November is a time when our thoughts often go toward gratitude and thanksgiving. I am grateful for the opportunity I've had to live in the Slate Belt for the past thirteen years, and one of the many reasons I'm grateful for this area is the strong Ministerium we have.

The Slate Belt Ministerium is a loose association of many of the churches across the Slate Belt. About a dozen or so clergy get together once a month for breakfast, and we talk about how things are going in our congregations and in the area, and how we can work together to make a difference. We share information about projects and ideas.

We also hold a Community Thanksgiving service each year. This is a great opportunity for churches that are so different! We may have different beliefs on a host of topics, we may have very different worship styles, but one thing that all of the churches can agree on is the importance of **giving thanks to God for all of God's good gifts.** And so we worship **together** on the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

If you haven't attended the Community Thanksgiving service before, this is the year to try it. Because we're doing it a little differently. Instead of one of the churches hosting the service, we will worship together at The HUB, the community center at 14 Broadway in downtown Bangor. We are hoping that this change of venue will spark some interest, and bring more people from more of our congregations to join in. I encourage you to join us! We know that parking can be challenging in downtown Bangor, and we are working to find a solution – we may be offering a shuttle service from a nearby church's parking lot. Watch for info about that.

We are also planning to offer a Community Blue Christmas Service on December 21, also at the HUB. Many of you have attended Blue Christmas at Prince of Peace, and you know how meaningful that service can be for those who are suffering at the holidays. Prince of Peace will not hold our own Blue Christmas service this year, but we will participate in the Ministerium's service. I hope you can join us.

We are holding both services in the afternoon so that driving in the dark isn't a concern. Both services will be followed by a time of fellowship and refreshments. Please consider joining us.




Community Thanksgiving Service



All Saints Sunday



All Saints Sunday, November 2, is a day we remember the faithful who have died in Christ in the past year, and the newly baptized. We are reminded that all the faithful are saints. All remembrances received for All Saints' Day will be included in the December Newsletter.



Prayer is a very important thing to Christians. One form of prayer is **intercessory prayer**, in which we *intercede* for someone before God. We pray to God for that person to heal, or find peace, or receive hope.

Two ways that we engage in intercessory prayer at Prince of Peace are through the **Prayer List** and the **Prayer Chain**. I want to let you know what both of these are.

The **Prayer List** is the list of people we find in our announcement folder each week. We also pray for them by name during worship. Normally, names are kept on the list for four weeks, although I'm happy to make exceptions to that when requested. **To put a name on the Prayer List, just contact me.**

The **Prayer Chain** is a group of volunteers who pray for people throughout the week. This is especially helpful when some emergency comes up, or something else very time sensitive. The way it works is this: the first person on the prayer chain prays for the person and then calls the next person on the list. They pray for the person and call the next person. And so on. **To put a name on the Prayer Chain, contact Petrina Billger** (You can also contact me, and I'll let Petrina know.)

Please know that the Prayer List and Prayer Chain are separate things. You can certainly put a name on both, but that doesn't happen automatically.

Thank you to all who help make these prayer ministries happen at Prince of Peace! – Pastor Scholtes

Do Justice, Love Kindness, Walk Humbly: The Work of the Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania

In a well-known scripture, the prophet Micah proclaims, "He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (NRSV Micah 6:8) It has been pointed out that we Lutherans often are more comfortable loving justice and doing kindness; that is, we find satisfaction in feeding hungry people but shy away from calling out and addressing the root causes of hunger and poverty. For the past 46 years, Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania (LAMPa) – funded in part by your mission support giving – has taken up the important, but daunting task of working to change systems that perpetuate inequity and injustice.

LAMPa's staff – Tracey DePasquale, Director, and Pastor Erin Jones, Communications and Advocacy Engagement Manager, joined this year by Hunger Advocacy Fellow, Daniella Garber – work with a Policy Council composed of representatives of



2025 Lutheran Day at the Capitol

Pennsylvania's seven synods, the United Lutheran Seminary, and a synod bishop to develop a biennial Policy Agenda that guides our church's engagement with state legislators and departments in the governor's office.

The current Policy Agenda includes the following priorities:

- Hunger: improving access to healthy, affordable food;
- Creation Care: advocating for laws that protect clean air, water, and land;
- Poverty: addressing homelessness and housing insecurity;
- Education: working toward adequate and equitable school funding;
- Healthcare: working to ensure all Pennsylvanians have access to affordable care;
- Civil Rights: working to reduce hate crime and safeguard the right to vote;
- Immigration: standing for welcome to our newest neighbors; and
- Violence Reduction: addressing the root causes of violence, including trauma and extreme poverty.

The LAMPa staff and Policy Council pursue this ambitious agenda in several ways:

- By forming and participating in coalitions with leaders of other denominations, faithbased organizations, and community groups that are passionate about these same issues:
- By engaging with state legislators and those who work in the governor's office. regardless of party affiliation, to advance measures that benefit all Pennsylvanians;
- And, most important, by equipping and supporting the members of the 1,050 ELCA congregations in Pennsylvania so that each of us becomes more confident expressing our faith in the Good News of Jesus by becoming bold advocates for a just and

compassionate society. The widely used Bonhoeffer curriculum is just one example of this.
