# A Sin Against A Brother Is A Sin Against Christ Sunday PM 02/09/20

#### Introduction:

**1 Corinthians 8.12** There are certain passages that cuts to the heart of the matter very quickly. In speaking of the eating of meats sacrificed to idols, Paul lays down a number of guidelines of when to and when not to eat the meat. But then, he gets to a big important principle. We need to think about the other person but even more than that.

### I) The Principle

- A) We have a relationship to and with our brother.
  - 1. Did Cain have a relationship with Abel? *Genesis 4.9* 
    - a. Involved what to do and what not to do with Abel.
    - b. Certainly involved not killing his brother.
  - 2. What was the relationship between Joseph and his brothers?
    - a. Did they sin against him by throwing him into a pit and selling him into slavery?
    - b. They admitted their guilt, *Genesis 42.21*.
- B) We can expand that relationship to Christians and their fellow Christians.
  - 1. What is our duty, relationship to those who fall prey to sin? *Galatians 6.2*.

2. What is our relationship to our brothers and sisters when it comes to worship? *Hebrews* 10.24,25.

# C) Going one step further the scriptures says a sin against a brother is a sin against Christ. 1 Corinthians 8.12

- 1. Speaking of the judgment Jesus said to help others is to help him and to neglect others is to neglect Him, *Matthew 25.40*
- 2. Paul in persecuting Christians was persecuting Jesus, *Acts 9.1-5*.
- 3. Going back to **1** Corinthians **8.11** Paul points out that Jesus died for that other person just as much as He died for you.
- 4. Therefore we need to be concerned about sinning against a brother.
- 5. Let us point out some ways we might do so.

#### II) Ways To Sin Against A Brother

- A) By setting a bad example.
  - 1. This is the lesson from our text. **1** Corinthians **8.1-13**.
  - 2. Our example can cause someone to do something they should not, i.e. violate their conscience.
  - 3. It is a serious thing to cause someone to be lost. *Matthew 18.6*.
    - a. Perhaps by your manner of speech, or having a "I don't care attitude toward your work, family, religion."

- b. Everyone has someone watching them.
- 4. We need to be living in such a way that we can tell someone to follow our example. **1** *Timothy* **4.12**

### B) By forsaking him in time of trouble.

- 1. The disciples forsook Christ when He was on the cross.
- 2. Demas forsook Paul, **2** *Timothy* **4.10**.
- 3. There are generally two types of people when help is needed, those who run to help, and those who run from helping.
  - a. Think about the parable of the Good Samaritan in *Luke 10.30-37*.
  - b. Everyone had the same opportunity to help but only one did.
- 4. Helping one another is the practice of pure religion, *James 1.27*.

### C) By refusing to forgive, *Luke 17.1-4*

- I have known Christians to say they could never forgive someone or, if they ever did that to me, I could never forgive them.
- 2. Such is truly a dangerous thing to say.
- 3. Forgiveness is commanded.
- 4. To not forgive could result in the other person giving up and falling deeper into sin, **2** Corinthians **2.6,7**.

## D) By neglecting to restore one overtaken in a fault. Galatians 6.1.

- 1. Jesus in the parable of the lost sheep, spoke of the shepherd going to find the one lost sheep, *Luke 15.4*.
- 2. Points out the value that one sheep had to the shepherd.
- 3. How much to you value, love, me? Enough to try and restore me if I fell into sin?

### E) By failing to preach/teach the Gospel to the lost

- 1. This is the work of the church. Who will do it if we don't?
- 2. The Gospel is God's power to save, *Romans* **1.16.** 
  - a. I remember Grover Stevens baptizing me but I remember even more the Bible classes and sermons that were preached.
  - b. For almost every baptism there was someone teaching the lost sinner.

#### **Conclusion:**

Don't sin against Christ by rejecting Him, John 12.48.
