THE ALASKA HIGHWAY: A summary of how it all began.

ORIGINS

After the attack on Pearl Harbor, an unprecedented collaboration between Canada and the USA happened. There were plans to build a connecting highway since the 1920s by Thomas McDonald, (then director of the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads), then in the 1930s by Franklin D. Roosevelt. Canada, however, found little value in investing money in a highway where traveling was limited and a low population. But that changed after the Pearl Harbor attack and threats were made by Japan to attack the west coast of North America. The USA and Canada agreed on the construction of the highway to allow the USA to reinforce its territory during this foreign crisis. There was an agreement that the USA would cover the cost of the highway and, six months after the end of the war, the US would turn over the Canadian section of the highway to Canada.

CONSTRUCTION STARTS

The construction started on March 8, 1942, and by November 20 of the same year, the official ribbon cutting for the highway happened at mile 1061, also known as the Soldiers Summit, but the highway wasn't open to the public until 1948. Approximately 27,000 people (including soldiers, engineers, and civilians) assisted in the construction of the highway. The highway had a total length of approximately 1,700 miles (2,700 kilometers). After years of reconstruction and straightening areas of its path and other improvements, the highway is now 1,387 miles (2,232 kilometers) long. ■

TAYLOR

aylor is a small town located in northeastern British Columbia, Canada. With a population of around 1,373 residents, it's characterized by its close-knit community atmosphere and picturesque surroundings.

The town of Taylor is situated along the Alaska Highway and the Peace River, offering stunning natural landscapes and outdoor recreational opportunities. Its tranquil setting attracts outdoor enthusiasts who enjoy activities such as fishing, hiking, and camping.



The most important industry in Taylor is the forestry sector, with logging and lumber production playing a significant role in the local economy. Additionally, the town benefits from commerce related to transportation and services catering to residents and travelers passing through the area.




THE KISKATINAW BRIDGE

Approximately 30 km north of Dawson Creek, BC is the Historic Kiskatinaw Bridge, which lies within Kiskatinaw Provincial Park (established in 1962). A curved, timber-truss bridge about 122 metres in length was built by the US Public Roads Administration (PRA) in 1942-43 to replace the original timber trestle.

apanese forces threatened to invade Alaska during the Second World War, resulting in the building of the Alaska Highway. This unique bridge, the first curved wooden bridge in Canada, was built at mile 20 of the original highway, just before the Kiskatinaw River. To conform with the bend in the highway, engineers designed a wooden bridge that measures 534 feet (162.5 metres). Three timber trusses span the bridge, constructed 30 metres (100 feet) above the stream, using approximately 500,000 board feet of British Columbia fir for the construction. To get to the railhead, fir was shipped through Dawson Creek from coastal British Columbia. It was supposed to arrive in early 1943, before the spring thaw, but didn't arrive until April. The mud made the haul from Dawson Creek challenging because of the breakup. Construction was delayed further when spring runoff damaged the temporary log bridge and scaffolding.

Due to the expansion of the oil and gas industries in the post-war years, a larger and heavier bridge was required. The Alaska Highway was rerouted in 1978, bypassing approximately 10 km of the old highway. As a result of its history, wood decking, scenic setting, and unusual design, the Historic Kiskatinaw Bridge has been promoted as a tourist attraction, becoming a popular spot for photography where visitors can walk across the bridge and enjoy the views. The bridge is also part of the Yukon Quest International Sled Dog Race, which crosses the bridge each year, attracting people from all over the world. The bridge is a reminder of the Yukon's rich history and an important part of the local culture. It is a popular destination for visitors due to its beauty and unique structure.



Kiskatinaw Bridge



NORTH TO ALASKA By Sammie Renfrow

or those of a certain age, the phrase "North to Alaska" evokes memories of the 1960 John Wayne movie, a tale of adventure and opportunity for those bold enough to embrace it.

This was the vision I held when I accepted a position with the Alaska & Alaska Highway Business & Travel Guide. My journey northward to Alaska would involve thousands of miles behind the wheel of my campervan, capturing photographs along the length of the Alaska Highway. It was a different kind of challenge, but one I was determined to tackle.

Embarking on this journey in my custom-made Dodge Ram 2500 ProMaster Campervan, fondly dubbed Happy VanCastle, courtesy of Vandemic Campervans, I knew I was in for an adventure spanning thousands of miles of wilderness. Preparation was key, so I meticulously packed Happy with all the essentials: camera gear, Starlink, provisions, tools, a spare gas can, totes, and my trusty eBike. With the water and gas tanks filled, the final step was to load my faithful companion, Georgia, into Happy, and set off on the road north to Alaska, brimming with anticipation and excitement.

