Way back in 2015, or perhaps we should call it 5 BCV ("Before Corona-Virus"), the members of Prince of Peace adopted a Purpose Statement. Many of us still remember our Purpose Statement (or at least that we have one): it goes like this: "We, the people of Prince of Peace Evangelical Lutheran Church, will actively seek and serve Christ in all people."

You may also remember that we adopted "Guiding Principles." We committed to following these five "rules of the road" to order our life together as a community, in service of our purpose. Now, as we steadily ramp back up to full speed after the pandemic, is a good time to revisit these Guiding Principles, and reaf-

firm our commitment to them. As we move forward in some new ways and some old, it behooves us to behave in the way that we've promised one another. Here are those Guiding Principles again. I encourage you to recommit to them in our life together as a community of faith, as well as in every facet of your life.

- We actively seek to devote ourselves to Christ through worship, prayer and scripture.
- We actively seek to nurture respectful relationships, by speaking, listening, and responding honestly and without judgment.
- We actively seek to gracefully forgive.
- We actively seek to live united as one body in Christ.
- We actively seek to encourage growth of faith while serving God.

My sermons throughout the month of June have focused on these Guiding Principles. If you missed any of them, I encourage you to watch them at popbangor.org/video-worship. I also encourage you to download and read the file "Emerging from the Crucible: Reflections on How to Be the Church Post-COVID." It's based on my sermon series from Easter, and contains thought on how we can do Christ's ministry as we move forward into, as they say, the "new normal."

There are a lot of things brewing right now at Prince of Peace, waiting to come to fruition sometime in upcoming months. It's an exciting time. Among these things:

- A new young adult ministry, which YOU can help with by submitting something to the CROSSROADS booklet. (More about this elsewhere in this newsletter.)
- An outdoor VBS held at East Bangor Park, in conjunction with East Bangor United Methodist Church.
- Some sort of educational program for children that may be very different from traditional Sunday School.
- A book study of a book entitled *Growing Young: 6 Essential Strategies to Help Young People Discover and Love Your Church.*
- A special memorial service for all who died during the COVID pandemic.
- A very special and unique presentation of the Gospel According to Mark.
- And of course, various events planned for our 50th anniversary in 2022.

Be part of this. Whether you're one of the "old guard" or a relatively new member; whether you're eighty or eight; whether your faith is strident or stumbling, whether you have lots of free time or just a few minutes here and there – be part of this. Join us as we figure out how to be the church in the second half of 2021, and how to be the church in 2022. It's going to be a wild ride. Join us.



UPDATE FROM THE REOPENING TASK FORCE, JUNE 2021

The recent announcements by Governor Wolf and the CDC regarding the relaxation of many COVID-19 restrictions brings a welcome sigh of relief for many of us. We are grateful for the opportunity that these announcements give us. We are also grateful for guidance we recently received from Bishop deForest's office, which encourages all synod congregations to be cautious as we reopen.

The Reopening Task Force has met several times since these announcements to review the rules and changes we made almost a year ago in response to COVID-19. After much discussion, we have decided to make the following changes to our current policy:

- Beginning on June 6, fully vaccinated persons may remove their masks while sitting in a pew. Masks are still required whenever you are not in a pew, e.g. while entering, exiting, and coming forward for communion.
- Congregational singing will be allowed at any <u>outdoor</u> services (currently scheduled for the first Sunday of each month). At this point, we <u>strongly</u> encourage you to put your mask on while singing.
- We intend to revisit these restrictions and others on a monthly basis, and take small steps like this each month, so long as current guidance supports it.

As you can see, the changes for June are modest. We opted against making broader changes immediately for the following reasons:

- 1. From the beginning, the Task Force has taken a safe, conservative approach to our practices, and it has worked. To date, we have no known exposures or positive cases stemming from interactions on our church grounds. Not all places of worship can make this claim.
- 2. Prince of Peace will not mandate proof of vaccination to attend worship or any functions on church grounds. Christ's church is open to all. Please make your vaccination decision in consultation with your own health care practitioner.
- 3. It is very likely that with the relaxed restrictions, many congregants will be out and about more, interacting with both vaccinated and unvaccinated people, potentially unmasked. As this is every individuals' right, we feel that keeping some masking and social distancing protocols while at Prince of Peace safeguards protection for all, despite our activities and lifestyle beyond these grounds.
- 4. In the past year, we have observed loosened restrictions followed by a surge in positive cases. As more Pennsylvanians get vaccinated, the likelihood of spreading the virus decreases; nonetheless the Task Force has decided to take a "wait and watch" approach to making major changes in our procedures. In other words, let's <u>wait</u> until at least 14 days *after* the restrictions are lifted statewide, and then <u>watch</u> and see what the COVID numbers do. If the COVID cases do not significantly increase, the Task Force will be poised to make further changes to our practices soon. If the cases spike as they did in the past, we will all be grateful that the extra precautions remained in place.

