## **Unequal Justice**

The above title seems to be an impossibility. How can justice be just and at the same time be unequal? I really don't know. However, I have noticed that people often want two things that are opposite at the same time. A number of events over the years happen to illustrate what I am referring to.

A student in Texas had been in jail five days for writing a paper about killing some friends and a teacher. That sounds pretty bad, right? However, the student's paper was in response to an assignment the teacher had given. She wanted her class to write a paper about killing somebody. The student did so and read it out loud for the class. I might add, the teacher wanted the young man to read the paper to the class. She was apparently impressed and gave the student an "A". Afterward, the teacher got to thinking about it and decided to let the principle read the paper. The principle decided to call the local sheriff to let him read the paper. I bet you know where this is headed. The sheriff decided to arrest the boy for breaking the law. Is there something wrong with this picture? What about the teacher making such an assignment? We have tried to stress to our children the importance of what they say at school, especially with the shootings over the last number of years. Now we have a teacher assigning a paper requiring the student to do exactly what they are told not to do. What about the student's freedom of speech? I wonder if the student would have been arrested for writing about conducting an abortion?

Our society wants things that are contradictory. They want a drug free society, but glamorize alcohol. They want people to act in a responsible manner, but reward those who break the laws. We want fairness, but then complain because somebody has fairly beaten us. We want morality, but are not willing to condemn immoral behavior. We want our preachers to be stern, but not to step on anyone's toes. We want to have standards, but not have absolute values. We have lost our common sense. Lastly, we turn around and act as if it is God's fault that bad things happen. Why has God allowed all these bad things to happen? The real question is, "Why does man do these bad things?"