After departing Phoenix, AZ, my initial destination was Salt Lake City, UT, where my new employer arranged for the installation of the dashcam. With that task completed, Georgia and I embarked on our journey through Idaho and Montana, crossing the US/Canadian border en route to Dawson Creek, British Columbia, the starting point of the Alaskan Highway. From Dawson Creek, I had nearly five weeks to reach Willow, Alaska.

Every single minute of those five weeks was an exhilarating adventure. The freedom of the open road, the comfort of my VanCastle, and the sheer joy of pursuing

my passion for photography surpassed all my expectations. With Georgia as my loyal copilot, we soaked in countless breathtaking sights along the way. I made frequent stops, often veering off onto side roads to explore hidden gems. Each pause was an opportunity to capture the extraordinary beauty of the landscape. From expansive prairies to towering mountains, from thundering waterfalls to meandering rivers, from charming towns to weathered churches, every scene begged to be immortalized through my lens. I couldn't resist documenting the historic mile markers and the whimsical signpost forest, each offering a unique glimpse into the region's rich history. And amid this picturesque backdrop, the abandoned businesses that once thrived during the early days of the Alaska-Canadian Highway, formerly known as the Alcan, stood as poignant reminders of bygone eras.

A journey through the wilderness wouldn't be complete without encountering its diverse wildlife, and I had no shortage of sightings. From majestic bears, industrious beavers, and imposing bison to graceful caribou, elusive moose, regal elk, and nimble mountain goats, the landscape teemed with life. And let's not forget the rich avian diversity, with geese, ravens, loons, eagles, and countless other bird species gracing the skies.

Yet, what truly made this trip extraordinary wasn't just the breathtaking scenery or the abundance of wildlife; it was the people I encountered along the way.

Taking a pause from my photography pursuits to immerse myself in the local culture, I found myself bonding with fellow travelers. One memorable encounter was with a single mom from New Jersey, who, like me, was exploring the wilderness with her two children and their furry companion in a van similar to mine. As we tried our luck at gold panning, we struck up a conversation and shared stories of our adventures. Soon, we were joined by a couple from Michigan and Florida, and together, we formed a makeshift community, swapping tales and enjoying each other's company around a crackling campfire. Bonds were forged, and contact information exchanged, ensuring that our connections endured long after the journey ended.

At one campground, I crossed paths with a retired widow—a solo female traveler whose spirit of adventure led her to stay at the campground for an extended period. A fellow writer and artist, she regaled me with captivating tales, enriching our encounter with her wisdom and experiences.

Another memorable encounter was with a single lady in the midst of a life transition, searching for a new home but finding solace in the simplicity of camp living. Our evening conversation delved deep into the intricacies of life, leaving me with a feather and a heartfelt note on my windshield the next morning—a gesture I still treasure.

TESLIN

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WHITEHORSE

Whitehorse is the capital of the Yukon and the largest city in Northern Canada. It is located at 1426 km (Historic Mile 918) on the Alaska Highway in southern Yukon, and is framed by three nearby mountains: Grey Mountain to the east, Mount Sumanik to the northwest and Golden Horn Mountain to the south.

In the heart of the Yukon, Whitehorse stands as a testament to the rugged beauty and resilient spirit of Northern Canada. As the capital city, it proudly holds the mantle of the largest urban center in this expansive region, offering a unique blend of history, natural wonders, and modern amenities that captivate both residents and visitors alike.

Finally, in a symbolic gesture of recognition, Whitehorse was officially designated as the capital of the Yukon Territory on April 1, 1953, marking a pivotal moment in its evolution. And on March 21, 1957, the city's name was officially changed from White Horse to Whitehorse, a nod to its enduring legacy and bright future.

Today, Whitehorse stands as a testament to the indomitable spirit of the North -a vibrant city where history, nature, and innovation converge, inviting all who venture here to write their own chapter in its storied tale.

POPPY DAY CELEBRATION

If you visit Canada on November 11, you may notice people wearing red poppy flowers on their clothes. The flower is worn by Canadians of all ages as a symbol of respect and to celebrate Remembrance Day (Jour du Souvenir in French).

Remembrance Day is a Canadian federal statutory holiday and is also a provincial/territorial statutory holiday in all three territories (Yukon, Northwest Territories, and Nunavut) and six of the ten provinces (British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland and Labrador).

