We're in the middle of our Stewardship Campaign right now, which runs from January 12 through February 9. The theme of our campaign this year is "The (Im)possible Promise of Enough." I present them here to you as a reminder of the amazing, (im)possible promises God has made to us.



"By Heart" – An Adult Course on Lutheranism

I will be offering a course entitled "By Heart: Conversations with Martin Luther's Small Catechism." This course is designed for all adults and teenagers who want to dive more deeply into the faith we share as Lutherans. *The Small Catechism* is a small but mighty book that Martin Luther wrote in 1529, to teach children and others the faith. It still forms the basis of Confirmation education in Lutheran congregations in the 21st century. And while *The Small Catechism* is simple enough for children to grasp, it's also rich enough to explore for a lifetime.

This course does *not* require expertise in Lutheranism or the Bible. It does require a mind open to asking and pondering questions, and a heart open to exploring God's grace.

We will meet for seven sessions of 90 minutes each. At each session, we will dive into a chapter in the book *By Heart*, watch a video, and have a lively discussion. At the end of each session, you will have both a deeper understanding of *The Small Catechism*, as well as a deeper insight into your own faith. The course will be offered both in-person and on Zoom.

The course requires a copy of the book, which I can order for you for \$18. (Or you may find a used copy cheaper online yourself.) Please sign-up on the narthex counter, or by emailing me, by February 10.

The course will begin on Wednesday, February 19, and run through Wednesday, April 9. 6:30 - 8 p.m. each Wednesday evening. We will take March 5 off, because it is Ash Wednesday.

PRINCE OF PEACE EV. LUTHERAN CHURCH, BANGOR, PA NARRATIVE OF SUPPORT – 2025

The Ongoing Purpose and Passion of Prince of Peace

The purpose statement of Prince of Peace is this: **"We the people of Prince of Peace Evangelical Lutheran Church will actively seek and serve Christ in all people."** In the past year, we have recognized more and more that we are living this out right now through being the **"Helpers' Helpers."** We are not on the front lines. But we support those who are. We continue to make a tremendous difference through the way we support PUMP, the foster program, Slater Family Network, and more. We believe that Christ is at work in many ways outside the church in our community, and we see it as our job to support those who are doing it. We are *serving Christ in the people* who are on the front lines. None of us can do this alone – we continue to remind each other that *none of us is expected to individually support all of these opportunities*. It's as a *community* that we make the difference we do.

Impact Beyond Our Budget

We've talked about how being the *Helpers' helpers* is our impact on the community *beyond our budget*. We use almost no church funds for these outreach endeavors. The difference we make is because of your generosity *beyond* giving directly to the church. Thank you! And yet, the congregation continues to be the "home base," the *infrastructure*, for this. We have the gift of worship, the gift of pastoral care, the gift of a building where items can be stored and sent from, the gift of evangelism to grow our faith community, the gift of education. We have a pastoral leader who is connected with both the wider church and the community. We have all *these* things thanks to the grace of God, and through your generous gifts *directly to Prince of Peace*. Thank you! *The budget of Prince of Peace provides the infrastructure that allows the greater ministry to occur.*

We make a difference in the world because we have these three things: a strong *infrastructure*, a *generosity* above and beyond that infrastructure, and the *abundance* of God's grace alive in us. This Narrative of Support concerns the *infrastructure*, the congregation itself and our assets (such as building and staff).

The Status of our Infrastructure

2024 has been a very hopeful year for Prince of Peace financially. At this point, our infrastructure is funded primarily from three sources: through our **offerings**, through **fundraisers**, and through disbursements from our **Endowment Fund**. All three of these sources are experiencing increases.

- Thanks in part to a surprise return to the Blue Valley Farm Show, our *fundraiser* income in 2024 was the highest it's been in years.
- Thanks to the substantial gift from Marion Messinger, our *Endowment disbursement* for 2025 will be unprecedented.
- And most importantly, you responded to our call last year for an increase in offerings. As of the end of September, we are on track for a 7.5% increase in offerings for the year, well above our goal of 5%. <u>THANK YOU!!!</u>

Moving into 2025

With diligence, our infrastructure will remain strong. What will that take? For one thing, it will take **continued dedication to fundraising.** With your help, we will continue to staff these important events, and we have to continue to grow at recruiting people to staff them.

Secondly, it will take **wise use of Endowment sub funds**. The sub funds we approved for 2025 will continue to provide resources to take care of our infrastructure, with a focus on our building, our land, our paid and volunteer leaders, and our technological tools. In fact, these sub funds are providing for a *reduction* in budgeted expenses. (For instance, the Technology *budget line* has been reduced, because we expect to pay for any new technology from the *Technology Sub Fund* instead of from the *Current Fund*.)

