

I remember copying machines, omputers, cable TV, fax machines, CB Radio, and touch-tone telephones. My love of country music grew, as well as my awareness of the peaceful times that were just starting. As my one marriage ended, I met and wed Lynette. Little did I know how much of a lifelong friend and lover she would become. Ah, the 70s were very good.


401K account. (Don't go there Lynette!!!).

Translation:


Clerk: "May I show you some overpriced souvenirs?"