Remembrance Day, also known as Poppy Day, is a day to remember soldiers who have died in the line of duty. Canadians wear the poppy as a sign of respect and remembrance of fallen soldiers of the First World War. The Royal Canadian Legion distribute poppies on this day to raise funds to support veterans.

This tradition was inspired by the famous poem "In Flanders Fields" written by Canadian physician and soldier Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae in 1915. The poem was a powerful reminder of the loss of life during the war and its impact resonates with many people. McCrae wrote about the growing red poppies on the battlefields of Flanders in northern France. This symbol has become an essential part of Poppy Day and is seen as a sign of respect for those who have served and sacrificed for their country.

On Poppy Day, people observe a minute of silence and hold ceremonies to honor the fallen. At the official ceremonies, veterans and their families are invited to place wreaths at memorial sites, share stories, and pay tribute to those who served. Additionally, the Royal Canadian Legion organizes parades and other events to commemorate the fallen soldiers.





TIRE SAFETY

Tire safety is a crucial aspect of vehicle maintenance that should never be overlooked. QUICK TIPS!

□ 1. Regular Tire Inspections:

Regularly inspecting your tires is essential for identifying any potential issues or signs of wear. Here are some key aspects to consider during tire inspections:

a. Tread Depth:

Adequate tread depth is crucial for maintaining traction and preventing hydroplaning. As a general rule, tires should have a minimum tread depth of 2/32 of an inch (or 0.15875 cm). Use a tread depth gauge or the American penny test by inserting a penny into the tread groove. If you can see the top of Lincoln's head, it's time to replace the tire.

b. Tire Pressure:

Proper tire pressure is vital for optimal performance and safety. Underinflated or overinflated tires can affect handling, fuel efficiency, and tire lifespan. Refer to your vehicle's manual or the tire placard, usually located on the driver's doorjamb or inside the fuel filler door, for the recommended tire pressure. Use a reliable tire pressure gauge to check and adjust the pressure accordingly.

c. Signs of Wear:

Inspect your tires for any signs of wear, including cracks, bulges, or cuts on the sidewall. These can indicate possible tire damage and should be promptly addressed. Uneven tread wear may suggest misalignment or suspension issues, requiring professional attention.

□ 2. Rotating Tires:

Regularly rotating your tires helps ensure even wear and prolongs their lifespan. Tire rotation patterns may vary depending on the type of vehicle and tire setup. Consult your vehicle's manual or seek guidance from a professional mechanic for the appropriate rotation pattern and frequency.

3. Proper Alignment & Balancing:

Wheel alignment and tire balancing are vital for tire longevity and optimal performance. Misaligned wheels can cause uneven tire wear and affect vehicle handling. Similarly, unbalanced tires can lead to vibration and uneven wear. Schedule regular alignment and balancing checks with a trusted mechanic to prevent such issues.

□ 4. Seasonal Considerations:

Different weather conditions often require different tire characteristics. Consider the following:

a. Winter Tires:



□ 5. Tire Age and Replacement:

Tires age over time, regardless of tread wear. As tires age, they become more susceptible to failure even if they appear to have sufficient tread depth. Check the tire's sidewall for the manufacturing date, represented by a four-digit code (e.g., 3215 means the tire was manufactured in the 32nd week of 2015).

AURORA BOREALIS: HOW DOES IT HAPPEN?

he Aurora Borealis, also known as the Northern Lights, is a natural phenomenon that occurs in the Earth's polar regions. It is caused by the collision of charged particles with the Earth's magnetic field. These charged particles, primarily electrons and protons, come from the Sun and are affected by solar wind.

When these charged particles reach the Earth's atmosphere, they collide with atoms and molecules, releasing energy in the form of light. This collision process causes the charged particles to emit light at different frequencies, resulting in the vibrant colors of the Aurora Borealis. The colors of the Northern Lights can vary, with green, red, and purple being the most common. The colors depend on the altitude of the particles and the type of atoms they collide with. The most common light emission is green, which is produced by oxygen molecules. Red and purple colors come from nitrogen molecules, while blue and yellow colors are rarer.

The Northern Lights are most visible in the spring and fall equinoxes, when the days are shorter and the nights are longer. In Yukon and Alaska, the best time to observe the Aurora Borealis is between September and April. However, it is important to note that visibility depends on weather conditions and solar activity.

