeps their War Ships there and the Queen Mary used to dock there when she was in service. Saw Lawn Bowling which looked like fun. They have men only and women only teams. They wear all white clothes, a white hat and a black tie. Went on a old restored Steam Train, it rained the whole damn ride. During WWII, Plymouth was bombed heavily so much of it is rather ugly postwar buildings but they do have a mall-like greenway several miles long on which they never rebuilt. Narrow streets every where and neat shops. Onto Cardiff, North Wales stopping at Bath on the way. Bath is a very old city built with mostly row houses, that look very much like apartment buildings. All the buildings throughout the city were once black from soot because they used only coal to heat with. Most of them have now been cleaned and coal is no longer used for heating. We saw the Roman Baths which were built two thousand years ago utilizing a natural underground hot spring. It was like a Olympic size swimming pool with water temperature at 85 degrees constant average. It is Lead Lined and, amazingly, does not leak any water even to this day. They even had hot tubs and indoor heating. A real neat city to see and could spend several days there, but had to leave because of the bus schedule. Onto Cardiff for a nights stay and see its sights. Arrived late Sunday afternoon, so we saw a Castle only from the entrance way because it was getting ready to close and so was everything else on a Sunday afternoon. As usual, the bus always arrives late in the day no matter where we are going. Tomorrow off to Ireland. Back to the bus for a moment. We have been on the bus at least a week and I will tell you it totally SUCKS. Up and on the road at 8.00 am each day, stop to see world famous attractions and they give you 30 minutes to 2 hours to see something, depending what it is, have lunch potty breaks, sightsee, do shops, take pictures etc. These were just some of our problems, not to mention our tour quide and bus driver. We felt like we were on a Cattle Drive at times For more details see us at the dance. We will give you some good tips and name some good bus companies if interested in traveling. We don't recommend Globus, Cosmos, or Brendan, they are all one in the same company. As the old saying goes, you get what you pay for and we did! See you at the dance.




