MAIDENS, MALLARDS & MARSHES: A WOMEN'S WATERFOWL EXPERIENCE

In December, wildHERness partnered with <u>Sky</u> <u>Panda Outdoors</u> and <u>Butler County Delta</u> <u>Waterfowl</u> to put on the very first Maidens, Mallards and Marshes: Women's Waterfowl Experience. The four wildHERness founders packed their waders and headed to Eldorado, KS to meet 22 other attendees who ranged in experience from first timers to intermediate waterfowlers. One attendee, Raylene Proto, CEO and founder of Ditale Outdoor Apparel, even came all the way from California for her first duck hunting experience!

Saturday dawned, a chilly but sunny start to the educational segment of the workshop. Participants began with a morning group session provided by local Game Warden, Lt. Jake Speer, who led an open discussion about rules, regulations, and best practices as new waterfowl hunters. Our favorite part was the portion on species identification, as Lt. Speer passed around wings from recent harvests to illustrate morphological differences between species that are commonly used characteristics for identification in the field.

The education and discussion continued as Founders Jess Rice and Jess Banes reviewed ethics, the importance of conservation, how hunting contributes to habitat and species conservation funding, and firearm safety.

During the event the attendees were also able to participate in a silent auction to purchase gear from <u>The Duck Huntress</u> and shop for gear from a fellow attendee and CEO of <u>On</u> <u>the Edge Outdoor Apparel Co.</u>, Dawn Ledeboer. Jess Banes, VP








After a warm chili lunch sponsored by Delta County Waterfowl, we split into groups to observe a waterfowl dog demonstration and get hands-on experience with decoy placement, calling instruction and feedback while using our new calls (provided by Butler Co. DW), setting up blinds, and more firearm safety. We ended the day with some clay target practice, where participants practiced shooting from standing positions and while sitting in layout blinds. WHAT GOOD IS KNOWLEDGE IF NOT SHARED? by Jenny Anderson

Imagine creating a world centered around offering educational outdoor opportunities you always wished you had learned earlier on in life, and making it accessible to the next generation!

What a world that would be – fortunately it's not just an idea! wildHERness is making that world real for all of us and the HuntHER Youth Whitetail Hunt is just one example of how! In partnership with Johnson County Pheasants Forever, a group of wildHERness mentors set out to teach two youth girls how to hunt Missouri Whitetail deer on youth weekend in November. In an effort to involve the whole family unit and effect longterm lifestyle changes, we included a parent of each hunter to teach them and set them up for success in fostering a love for the outdoors.

During our time at Deer Camp we learned about ground blind placement, scent control, deer movement, shot placement, refocusing after a missed shot, and luckily enough, one of our hunters was successful in harvesting a deer, so we had a hands-on opportunity to learn about whitetail deer anatomy through field dressing and quartering!

It's so rewarding to watch a first-time hunter go through each stage of the learning process – which for one hunter meant making a decision that she wasn't prepared to take a shot and to decide to watch a deer walk a feeding pattern rather than shoot and potentially wound the animal. Inevitably, with patience and trust in the process, another deer presented himself along the same feeding pattern and she was able to take that shot that we talked about and prepared for the day before. Although this wasn't a "textbook" hunt – she missed her first shot – this was a perfect first hunt, because she had two wildly supportive and capable mentors whispering to take a deep breath, reset in the scope, and pull the trigger again. This moment is not an experience I had as a young adult learning to hunt; while it wasn't intentional, it was pivotal in showing her how to reset in a moment and I hope a moment that lives with her forever as a reminder to simply try again!

Whether you're looking for an event geared towards a goal you set for yourself or something you want help teaching your child – wildHERness has the same desire to pass on a love for the outdoors – no experience needed! Anyway, what good is knowledge if not shared?

The only legacy we can collectively pass on to future generations, the wild places, wild spaces, and wild things of the Great Outdoors are absolutely worth conserving.

To honor this belief, we created "Conservation Conversations: A Pint Night Series", in partnership with Artemis Sportswomen in Missouri. Discussion leaders will come from a variety of sources: state and local government organizations, conservation organization leaders, commissioners, legislators. Topics will range from policy updates, public lands management, wildlife biology, to local conservation efforts, resource awareness, ethics and regulations. One thing we've noticed, no matter where our experiences take us, is that most women across the US have a story of a time where they walked into an outdoor retailer and were ignored, belittled, or intimidated. Or, even more degrading....asked if they were there to buy something for their husband.

Our new column is dedicated to those outdoor industry customer service associates that make sure you leave with a positive experience, and will highlight retail workers that share knowledge and respect us simply



as outdoorswomen.

He provided both Sharenda and the employee with very helpful options to consider, and she walked away happy. Several weeks later, she returned to the store to purchase her waders from Dan.

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Observations of An Archery Instructor By Marsha Riley

I love most things outdoors and attempt to spend as much time as possible there. As people who know me can attest, one of my deepest loves is teaching archery. I love to get people involved in this great sport. Over the years I have observed the following misconceptions that needed clarification for new sisters of the bow.



• You do not need the latest and greatest (and most expensive) equipment to learn and enjoy archery. Used gear is just fine if it has been inspected and is in good condition. You <u>do</u> need equipment that fits you and you should work with someone who knows what they are talking about when you gear up. If you want to hunt, and for most of us that means whitetails and turkeys, you do not need a 70 lb. bow to hunt. Nothing ruins the process faster than trying to manage a bow that you physically cannot handle. Bows that are too heavy can cause many bad habits.

- Work with an instructor that loves to teach. Find an instructor that is patient and understands new archers.
- Practice, practice, practice. Learn how to practice!! This is important!
- You do not have to be a hunter to enjoy archery. 3D shoots, various competitions, and archery as a social activity are other ways.
- Plan to fall in love with this ancient sport.
