

Prints of Peace



Throughout Advent this year, we will look at various characters from the Christmas story, and wonder just what they were *waiting for*. We'll look at the wise men, the shepherds, Mary, and even the angels. Each of these characters were living in a world that was incomplete and broken, and yet, each in their own way, they found healing – hope, peace, and joy – in the coming of Christ.

Each Sunday, we will hear two passages from the gospels: the story of one of these "waiting" characters, and also one of the four majestic canticles that Luke presents in his gospel. Through musical choices and preaching, we will hold these two passages of scripture up as signs that point us to the good news that is always coming, even today, the good news of Christ.

Each week, we will sing the strong Advent message of waiting and hope. And in this year, when we are all so looking for hope, we will also bend the rules a bit to sing at least one beloved Christmas song each week.

We are also offering two extra services for those who would like to participate. First, on the Second Sunday of Advent, December 5, we will offer the Rite of Healing *before* worship for any who wish to receive healing. Simply come to the nave between 8:45 and 9:15 that morning, and you will have the opportunity to receive laying on of hands and anointing with oil (adapted for COVID precautions), and then stay for the regular 9:45 worship. This will be an "open house" kind of atmosphere – if you prefer, you can simply come in for five minutes, or stay the whole time. Whatever works for you. You will be welcome to come and go as you please – just please be quiet and mindful of others.

Second, on the Fourth Sunday of Advent, December 19, we will offer our annual Blue Christmas service for those who find the holidays difficult this year. That service will be held at 3:00 pm. All are welcome. The structure of this season has been informed by the responses received from the online poll taken in October, "What kind of healing do you need this year?" Thanks to all who responded.

CHRISTMAS EVE PLAN

Prince of Peace will host two Christmas Eve services, at 3:30 pm and 6:30 pm on Friday, December 24, 2021. These services will be the same, and will be packed with Christmas music that we will sing together. We will hear the Christmas story, share communion, and sing Silent Night by candlelight. In order to keep attendance to a safe number, attendance in the nave (sanctuary) will be limited to 75 attendees at each service (in addition to worship leaders). **Reservations are required**. The reservation system will be **online**, beginning **December 1**. You will be able to find it at our website at popbangor.org. Information will also go out at that time on Facebook and via PastorMail. If you do not have internet access, you may call the church office beginning December 1 to reserve your seats. If both services fill up with reservations, we will add a third service. Walk-ins without reservations may be asked to sit in the Fellowship Hall, and participate via closed-circuit television.

PRINCE OF PEACE EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH, BANGOR, PA CURRENT COVID PROTOCOLS

Our goal is to create a safe, welcoming worship experience for all people. As faithful stewards of God's Word and responsible members of our community, we encourage all members and visitors to adhere to the CDC guidelines regarding the COVID-19 pandemic. Each individual has a personal responsibility to act according to the current CDC guidelines and Prince of Peace protocols listed here for the health and safety of all.

Worship is currently held in person on Sundays at 9:45 am.

Current CDC guidance will be followed for all worship services on the church grounds. Because CDC guidance is ever changing, the most recent CDC guidelines will prevail, despite postings or other protocols at Prince of Peace. CDC guidance as of *November 5*, 2021:

Vaccinated members/attendees have the option to remain unmasked indoors.

Unvaccinated members/attendees over age 2 must wear masks while indoors.

Vaccinated individuals who have had a close contact with a COVID positive individual are encouraged to self-monitor for COVID symptoms and contact their health care provider for guidance on testing (in most cases 5-7 days after exposure.) Vaccinated individuals can be in public settings masked for 14 days following exposure or until a negative test result is received.

Unvaccinated individuals who have had a close contact with a COVID positive individual are encouraged to self-monitor for symptoms, self-quarantine at home for 14 days, and contact their health care provider for guidance on testing (in most cases, testing is recommended immediately and 5-7 days after exposure- *per guidance updated October 27*, 2021.)

Anyone with the symptoms of COVID, regardless of known or unknown exposure, is encouraged to remain home, self-monitor, and contact their health care provider for guidance on testing and treatment.

Face masks are strongly recommended for all attendees, regardless of vaccination status, to protect the vulnerable as we are considered an area of high transmission.

Social distancing is encouraged. Some pews are marked "unavailable." Our current typical attendance allows for all to worship in the nave. If more people attend than the nave would safely allow, overflow seating will be available in the Fellowship Hall, with worship displayed on closed circuit television.

We have begun to sing together again. Masks are required while singing.

Holy Communion is celebrated weekly, in an altered style using pre-packaged communion cups.

Every effort is made to record the worship service and share it via YouTube. We feel it is important to offer our members choices that allow them to worship and stay safe. This service will be offered as long as time, technology, and talents allow. Sunday worship is generally available on Mondays before noon.

MEETINGS/OTHER EVENTS/STAFF

Congregation committees and other groups within the congregation (including our chartered BSA Scout groups) may meet in any normal meeting room in the building; there are no scheduling restrictions at this time. Meetings must be scheduled ahead of time with the church office (610-588-2355 or poplicbangor@gmail.com). Masks are recommended and mandatory for unvaccinated individuals. At the end of the meeting, Groups that meet are responsible to wipe down all surfaces touched, with wipes provided in each room. (Groups may choose to wipe down before meetings as well.)

Current CDC guidance will be followed by all groups, meetings, and employees on the church grounds.

Because CDC guidance is ever changing, the most recent CDC guidelines will prevail, despite postings or other protocols at Prince of Peace. CDC guidance as of *November 5*, 2021:

Vaccinated individuals have the option to remain unmasked indoors.

Unvaccinated individuals over age 2 must wear masks while indoors.

Vaccinated individuals who have had a close contact with a COVID positive individual are encouraged to self-monitor for COVID symptoms and contact their health care provider for guidance on testing (in most cases 5-7 days after exposure.) Vaccinated individuals can be in public settings, masked for 14 days following exposure or until a negative test result is received.

Unvaccinated individuals who have had a close contact with a COVID positive individual are encouraged to self-monitor for symptoms, self-quarantine at home for 14 days, and contact their health care provider for guidance on testing (in most cases, testing is recommended immediately and 5-7 days after exposure- *per guidance updated October 27*, 2021.)

Anyone with the symptoms of COVID, regardless of known or unknown exposure, is encouraged to remain home, self-monitor, and contact their health care provider.

Eating and drinking is not recommended. The kitchen is off-limits to all groups.

No outside groups are permitted to meet in the building at this point.

The Reopening Task Force (Justine Cesari, Pastor Michael Scholtes, Marlene Stana, Denny Horn and Kathy Williams) will be responsible to check the CDC guidelines for updates and changes every month. 





Our annual meeting was attended by 44 members on November 21, 2021. Here are the highlights:


- 1. Bylaw change ratified for the office of Treasurer

- 5. Connie Itterly and Kale Baker will be the representatives to Synod assembly


Here are a few updates from the Reopening Task Force:

"Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord ... you will find a baby ... lying in a manger." Luke 2: 9, 11, 12


They saw, they listened, and then they went to see for themselves. After receiving the Good News, they spread it.
