I was reminded recently of a message I gave a while back on Matthew chapter 6. Here in the middle of the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus takes a moment to talk about our treasures (Matthew 6:19-24). In Matthew 6:21 Jesus says, "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

What we treasure, he says, will begin to influence our hearts. It's the spiritual equivalent of "You are what you eat." We are shaped and molded by what we allow into our lives.

MAY SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Session of West Hempfield Presbyterian Church met on May 26, 2020

Together we covered our church and congregation with prayer, read and reflected on Scripture, and reviewed all that has been going on with the church and the world. We reviewed and approved minutes from previous meetings and had an opportunity for committees to share reports.

Policies were approved and added to the church's Manual of Administrative Operations regarding our new online giving program. They were required by the company that handles our online giving and approved unanimously by the elders.

We reviewed the congregation's responses to the survey about reopening the church. There were 52 responses (total, online plus mail). The official results have been printed and will be kept in the church office. They can be made available to anyone, by request to the office. There were a variety of responses reflecting the way we are all torn between wanting to be together again but also wanting to love our neighbors by being careful. These responses are aiding all of us as we consider how best to move forward.

COVID-19 UPDATE May 26, 2020

Governor Wolf's new information about the Green Phase has the elders feeling hopeful we will see this milestone in early June. As such, we have decided it would be prudent at this point to wait for that announcement. The Session will continue our pattern of meeting every two weeks throughout this pandemic, which means our next meeting will be on June 9, 2020. If Westmoreland County has entered the Green Phase, or it has been announced when we will enter the

Green Phase, the Session has agreed to discuss and, if we are able, to set the date of our reopening for in-person worship on that night.

Worship will continue to be at-home with no in-person option through at least June 14, 2020.

Building closure continues as long as we are in the Yellow Phase. By agreement of everyone at the meeting, when Westmoreland County enters the Green Phase, the hallway alongside the sanctuary – from the main door back to Tony's office, including the old kitchen and one set of bathrooms – will be opened and available during church office hours and in the evenings for meetings. At first, the rest of the building will continue to be limited just to staff. If this limited opening goes well and our community stays in the Green Phase, the Session will consider opening more of the building for use in the future. It is very important that all building use be scheduled through the church office to prevent over crowding the small space and provide opportunity for proper cleaning.

As we begin looking forward to and planning for re-opening the church, cleaning supplies will be very important. We are beginning now to stock up as much as possible. See announcement on the side of the page.

With the help of the Payroll Protection Plan, Board of Pensions, and the continued generous giving of our church family, we have been and will continue to fully financially support all church staff.

Special Request

As we plan and prepare for reopening the church, we would like to ask you for help in stocking up on hand sanitizer. It can be hard to find right now, and when found in stores there is often a limit on purchasing.

If you find sanitizer that meets the CDC recommendations, please consider purchasing one to donate to the church.

CDC recommends using ABHR (Alcohol Based Hand Rub) with greater than 60% ethanol or 70% isopropanol in healthcare settings. Unless hands are visibly soiled, an alcohol-based hand rub is preferred over soap and water in most clinical situations due to evidence of better compliance compared to soap and water. Hand rubs are generally less irritating to hands and are effective in the absence of a sink.

Note: Pennsylvania Primary Election is June 2, 2020. For safety reasons, the church office will be closed and we ask that <u>NO ONE</u> enter the church on this date other than for election purposes in the Fellowship Hall. As recommended by the election commission, because of the large volume of people entering and exiting the Fellowship Hall on this one day during a pandemic, the Fellowship Hall will be closed to <u>EVERYONE</u>, INCLUDING ALL STAFF, June 3 through June 9.

AT-HOME COMMUNION — June 7, 2020

We have not been able to celebrate communion together since March. Hopefully restrictions will be lifting soon, but even then we know that not everyone will feel safe gathering together right away. In response to this unusual situation, we will be trying something new. On June 7 at 11:00am we will all have the opportunity to participate in at-home communion together even though separate. Here's the plan:

Step 1 — Prepare ahead of time. You will need to have your own bread (any kind of bread) and grape juice/wine (grape juice would be preferred, but since that is something that everyone might not have or might not be willing to go out and buy just for one small drink, water could be substituted as it is our most common drink).

Step 2 — "Tune in" at 11am on June 7, 2020. We will do a Facebook Live video, like our videos during Holy Week. If you are unable to watch online, let the church office know <u>as soon as possible</u> and we will mail you a script that you can read Sunday morning which will help you take communion at about the same time as those following along online.

Step 3 — We all take communion together, even though separated in space.

Just in case — We will take the Facebook Live video and put it on the church website for the rest of the day. It should be available from around noon to midnight on June 7, 2020. If you miss the Live broadcast, you can still participate on the same day as everyone else.

After June 7, the video will go away, hopefully, making this something special that we all made time for and did together.
