# "Ancient Prayers for Modern Cares"

The Book of Psalms is an interesting and unique book in the Bible. It's not a tale of the history of the Israelites, like some other books. It's not the words of a prophet calling the people to change or proclaiming God's unchanging love. It's not the proclamation of a messiah, or a letter written to encourage the faithful.

Rather, the Book of Psalms is a series of prayers, poems, and songs. It's sometimes been called the "hymnbook of the Israelites." And just like any hymnal, there are a variety of types of songs or prayers. There are prayers of lament, crying out to God for help. There are prayers of confession, crying out to God for forgiveness. There are prayers of praise, proclaiming God's goodness and faithfulness. There are Psalms designed as individual prayers, and Psalms designed for communal use.

The Psalms were, like most of the Old Testament, originally written in Hebrew, and they are a rich source of Hebrew poetry. And they are honest – deeply, brutally honest – about the struggles that people faced in the times they were written.

And these struggles are not that alien to us. People in ancient times struggled with whether they could trust their leaders. They struggled with safety and security. They struggled with worry about the future, whether there would be enough to eat for them or their children. They struggled with changes going on all around them. They struggled with relationships, with betrayal and bullying. They struggled with whether they could trust in God or not, even as they offered their praise. These are also among **our** struggles.

And so, the Psalms can be among **our** prayers. We're going to explore the Psalms together this Lent. We're going to see what they say, and what they say *for us* and *to us*. We're going to do this in three ways. I invite you to join me in one, two, or three of these ways:

- 1. Preaching: I will preach on the Psalm each week during Lent, and together we will find the good news hidden within each gem.
- Teaching: I will lead a Bible Study every Tuesday (6:30 8:00 pm) from February 13 through March 19. We will dive more deeply into the Psalms and see what they might be saying to us. I hope to have this either videotaped, or shared via Zoom so that everyone can participate.
- 3. Devotional: On Thursday mornings (10:30 11:30 am) from February 15 through March 21, I will lead the POP Seekers Coffee Hour discussion group. We will pray with each of the Psalms of Lent and listen for God's quiet voice.

Join me on this spiritual journey as much as you can. Together we will seek signs of God's grace in our world.



### The Purpose and Passion of Prince of Peace

Years ago, our congregation identified our purpose statement as this: **"We the people of Prince of Peace Evangelical Lutheran Church will actively seek and serve Christ in all people."** We strive to live this out in everything we do as a congregation. Right now, looking at what we do and where the most energy is, our current passion is something like **"helping the helpers."** We have made a tremendous difference through the way we support PUMP, the foster program, Slater Family Network, and more. We are not on the front lines. But we support those who are. This is a perfect way for us to live out our mission, statement. We believe that Christ is at work in many ways outside the church in our community, and we see it as our job to support those who are doing it. We are *serving Christ in the people* who are on the front lines. One remarkable thing about this is that it's been *organic:* we didn't set out to become the *Helpers' helpers*, it's just who we are. We do so much that it's become important for us to remind each other that **none of us is expected to support all of these opportunities.** It's as a *community* that we make the difference we do.

### Impact Beyond Our Budget

A remarkable thing about being the *Helpers' helpers* is that we are impacting our community *beyond our budget*. We use almost no church funds for these outreach endeavors. The difference we make is because of your generosity *beyond* giving directly to the church. Thank you! And yet...we need the congregation as our home base for this. We need the gift of worship that nourishes us and sends us on our way. We need the gift of pastoral care that helps us deal with the tragedies and struggles in our lives. We need the gift of a building where items can be stored and sent from. We need the gift of evangelism to grow our faith community. We need the gift of education for youth and adults to help us deepen our understanding of *why* we seek and serve Christ. We need a pastoral leader who is connected with both the wider church and the community. And we do have all of *these* things because of your generous gifts *directly to Prince of Peace*. Thank you! Which means this: *The budget of Prince of Peace provides the infrastructure that allows the greater ministry to occur.* 

### Why We Can Make a Difference

We have dreams of doing even more. What if we *focused* on being the *Helpers' helpers?* What if we *deliberately* strive to provide more and more opportunities for generosity? Perhaps we could develop a program to help people identify how they'd like to serve. Perhaps we could find ways to include the wider community even more in our helping ministries. There are so

many opportunities to grow! But in order to do all this, our infrastructure needs to be in order.