NORTH POLE

Situated a mere 20-minute drive south of Fairbanks, Alaska, lies the enchanting town of North Pole. Contrary to what its name might suggest, North Pole finds itself nestled a modest 1,700 miles (2,700 km) south of Earth's geographic North Pole, and just 125 miles (200 km) south of the Arc-tic Circle.

In 1944, Bon & Bernice Davis were looking for a place to homestead in Alaska. They found that place to be in what is in central North Pole. According to the Homestead Act, they had to live on the land, build a home, and farm at least 10% of the land. They did just that and were issued a patent to the land. The Davises later sold some of their land to a development company that subdivided it and renamed the area North Pole, hoping to attract a toy manufacturer and

other manufacturers who would advertise products as being "Made in North Pole".

So now Santa Claus has a zip code! It's 99705, located in North Pole, Alaska! Its post office receives more than 400,000 pieces of mail each year addressed simply to "Santa Claus, North Pole, Alaska." Community volunteers work hard to respond to every single letter. As the town's slogan says, North Pole is "Where the Spirit of Christmas Lives Year-round." No toy company materialized but Con Miller, an original city-council member, built a trading post that he called the Santa Claus House. The store sold basic necessities and was the town's post office for nearly 20 years. Over the years, the store transformed into a store that celebrates all things Christmas. Visit the Santa Claus House and choose from holiday-inspired gifts for everyone on your list. Throughout North Pole, you'll find Christ-




mas-themed businesses and streets such as Santa Claus Lane, Snowman Lane, St. Nicholas Drive, and Kris Kringle Drive, plus several festivals in the winter months – a great time to visit North Pole.

Since it is inside what's called the auroral oval—a prime area in which to witness the aurora borealis, also called the Northern Lights. It's easiest to see them in darker skies so August–April is your best chance of viewing.

There's no other place like North Pole anywhere in Alaska—or the world.



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CANADIAN BISON

I istorically, the range of the Canadian bison was vast, spanning from the Arctic tundra to the grasslands of the Great Plains. However, due to overhunting and habitat loss, their population declined significantly. By the early 20th century, numbers were reduced to just a few small herds.

Today, there are estimated to be around 400,000 bison in Canada. This number includes wild populations as well as managed conservation herds. These herds are maintained for various purposes, including research, conservation, and as a source of income through ranching operations.

The number of Canadian bison can vary significantly depending on the specific population and area. Historically, it is estimated that there were millions of bison roaming North America. However, due to habitat destruction and hunting, their population has plummeted. In terms of weight, Canadian bison can weigh anywhere between 700 and 1,600 kilograms (1,543 and 3,527 pounds), depending on age, sex, and overall health. Males are typically heavier than females.

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
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




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Road Tripping with Children

If you grew up in the 80s or 90s, maybe you remember the days when wearing a seatbelt still felt optional, and when there were no tablets, laptops, or smartphones to entertain you on the road. For me, listening to romantic songs from the late 60s and early 70s were the soundtrack of most of our family trips. My children listen to mostly 90s and early 2000s music on our road trips now! Some things change and evolve, but others don't.

The challenge of traveling with young children whose attention spans require constant input, who ask how much longer we have left to drive, who are hungry, or who ask for a bathroom one minute after passing the last rest stop (despite me asking several times if they needed to use the bathroom before we drove by!) is something to which every parent who has traveled with little ones is very accustomed.

I know I could easily entertain them with video games or movies, but having my children staring at a screen for hours instead of enjoying the scenery, especially on the Alaska Highway, seems like a missed opportunity to create memories and learn about other places and cultures. Here are a few ideas I have used to keep mine entertained but still involved during the trip.

Our family favorite: Create a playlist with their input, especially for each of them. Sure, younger children may enjoy the soundtracks of their favorite cartoons, but you can also make a game out of it. Create a playlist in advance to see if your child can guess the tune, the movie, or even the specific scene that a particular song reminds them of from a movie. Keep track of their points and, if you have more than one child, you can make a friendly competition out of it. Or perhaps create a soundtrack from your own life. Is there a song you used to sing for them when they were younger or a song that played during a memorable moment? Create a playlist and talk about what memories some songs may bring up. Sharing your music lets you connect over cherished memories and dreams in life.

If you have children approaching their teenage years, let them choose the music. This could be an opportunity for you to connect and bond with them both by listening to their music and discussing the lyrics. It may be entertaining and educational to ask where they first heard each song they wanted on their playlist, allowing them to talk about their friends or the type of media they are consuming, enabling you to discuss their friendships and media choices.

