The Rent Moratorium that allowed renters to pay rent or not pay rent at all without any adverse consequences will be extended through Wednesday June 30th, 2021. Rent is due by on the 1st day of July, 2021 and will be considered late after the 7th day of the month. Any unpaid balance on the 8th day of the month is charged a late fee, and a termination notice for non-payment may be issued. If you have trouble paying your rent, speak with your property manager. If you have an outstanding balance due to reduced income from the pandemic, we will work with you by providing you a fair and affordable Repayment Agreement. NATIONAL CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH

We believe that every child has a right to a safe childhood free of violence. April, Child Abuse Awareness and Prevention Month, is an important time to start the conversation in our communities about how we can keep our children safe.

The first federal piece of legislation to protect children from abuse and neglect, the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA), was passed in 1974. In 1982, Congress took further steps toward identifying and preventing child abuse and recognized the first Child Abuse Prevention Week. Shortly after, the first National Child Abuse Prevention Month was designated in April. Since those early days, the focus on recognition and prevention has widened to include promoting healthy parenting and strong families through education and community support.

By rallying our neighbors, business, schools, friends and families, we can make a difference in the lives of children across the country. By promoting safety, awareness and dialogue, we can prevent abuse from happening in the first place and help keep our children safe.

Children rely on others to be their voice. Here are some ways we can all help to be safe adults:

- Believe children when they have told you something personal.
- Knowing hotlines and other resource information
- Letting children know that HAMC is a safe environment and they are always welcome to contact a member of HAMC staff directly to report abuse or concerns.

HELPFUL REMINDERS AND TIPS

LEASE REMINDERS

1. Pet Policy (Resident Handbook Section C. 4) : If you are a resident known for feeding stray animals (dogs, cats, etc.), you need to comply with the pet policy guidelines which include a **\$200 pet deposit**. If you are not housing an animal but still feeding it, it can causes various pest on the property and can further cause health and safety issues to our residents. Thank you for your understanding.

2.Child Supervision (Section X, x): Parents and guardians are responsible for the actions of their children. If your child damages Housing Authority property or another resident property, the parent or guardian is held responsible. If your child is experiencing behavior problems due to extenuating circumstance, speak to your property manager or guidance counselor at his/her school for help for your child and parenting tips for you. CHILDREN UNDER 12 MAY NOT BE LEFT ALONE AT HOME FOR ANY PERIOD OF TIME, AND ALL CHILDREN MUST BE SUPERVISED WHEN OUTSIDE. Please limit the number of toys kept outside your apartment. Throw away ones that are no longer used or broken in trash can.

3. Grills and Firepits (Section XVII d.13 and Resident Handbook): Barbeque grills shall be placed away from building while in use. Coals and ashes shall be cold and disposed of properly. Never dump ashes upon the grounds. Firepits are NOT permitted on any property whatsoever.

4. Outdoor Furniture (Section X, s): Only use furniture specifically designed for outdoor use may be used in yards and other outdoor areas

5. Smoking: Smoking of any kind is prohibited in any HAMC property building. If you would like to smoke cigarettes , you need to be 25 feet away from the property as well as dispose of any related items (i.e. cigarette butts) one you are done.

MAINTENANCE TIPS

- IMPORTANT: Do not flush wipes down the toilet! THEY ARE NOT FLUSHABLE! They clog the drain which will cause a nasty overflow in your bathroom. And will cost you \$22/hour to clean out the drain. Our drains simply cannot handle the wipes.
- 2. REMINDER: All trash MUST be thrown inside of the dumpster. This includes couches, mattresses, all trash, lamps, etc. In addition, please make sure that your trash is not left in shopping carts and the shopping carts are put back by the dumpster once they are no longer in use.
- 3. REMINDER: Bikes need to be put on bike racks. They cannot be left on sidewalks or outside of apartments.
- 4. IMPORTANT: Please make sure to register your bike and receive a bike tag. Registering and receiving a bike tag is free and can be done at the beginning of April at all properties by Friday, April 23rd. If you do not claim your bike by May, 1st they will be removed.

The Housing Authority is NOW offering a new payment option for our residents. The link to pay online is **www.mcdonoughhousing.org.** This will direct you to GovCard online portal. Through this payment portal, residents will be able to pay rent and other charges with a debit card, credit card or with an e-check. <u>GovCard does</u> <u>charge the payer a fee to use their online portal.</u> Residents do not have to use the online portal. We will still accept your payment in person or through the mail. Payments in person may also be made with a debit card or credit card, and the GovCard fee would still apply.

HOW TO FILL OUT A MONEY ORDER

The HAMC understands that filling out money orders can sometimes be a little confusing and because of this we have decided to provide our residents with a helpful guide to make it easier.

1. Who you're paying: Like filling out a check, you have to designate a specific recipient on each money order. Write the name of the person or organization to whom you're sending money on the line that says some variation of "Pay to" or "Pay to the order of." (example: If you are paying your rent, on this line you would write: HAMC.)

2. Address: After writing the name of the recipient, add your residential address on the designated space. Some money order forms ask you to list the recipient's address as well.

3. Detailed Info: Like checks, personal money orders have a line to write a note to the beneficiary. If you're sending a birthday check to your sister, write a memo like, "Happy 25th birthday." **If it's a rent check to your landlord, write your apartment number**. If you're paying a bill, include your account number so the company can credit your account accordingly.

4. Signature: Once you've filled out the money order, sign it and hand it to the cashier. Please make sure that your signature is a legible as possible so that the recipient can property read it and apply your payment.

5. Keep your receipt: A receipt is proof that you sent the money order, which is handy if you're paying rent or other bills. You can also use the receipt to cancel a money order, like if you find out you've been scammed. If a money order is lost, the receipt will help you recoup the money and purchase a new money order.

LET'S FIGHT COVID19 TOGETHER

As Illinois continues in the 4th stage of recovery during the coronavirus pandemic, we want to remind our residents to continue to be vigilant about the health and safety of ourselves and others.

Please remember to wash your hands with soap and water often. As stated by the Center of Disease Control, 20 seconds is the proper amount of time to you should spend handwashing to properly rid of bacteria. QUICK TIP: If you sing the "Happy Birthday" song twice while washing your hands, its equal to 20 seconds. So, get your singing voice ready!

Aside from handwashing, we continue to ask our residents to wear their masks and respect social distancing guidelines by staying 6ft. apart when possible and to only go out when absolutely necessary. Also, if you are not feeling well, we kindly ask that you stay home.

We understand that is a very different time for everyone, but we appreciate your flexibility and continued understanding.

Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