### Our Current Financial Challenge

Prince of Peace has been thriving for years thanks in part to the generous donations of people from the past. For many years, our infrastructure has been funded not only by offerings, but also through fundraisers and drawing down investments from the gifts of prior generations. *Fundraisers have become harder to staff, and investments are nearly gone*. In order for our infrastructure to continue as it is, we must increase our offering now.


### How You Can Help

The budget presented at the Annual Congregational Meeting in November targeted an increase in offerings of **\$10,000**, or about a **5%** increase from previous offerings. We need your help to reach that target. *Could you consider the possibility of growing your giving by 5% in 2024?* 

And we want to dream big. While a 5% increase would certainly be a good starting point, imagine what we could do with a 20% increase. A 20% increase in offering would actually provide Prince of Peace with enough income **that we could be solely financed by our offerings** in 2024. A 20% increase in offering would enable us to achieve financial stability for our infrastructure, without reliance on fundraising or other means. It would enable our leaders to focus more on vision and dreaming, more on actively seeking and serving Christ, more on new ways to live out our passion as the *Helpers' helpers*, and less on finding creative financial solutions each year. *Could you consider the possibility of growing your giving by 20% in 2024?* 

(To be clear, the percentage increase we are asking you to consider is a percentage of <u>your current</u> <u>offering</u>. For example, if you currently give \$100, consider increasing it by 5% to \$105, 10% to \$110, or 20% to \$120. Just type your current offering into a calculator, and multiply by 1.05 for 5%, 1.1 for 10%, or 1.2 for 20%.)

Thank you for your generosity in the past. Your continued generosity will strengthen our infrastructure so that Prince of Peace can continue to help the helpers, and to grow our ministry even more. Your generosity is the key to us continuing to spread the good news of God's love. *Could you consider an increase of 5%, 10%, even 20% to your offering in 2024?*



# Advent Shares: Hope Out Loud

Support from the HOL! (Hope Out Loud!) Capital Campaign saw Advent members participate in dozens of projects – some new, some one-time; some existing ministries were expanded or refreshed. The dedicated members of Advent who truly care about people in need were very active and supportive. One member shared: "When I had some tough years, my church came through for me! That experience changed me in big ways. I vowed that I would get involved more and & pay it forward". Helping others has made me a happier Christian." There are so many completed (and ongoing!) projects. These ministries are wide-ranging and varied – food, clothing, shelter, blankets, books, and prayers. Cookies at Christmastime.

Advent members help men, women, babies, children, people in prison, people in recovery from addictions, hungry people – in our community, our country, and around the world. Members have said that they feel joy in providing the services and the looks on the faces of the recipients reinforce joy there too. Some of the projects receive seed money from Thrivent Action Teams. Some of our favorite ministries and activities are Bombas Socks donations, books and Bibles for Berks County Prison, Christmas Cookies for Common Ground, the Hungry Yard Sale, Family Promise, our Little Free Library and Little Free Pantry, the (new in 2020) Prayer Team, and the many clothing drives.

As one example of the positive impact in the community: The Little Free Pantry was filled and emptied on the same day. We cannot keep it filled fast enough. Through our \$250.00 Thrivent Action Team sponsorship by members of different committees, we can grocery shop and fill our shelves in Advent's grocery shelves. We fill up my grocery cart three times a week and go outside to our Little Free Pantry. Within hours it had been emptied. Praise God for Thrivent and Advent's church members in helping fill our community's bellies with happiness through our wonderful blessed giving! Another goal of the HOL! The campaign was to increase the use of technology in our church life. In the middle of the pandemic, we premiered a fresh, beautiful, new website to tell people about Advent – reaching out in a modern way to share God's word and work with our neighbors, friends, and people who want to learn about God. This new website increases our visibility in the community and provides valuable information for members and visitors alike. Seeing new people attend and join our church brings

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Pr. Jim Farnsworth's message was dedicated to Native Americans and how the new immigrants treated them to America. He asked that we remember and honor those who have gone before us -- the original inhabitants of this land. He also asked that we have a right relationship with God and each other and that we have a responsibility to repair relations. We reconcile by learning the truth, loving each other, and breaking down barriers with others. He suggested that we learn the history of our area by looking through the eyes of our neighbors and that we are called to be good neighbors.