And thirdly, it will take a continued dedication to your giving. The budget for 2025 targets an increase in offerings of about 3%. This is a modest increase, close to the expected cost of living increase. We need your help to reach that target. *Could you consider the possibility of growing your giving by 3% in 2025?*

Dreaming of the Future

We envision a future where we are solely financed by our offerings, a future where fundraising and Endowment money can be used primarily for *outreach* and *growing our ministry*. We are already taking steps in that direction. One of our Endowment sub funds for 2025, the "Helpers' Helpers Sub Fund," will be providing matching grants for many of our outreach programs in the coming year. And POP's Treasures, our successful monthly boutique, has committed to using the majority of its income for outreach. These are good steps – imagine if we could fund our infrastructure with just offerings. Imagine how much more outreach we could accomplish. (How many more "Helpers" could we "help"?)

So, if you are in a position to do so, we encourage you to consider an even bigger increase to your giving, to help us get there. *If it's possible in your budget, could you consider the possibility of growing your giving by 5%, 10%, even 20% in 2025?*

Thank you for your generosity in the past, and your continued generosity in the future. Your generosity is the key to us continuing to spread the good news of God's love.

The Endowment Trustees would like to announce the year end balances and 2025 Sub Fund allocations for the Endowment Fund. The following policy, concerning "POP'S TREASURES," was adopted at the December 2024 congregation council meeting. There will be an informational meeting after worship on Sunday, February 16 to answer any questions about this policy.

POP'S TREASURES POLICY

POP's Treasures is a ministry of Prince of Peace that began in the spring of 2023, after being approved by congregation council in March 2023. POP's Treasures is a monthly boutique that raises money for outreach. Since its creation, POP's Treasures has grown far more quickly than expected, and this document outlines a plan for how to manage this important ministry in our multi-use building going forward.

GOVERNANCE

The "POP's Treasures Committee" will be established as a standing committee of the congregation. As such, they will be assigned a council liaison and will be expected to report regularly to the council, and annually to the congregation in the Annual Report. POP's Treasures will be staffed by volunteers. Some of these volunteers may be from outside the congregation, but oversight will always be by POP's Treasures Committee members.

POP's Treasures operates two days a month, generally the second Friday and Saturday. This schedule should be set annually and provided to both council and the parish administrator.

ROOMS & STORAGE

The four back rooms (#10 - 13), and the adjacent hallways, are allocated for POP's Treasures use at all times. POP's Treasures may also use approximately half of the Fellowship Hall during their sales as necessary. This may be set up ahead of time, but use of the Fellowship Hall for other church functions takes precedence over POP's Treasures up until the Tuesday before the sale. POP's Treasures takes precedence for the Fellowship Hall from the Wednesday prior to the sale, until 2:00 pm on the Saturday of the sale. In certain circumstances, there may be flexibility at the discretion of the POP's Treasures Committee.

The large closets are not to be used by POP's Treasures without prior approval by congregation council.

The four back rooms are normally kept locked. A key shall be kept in the church key-box.

Two large trailers are set up outside the church building for the use of POP's Treasures for storage.

ITEMS FOR SALE

Items for sale at POP's Treasures are donations from the congregation and the community. The POP's Treasures Committee will see that times are scheduled and announced to receive such items.

CONNECTION TO RUMMAGE SALE

The Fun and Fellowship Committee generally conducts one or two Rummage Sales per year. As the Rummage Sale is similar in some ways to POP's Treasures and utilizes a similar group of volunteers. Items donated to the church may be shared between the two groups. The trailers may be used to store Rummage Sale items with the permission of the POP's Treasures Committee. If a conflict or disagreement arises between the two groups, congregation council will have the final say on settling such disagreement. Holding the two events simultaneously should be avoided.

FINANCES

POP's Treasures shall have its own bank account, with signers from the POP's Treasures Committee and/or congregation council. All income and expenses should be monitored and reported by the church bookkeeper.

The intended purpose of POP's Treasures income is for *outreach*. At the end of each calendar year, at least 50% of the year's net income shall be allocated for outreach. 90% of this outreach amount (thus, at least 45% of the total income) shall be sent to various nonprofit organizations and charities. These might include local charities, ELCA ministries, or others. Organizations and ministries which Prince of Peace supports in other ways (such as through Social Ministry outreach) should be given consideration. The decision on where the year's outreach goes shall be made by the POP's Treasures Committee and reported to congregation council at their next meeting. Disbursements should be reported to the congregation as early as possible in the new year (such as in the newsletter), and also in the Annual Report.

