Prints of Peace

Over the past few months, we have had a "Generosity Jar" in the narthex. This jar is there for people to write brief stories (just one or a few sentences) about an act of generosity that you recently witnessed or received. We've received a number of great stories, and the Stewardship Committee has announced them in various ways. Thank you for all the great ideas! And thank you for sharing your generosity in so many ways.

However, we've also received two items in the Generosity Jar that were not what we were looking for. At least twice, it has been used by someone (maybe the same person, maybe not) to anonymously write something negative about someone else in the congregation.

I want to be abundantly clear about this: **The leadership of Prince of Peace does not deal with anonymous complaints.** Now, that doesn't mean that criticism is unwelcome. If you have a criticism or a complaint about something that is happening at Prince of Peace, or an unresolved problem with me or another leader, **we welcome your comments**.

I will speak for myself: if I am doing something that upsets or bothers you, there is no way that I can change unless it is brought to my attention. And while it certainly isn't fun to receive criticism, I have learned over the years that criticism can be the source of incredible growth and new life. There have been many times when I have been grateful for the opportunity to learn how some action, inaction, or word of mine has been received. I have improved in many ways thanks to honest criticism, and I know that I have a lot more room to improve. This is true of the congregation as well – we have room to improve as a congregation, and the only way that can happen is through honest criticism and discussion.

Criticism can be shared productively in lots of different ways – through a face-to-face conversation, or on the telephone, or through a <u>signed</u> note or email. Depending on the circumstance, and depending on your personality, one of these might be better than another in a certain situation. It can also be productive to have a conversation with someone in some level of authority – depending on the situation, that might mean a council member, or a member of the Mutual Ministry Committee, or the pastor. This kind of criticism can be hard to give and to receive, but in the end, a great deal of growth and improvement often occurs.

Conflict and criticism are not fun things, but **they are not intrinsically bad.** They can very positive and growth-spurring, if done appropriately. However, they can also be terribly destructive if done inappropriately. Some examples of inappropriate and damaging conflict and criticism include: gossiping with others; saying one thing and doing another; pretending everything is fine for the sake of "peace and quiet;" and leaving anonymous notes. These things all nurture an environment of distrust and anger. The key to constructive conflict, which is lacking in destructive conflict, is the ability to communicate honestly.

Constructive conflict builds relationships. Destructive conflict destroys relationships. As the body of Christ in the world, we are called to build and nurture live-giving relationships, and therefore we are called to engage in constructive conflict when it's necessary, and to always avoid destructive conflict. One of our Guiding Principles at Prince of Peace reads: "We actively seek to nurture respectful relationships, by speaking, listening, and responding honestly and without judgment." This is not always easy, but it is crucial to being who we are made to be.

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Now, I'm not sharing all this in order to call out the person or people who left those notes. I'm sharing this because all of us, myself included, can grow in this. We can all become better at sharing and receiving constructive conflict, and we all face daily the temptation to destructive conflict. We're never going to do it perfectly. But let's keep trying. Let's keep striving to be the people God wants us to be, the people God made us to be.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS from July 11, 2022

- 1. Revisions have been made to the Endowment to allow us more flexibility to seek opportunities for ministry and take care of our church and parsonage assets. More details will be available soon.
- 2. A book signing and preview for Pastor's newly released book, *Darkwater: A Pastor's Memoir of Depression and Faith*, will be held at the church on August 18th from 7-8PM for the community.
- 3. The Faith by Firelight events in the grove will be held July 15th and 30th. More events are being planned.

SPECIAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

Congregation Council is calling a special congregational meeting, to be held on Sunday, September 11 immediately following 9:45 am worship. The purpose of this meeting is to consider several amendments to our congregation's constitution. No other business will be conducted at this meeting. The full text of the proposed amendments is available on the counter in the church narthex, or by request by emailing Pastor Scholtes at pastorMJS@gmail.com. In plain English, the purpose of the amendments are to accomplish the following things:

- Change the definition of a **quorum** for congregational meetings. Instead of requiring a particular *number* of members to be present (currently 50 people), we will now require that there is a number of voting members equal to or greater than 10% of current baptized membership. That way, the quorum number will change over time with the size of the congregation. (The current baptized number is 353, meaning a quorum would be 36.)
- Triple the amount of **money council is authorized to spend** without requiring a congregational meeting. Council will now be authorized to enter into contracts of up to \$15,000 above the budget, with no more than \$22,500 per year.
- Change the **timing of council terms**. Instead of council members serving from January 1 to December 31, they will now begin and end their terms on the date of the regular January council meeting. This allows for a smoother transition in early January.
- Change the way the **youth representative** works. Instead of having this position be one of the regular 12 council positions, it will become an *additional* position. This will result in a potential council of 14: 12 3-year council members, the youth representative, and the pastor. This will allow for us to function without issue in years when a candidate for youth representative is not available. (We would just be a 13-member council those years.)

Here is how amending the constitution works: we must call a special congregational meeting, at which the amendments must be approved by a <u>simple majority vote</u>. If they are approved, then they must come before the next Annual Congregational Meeting (scheduled for November 20, 2022). At that meeting, the amendments must be <u>ratified</u> by a <u>2/3 majority vote</u>.

Please try to attend this important meeting, on Sunday, September 11, 2022 at about 11:00 am (right after worship).



Every year in September there's a day set aside for congregations to do "God's Work. Our Hands." This year Georgia and I wanted to do a project we can get the congregation involved in; you will hear more about that later. Right now, I want to tell you what the project is. I'm sure everyone knows about BLOOM, we've collected items for them in the past, in fact earlier this year we collected cleaning supplies for their 3 houses.
