Notes from Table Top Exercise - 27 March 2025

Meeting began at 3 pm

Scott Talbot introduced the exercise – It was inspired by an Ice Storm which occurred in Maine in 1998. He asked the group to respond as a team to a similar event centered in Westmoreland NH in the February of 2025.

Disasters may result from a natural occurrence, a technical event, or a man-made event.

When a disaster occurs, one should engage members of all organizations represented in the room today. The selectboard may declare a disaster for the town.

Good records need to be kept in the event help/reimbursement is requested by the state or federal governments.

This disaster event occurred from 2/3/25 to 2.7/25.

Monday -2/3/25

Began with a National Weather Advisory at 4am – Storm from 6am to 3pm

1pm – Freeze rain warning – It will be a 4 day event – at that time there was 0.5 inches of ice

7pm -0.75 inches of ice – Cancel school

8pm – Eversource – expect power outages

- 9pm Road agents ordered to stop too much limbs and debri on the roads 1.25 inches of ice NH Alerts sent
- 10pm NWS expect 3.5 inches of ice

Tuesday – 2/4/25

12am – Eversource – widespread power outage

6am – State of NH declares a State of Emergency

11am – SAU29 closed until further notice – 2.5 inches of ice Internet down Wednesday – 2/5/25 3.5 inches of ice 25% of electrical infrastructure damaged

Continuity of Government is important Need to establish Incident Command Should have a Functional Organizational Chart Need to document all expenses – have the town administrator involved Fuel for generators will be a problem if the event is long – need to top off before major weather events Food supply is an issue with long events Need to have Emergency Contracts

Some homes/businesses may go for weeks without power – a real challenge for Eversource Opening roads is a major concern – a hugh amount of wood debri Maplewood is a critical facility – transportation for a large number people NH State Police – 30 troopers for about 30 towns Will need buses for transportation Eversource sometimes sends out people to guard downed lines Westmoreland uses warning tapes to warn of downed lines instead of traffic cones because traffic cones get stolen

There is concern for security and safety – Scott Talbot

Civilian population needs to be kept informed on a regular basis 2 - 3 times a day

Code Red is gone – Genesis is now available on cell phone

There is a free Genesis App We need to reach town residents on how to connect Also connection through the town website

October 30 - Scott says we will put the plan into operation

- Plan A and Plan B

Scott Lambertson, NH HSEM, says:

- Westmoreland's Emergency Operations Plan is a good general plan
- But we need a workshop to drill down and develop detailed plans
- Define state trooper role
- Ham radio operator role
- Where are the resources? Nail it down
- Genesis communicating tools
- Town messaging shelters road closures