The remaining 10% of the outreach amount shall be saved for use in purchasing some unbudgeted need of the congregation. Such purchases may be recommended by the POP's Treasures Committee but shall be approved by congregation council.

From their remaining amount, POP's Treasures may make purchases throughout the year for supplies, and for improvements, such as furniture, signage, or storage. Such purchases should be approved by the POP's Treasures Committee and reported to congregation council.

POP's Treasures' account shall have a cap of \$100,000. If that cap is exceeded, any excess should be spent on outreach, above the normal 50% for that year.

FUTURE

As POP's Treasures, and the congregation of Prince of Peace, continue to grow and change, alterations to this document may be appropriate. This document should be reviewed regularly and adapted as necessary.

Social Ministry Project:

The VALOR Clinic Foundation provides veteran families in crisis with holiday meals at Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas. They provide a complete day's meals starting with breakfast and ending with dessert. This helps families from having to decide between paying the bills or having a holiday meal. In 2024 on Easter, they provided a complete meal for 125 veteran families, and the number increases each holiday. This committee decided we would help them by collecting 6 of the 21 items needed for a complete meal. The items are: 3 cans green beans; 3 cans of corn (if purchasing the green beans or corn please purchase 3 of each); 1 box stuffing; 1 box cake mix; 1 can frosting, and 1 can pie filling. There will be a basket in the Narthex to place your items in. "1 Peter 4:10 As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace." Engaging the Stranger Within: The Northeastern PA Synod's Racial Justice Work

Growing up in the American South, much of what was taught about racism dealt with historyslavery, annexation, Jim Crow, and integration. What (and how) we were taught in school, and the ways our community and churches remained unofficially segregated were "just the way things were." There was a disconnect between the way things were and *why*. Racism was something that

had happened, and we were living in the status quo of the Civil Rights Movement. And with that history focused so heavily in the South, it was like racism was somehow localized and intensified in that region, and we were more directly impacted by its legacy.

The privilege of my

seminary formation and exposure to different contexts have shown just how limited my awareness of racism's pervasiveness extends. Racism is a part of every community, congregation, home, and heart. It isn't localized more intensely in one place or another. Our communities, workplaces, and churches in Northeastern Pennsylvania face the same legacy and challenges of confronting racist prejudices and practices, even if they expose themselves in different ways. Cultural isolationism, unawareness of our past and current exploitation of the Lenni Lenape and Delaware peoples, emphasis on the immigrant heritage of our congregations while dismissing immigrant communities across the street, and an apathy to acts of violence against persons of color permeates our pews. Confronting personal, local, regional, and national instances of racial prejudice



is as important now as ever. The gospel gives us the assurance that the way things are is not how God calls us to be. To get from here to there, we need help learning what we don't and hearing know. firsthand from our neighbors how we can work together to resist racism.

Through your Mission Support generosity, our Synod has the opportunity to walk together in more intentional ways as we learn about our communities' and congregations' complicity in racial prejudice and work for racial justice. Loving the land we steward in Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod and the people who occupy it, and healing the hurt of our ancestral and contemporary practices, begins with engaging the stranger we do not wish to see in ourselves so that we can better engage the stranger we do not currently see in our neighbors.

Racial Justice Boundary Training for rostered leaders, Synod Council and Staff, and congregational lay leaders has been an invaluable resource for beginning this work in our Synod. In January, we collaborated with Metropolitan Community Church of the Lehigh Valley and our own Synod's LGBTQ Task Force at the Lutheran Center for a day of worship and action called MLK Jr. Day of Prayer and Service. Partnership with Lutheran Advocacy Ministry of Pennsylvania (LAMPa), Liberty Lutheran's MLK Day of Service, and local ecumenical and interfaith agencies committed to the course of justice in our neighborhood are but a few crucial ways we are already naming and confronting racism together as Christ's church, along with our

support of the ELCA's Truth and Healing Movement. All of these endeavors are bolstered by your Mission Support giving, and reflect our shared commitment to growing together as disciples of Jesus who are gospel filled and Spirit led.

Just as the Lord works righteousness and justice for all who are oppressed (Psalm 103:6), so too does God charge the people with upholding the cause of justice for those most vulnerable (Deuteronomy 16:19-20; 24:17). To get involved in our shared work of racial justice and reconciliation, reach out to a member of our Synod's Racial Justice Team, participate in local or regional educational opportunities with partnering colleges and universities, confront practices that reinforce barriers based on race and ethnicity, and have conversations with other disciples in your congregation about how your baptized community can work for justice and peace in in the world.
