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

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On July 23, 2018, Bluegrass Anonymous was awarded a grant from Imagine Greater Louisville 2020. Imagine Greater Louisville 2020 (administered by the Fund for the Arts) is a blueprint for the

future of Greater Louisville's arts and culture. Thanks to funding support from the Jennifer Lawrence Foundation, ten non-profit

organizations will receive nearly \$50,000 to fund projects that will take place in counties surrounding Jefferson County in the coming year. President Rebecca Minnick and Secretary Sonya Cotton attended the award presentation at the offices of the Fund for the Arts.

This marks the first time that BA has received a grant from an arts funding organization. BA is a 501-c-3 non-profit organization.

This grant will provide support for Bluegrass Anonymous, in partnership with Clarksville Parks & Recreation, to produce two free concert events scheduled to take place in November 2018 and May 2019 at Lapping Park in Clark County, Indiana. Details will be announced in future issues of the Pickin' Post.

July 15, 2018 marked the end of a life and musical journey of one of Kentucky's finest singer songwriters. Mickey Clark, who triumphantly persevered through the vast majority of a two year battle with stage four pancreatic cancer, and passed peacefully in his home, surrounded by loved ones. Clark was most recently known, especially in the Louisville area, as a down to earth, working musician, often playing three or four nights a week in the local scene. Over the course of his nearly sixty year career, beginning at Purdue University in 1962, he carried his songs across North America, including the Chicago, and Toronto folk scenes, Greenwich Village in New York, throughout the midwest and southeast and a long stint writing and publishing in Nashville, TN.

Friends that knew him best, thought of Clark as a sort of musical "Forrest Gump", having made connections, and kindled friendships with folks like Gordon Lightfoot, Billy Joe Shaver, Jerry Jeff Walker, Sam Bush, and John Prine along the way. He even received high praise from Bob Dylan in an interview with Rolling Stone in the 1970s, ten days after a performance at a Chicago folk club.

In addition to being an immensely talented vocalist and band leader, Mickey Clark's most enduring legacy may be in the songs he penned for recording artists like The Oak Ridge Boys, Tompall & the Glaser Brother, Kingston Trio, Jerry Lee Lewis, Glen Yarbrough, and the list goes on and on. Clark's own recording career will live on in three full length albums, and countless singles, working with "A-list" studio musicians, legendary music producers including Turley Richards and Jim Rooney, and also with his "Blue Norther" band.

Mickey Clark is survived by his wife Sandy, son Brennan, and an entire community of friends and family who loved him.

Mickey became a great songwriter as a storyteller and through that he developed a devoted following of people in Louisville. I love Mickey like a brother, and miss him everyday.

These musicians are elected by their dedication to

preserving bluegrass music, their commitment to growing and developing as professional musicians, their musical achievements and accomplishments, their focus on blessing people through music and their example of good character. The youngsters in TBS are some of the most polite, wellmannered, respectful, helpful and humble young people you will meet. TBS offers ways for these young musicians and their families to interact and get to know each other, to help show off these young folks'



wonderful God given talents and to promote opportunities within the bluegrass community through exposure, interaction, education, showcasing talent, mentoring, networking, resources, connections and events. TBS has an online community, website and merchandise to promote the cause of youngsters in bluegrass.
