Are You "Snow Globing" Or "Snow Manning" Jesus?

For those Christians out there I would challenge you to read your Bible daily, be like those people at Berea, "These were more fair-minded than those in Thessalonica, in that they received the word with all readiness, and searched the Scriptures daily to find out whether these things were so." (Acts 17:11) Seek the Lord your God with all your heart, mind and soul as Jesus said, "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the law?" 37 Jesus said to him," 'You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind.'
