Committee currently consists of 4 members. Question was asked if we need to have 5 members. Rachel will go to the Board to determine if we need to advertise for an additional member or if we can continue with only 4 core team members.

Composting

Per Rachel City Composting would be open to having service in Westmoreland if they have 30 households that sign up.

 Weekly, bi-weekly, or monthly pickup options – clean container drop off with each pickup – have the option to get some of the material back for use

Amy to contact Adam Jankauskas at City Compost to get more details, see about getting information that can be used to support a sign-up initiative and if they would have the capability of sending someone for an education day.

Outsourcing of recycle center

Rich reached out to several other towns including Raymond, Laconia, Belmont and Rochester. Learned that there is so much variation between the towns that outsource that it is difficult to really understand specifically how this could benefit or not the Town of Westmoreland.

Suggestion to go to Monadnock trucking on getting specifics on how the program works – Gilsum (fairly comparable about ½ the size of Westmoreland – resident-wise.

What we know of Gilsum is that is approx. \$2.5K/mo and includes a pay per bag methodology

Pay per bag drove a reduction in compact waste of 20 tons to 5 tons. Paying for what you throw positively impacted recycling activities

- Does Pay per bag have to be voted on?
- Town would have to buy bags and make available town hall, recycle center, maybe some local stores

For true cost savings to the town these 3 options are really the best options that will have the greatest impact:

- 1. Outsourcing
- 2. Pay per bag
- 3. Combination of both

Recycling/Reclaiming for increased revenue – for highest revenue materials must be fully segregated

Glass recycling – Glass has market value – crushed or not

Recommendation from the committee is that the co-mingled recycling station be manned to help ensure aluminum cans are segregated under current requirements

- This could open up other segregation opportunities (such as glass)
- Aluminum cans are not being properly segregated and are going into the commingle dumpster

The committee has learned of a number of best practices from Walpole. We also recognize that Westmoreland is not Walpole, but there are opportunities for Westmoreland that we may be able to take advantage of.
