A visitor's overview: From outside of Civil Hospital to inside of Nigahban Surgical Unit in Civil Hospital

It was a bright sunny day when I reached Civil Hospital. The taxi driver had to stop much short of the main gate of Civil Hospital as there was rush and a large number of vehicles there. The surrounding shops and buildings shocked me as I had a different perception about a hospital. I always knew a hospital to be a peaceful place built at the outskirt of the city so that it is free from pollution and noise of vehicles.

I quickly gathered my thoughts and managed to walk through the rush and the pedestrians walking fast into and out of the Hospital. The sight right at the entrance un-nerved me as I managed to enter the premises and had to muster up courage to tolerate what I had to witness. I saw a large number of patients - some were being wheeled on stretchers and some lying down on footpaths surrounded by others who I thought must be their family members. I had to reach Nigahban Surgical Unit of Civil Hospital and by now I was prepared for more shocking scenes. The walk from outside of Civil Hospital till every step I was taking was an eye opener and raised several questions in my mind. It was all over-crowded, and many people were

seen in rags sitting on footpaths and their faces had many stories of pain, poverty, long tiring travel, and some bitterness but still waiting with hope for themselves. I also observed some people smiling and laughing while eating food which appeared un-hygienic. The entrance led to the pathway and then the corridor started. I felt stuffy and suffocated. It was even painful to see the patients moving in that type of suffocating, stinking and over-crowded pathway. Some were even sitting on the floors of the corridor. The stairs started and there were living

pictures of pain and poverty. One can understand that these people are deprived of basic health facilities, but how much they lack when it comes to economic condition when they have to travel in buses or walk long distances in spite of serious illnesses. I had to climb the stairs as I was told that Nigahban Surgical Unit was on the second floor.

When I reached the second floor, my mind started boggling again as I was in a state of confusion what to believe and what not? Right from where Nigahban Surgical Unit started, the world seemed to change instantaneously. It was all clean and the entrance was impressive. When I entered the Nigahban Surgical Unit, I found I had walked into another hospital. The corridors were clean and all rooms and wards were tidy. Still bewildered, I decided to see the washrooms before visiting different wards. Here, I was sure to find again something which will put me off. With utter surety of seeing a pathetic washroom in a government hospital, I reluctantly opened the door to enter. I looked all around quite like a critique or a mystery shopper or a pessimist and a detective, but despite looking all around, I didn't find anything which I could complain about. Even soap solution was

filled and the hand drier was working. I came out feeling, 'it's not so bad!' an unusually unexpected experience. I went to meet patients and their attendants in High Dependency Unit and other wards. I enquired about the health of the patients, the level of service they were getting, and the most important question:" Do you have to pay for consultation, treatment or medication?, everyone answered," No, it's all free, and we don't have to spend a single penny!" I took a sigh of relief. I revisited my notion: never lose hope, there's always light at the end of every tunnel, there's always sun after a dark night; if hope breaks, hold it again. I was delighted to see Nigahban Welfare Association serving patients in Civil Hospital and helping me feel good that still there are credible organizations and people whose goals are different and who are focused on their dreams and performance.

Healing Meher Bibi From Baluchistan A Journey Full Of Debt, Pain And Hope

You cannot continue to weep. At some point, the tears dry in your eyes and the pain stays within!

The picture of Meher Bibi says it all. Her tears have dried but her grandson could not stop venting out his anger and grief. He told about his grandmother who was previously operated in Khuzdar at a cost Rs. 400,000. This led to selling of their valuables. The boy is a poor laborer

and works for long hours to earn Rs. 300 a day. He travelled all along from Baluchistan to Nigahban Civil Hospital so that his granny heals. He had to sell his goat and ask for a loan to travel to reach Nigahban. His coming to the hospital and going back will cost Rs. 8,000.

Meher Bibi looked very quiet and numb. She came with obstructive jaundice. Her ERCP was planned but her condition was such that she could not be



probed. So her MRCP is to be done. Despite all the debts and travelling hassle, Nigahban is still a hope for Meher Bibi and her grandson.

Zaibun Nisa is a widow whose hopes are still alive due to Nigahban despite her severe illness. She is 45 and lives in a room provided by her brother in Orangi Town. She has no earning and lives from hand to mouth from the very little her brother gives her. Previously, she worked in a company but for the last four years she is unable to earn as she has a severe pain in her gall

bladder. She has a married daughter and one son who is 16 years old but he is not educated and has no earning. She has so much pain that she cannot move much and she had to come to the Hospital with her married daughter.

Previously she was hospitalized in some other hospital which landed her in a debt. She started feeling the pain when she worked in a company but she used to ignore it and kept using pain killers as due to poverty she could not go for proper treatment. Relying on ordinary pain killers has put her in a very painful state.

All her treatment is being done free and this is possible because of zakat of people like you. Please send zakat to help many people like Zaibun Nisa.

Colonoscopy is a top notch diagnostic technique used to find polyps, tumors, colon cancers and areas of inflammation and bleeding.

In 2013 alone, 533 patients benefitted from this important diagnostic procedure. During the year, Nigahban Welfare Association conducted two Colonoscopy handson workshops in March and November 2013 at Endoscopic Suite of Surgical Unit 4, Civil Hospital. The participants operated on patients under the direct supervision of Dr. Waqar Ahmed, Consultant Gastro-enterologist & Physician, Gwynedd Hospital, Wales U.K. and Dr. Paul Hagan, Consultant Colonoscopist of Kings Mills Hospital, Mansfield, and Nottinghamshire. On the occasion, Dr. Paul Hagan said that 'Greater success and comfort come from a better understanding and practice of the procedure.'