If there are songs with sentimental value,

maybe the song you danced to at your wedding or a song that reminds you of something you all shared in the past, share the experience. Do this sparingly and maybe save it for only one or two songs, as you don't want to minimize the importance of the meaning of all the songs. Ask your child if there are any songs that make them think of you, a sibling, or a friend. Music can be a helpful tool to create strong bonds between a child and their guardian, and road trips offer a focused time to explore what you always wished you had time to talk with each other about.

To keep the children entertained during the car trip, you can also bring books, toys, games, and activities like coloring books. You can also set up a movie night in the car with a portable DVD player or tablet with kid-friendly movies for those times when the drive is just too long between stops.

Bring snacks and drinks for everyone and make sure to take regular breaks to stretch and get some fresh air. You can also play road games like I Spy, the Alphabet Game, or License Plate Bingo to keep the kids engaged and help pass the time. Create a "scavenger hunt" for the kids to do while on the road by giving them a list of items to look for as you drive and have them check them off when they find them.

Safety

An obvious thing to keep the children safe is their car seats. Before leaving home, if you have children who are about to grow out of their car seats, make sure to upgrade them and check their weight and stature before the trip. Your child may have outgrown their car seat. Moving them to a booster seat or removing the booster altogether if your child has fulfilled the height and weight requirements may make a huge difference in their comfort and yours as well. A comfy kid is less likely to be a fidgeting kid (we want to emphasize: LESS likely. We do not guarantee perfect children!).

Bring a car seat or booster seat for the ride if you are renting a car or check if the rental car company can provide one. Make sure the car seat is installed correctly and that your child is wearing a seatbelt at all times. Always check the car seat's expiration date and that it meets all safety requirements. Make sure the car seat is appropriate for the size and weight of your child.

A few other safety tips to keep in mind when planning a trip: make sure to pack an emergency kit with essentials like a first aid kit, food and water, extra clothing, and a phone charger.

Snacks

I think it's been around five years since the last time I bought those little cheesy fish crackers for my children and I feel like I am still cleaning up the yellow paste that comes from the saliva and cracker mixture. Yet, there are other snack choices that can come in handy. Look for options that aren't too messy, not overloaded with sugar, and ideally offer some nutritional benefits, in case they end up replacing a meal. Pick snacks you know they'll love, which can help curb those pricey fast food cravings.

Take care of yourself

Yes, this article is focused on your children, but think about this: If you are tired and cranky, chances are you won't be in the mood to deal with their needs. As a single parent myself, not having a copilot next to me can make things tricky. Remember to take rest and food breaks regularly to make your trip enjoyable, as well.

Spending long car rides with your children offers great opportunities to bond while enjoying the scenery. For older children, this may be the right time to ask about their interests, likes, dislikes, or whatever you never seem to have time to discuss at home.

Even though my current car has a nicer AC than my dad's car growing up, and tablets and other devices now exist, some things won't change, so make sure to make the most of your trip and be well-prepared to enjoy every moment with your captive audience!





Car Preparations for Winter

In addition to following winter driving precautions, it is important to prepare your car for the challenges of winter:

- □ 1. Insulate your car: Install insulation such as window insulation kits and seat warmers to keep the interior warm and comfortable.
- 2. Check the battery: Have the battery checked to ensure it is in good condition and capable of starting in cold weather.
- □ 3. Winterize your windshield: Use a winter windshield washer fluid that contains antifreeze to prevent freezing.
- 4. Keep your gas tank full: In cold weather, the gasoline in your vehicle can freeze, making it difficult to start the engine. Keep your gas tank full to prevent this issue.
- 5. Stock up on supplies: Keep an ice scraper, shovel, and kitty litter (for traction) in your vehicle in case of emergency.







WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF AN EMERGENCY DURING WINTERTIME

Icy roads, cold weather, impaired visibility due to snow, and many other issues could occur for the winter traveler. We know that it is ideal to avoid these conditions, but for many reasons, a destination or trip must be made because of deadlines, commitments, holidays, or an endless list of other situations. Unfortunately, sometimes accidents happen. When those occur, it is best to have a calm demeanor, be prepared, and take action.

Here are a few recommendations to avoid accidents and what to do if you do have an accident during the winter:

1. Check the weather report: Before embarking on a winter journey, it is crucial to check the weather forecast to ensure the road conditions will be safe.

2. Maintain your vehicle: Make sure your vehicle is in good working condition, with properly inflated tires, a functioning heating system, and working windshield wipers. Make sure to keep a spare tire, new wipers, and gas containers in case of an emergency.