While the Task Force recognizes that some members may be disappointed in our decision, we hope that everyone welcomes the overall focus on the safety and health of our membership through the pandemic. As eager as we all may be to put COVID-19 behind us, it is still very much a part of our everyday lives. To ignore its presence now seems counterintuitive after all the hard work our congregation has done to bring us this far. Let's work together in this way a little longer for the sake of us all.


the plans and events that we will be hosting to celebrate our anniversary. What a great way to reach those in our community and show they are invited!

CROSSROADS BOOKLET

The transition from child to adult is always a difficult one. As teenagers turn into twenty-somethings, they often find that life isn't the way they thought it would be. As students head out into the workforce, they find challenges, changes, struggles they never faced before. Paychecks, taxes, rent, relationships, marriage, children, isolation, and so much more.

I recently met with a group of young adults (age 21-23) from Prince of Peace, and they all felt disconnected from God and from the church. One thing they thought might be helpful is if they could receive some advice, counsel, wisdom, from YOU. We brainstormed how to do it, and came up with this idea.

We're going to make a booklet called "**CROSSROADS**." YOU are invited to contribute a note to our young adults. Once everyone has had a chance to contribute, the notes will be put together into a booklet, and shared with our current young adults. They will also be shared with future high school graduates when they graduate. We'd like you to complete <u>one</u> of the following prompts in your note.

•"When you're at a crossroads in your faith,	·"

Your answer can be as brief or as long as you like. If you would prefer, you may also create a drawing, a music score, or some other creative method of getting your message across. Responses can be anonymous, but I encourage you to include your name.

This is a great way to fulfill the promises you made to these young adults at their baptism, and at their confirmation. At their baptism, the pastor asked you, "People of God, do you promise to support this person and pray for them in their new life in Christ?" You responded, "We do." At their confirmation, the pastor asked you the same question again, and you responded, "We do, and we ask God to help and guide us." You can get me your response in a few ways.

Worshiping the Lord

Smiling, he went on, "There was a time when I could have come to church every Sunday—but then I preferred to stay in bed."

There is the story of a pastor who announced one Sunday to his congregation: "I have good news and bad news. The good news is that we have enough money to pay for our new building program. The bad news is the money is still in your pockets."

Stewards Need God's Wisdom

As stewards, we have the responsibility to be knowledgeable and wise. In order to be effective in our stewardship, we need to seek God's wisdom. "For the Lord gives wisdom and from his mouth comes knowledge and understanding" (Proverbs 2:6).

God's Word illustrates the poor consequences that result when we think and act foolishly. For example, in Matthew 6:26-27, we read of the man who built his house on the sand, and, when the rain came, the house came crashing down. Wisdom teaches us to build our houses on solid ground.

Yet another example of not acting with wisdom is the Parable of the Ten Virgins. Five



virgins did not remember to bring enough oil so they missed the wedding celebration. By not thinking ahead, they missed the festivities. Jesus didn't condemn these people for their wickedness but rather their lack of preparedness.

Jesus uses the Parable of the Rich Fool to point out more foolishness. In this parable, Jesus tells us about a successful farmer who built bigger barns for the purpose of becoming wealthier. Jesus called him foolish because he didn't acknowledge God as the provider of all that he had. When God took his life, his wealth was meaningless.

Just as Jesus is critical of foolish thoughts and activities, he praises those who act wisely. In the Parable of the Shrewd Manager, Jesus praises the dishonest steward for how quickly and astutely he handled things when he was told that his job was coming to an end. Although the Shrewd Manager was dishonest, Jesus said there are even things that unbelievers do that we as believers can learn from and do. After the master told the Shrewd Manager his job would be ending, he became very wise, creative, and alert with his master's money, and he assured

himself of his temporary earthly future. In the same way, we can use the money God has given us to make friends who will welcome us into eternal dwellings.

As God's stewards, we can best fulfill our calling when we seek and use his wisdom. With God's wisdom, we will build on solid ground; we will acknowledge God as our source of all things, and we will be prepared for Christ's coming again. Because God grants us his wisdom, we can be God-pleasing stewards.

Our Attitude toward Money

Money is what we make it. Money can own us or be owned by us. Money can be our servant or our master. It depends entirely on our attitude. And this is why the Bible says that it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter God's kingdom (Matthew 19:24). It is not the rich man's money, but the rich man's attitude toward money that turns him away from God, away from other people, toward himself and his money. Likewise, it is not the poor man's poverty, but the poor man's attitude toward money that turns him away from God, away from other people, and makes him covetous, grasping, and every bit as selfish in his poverty as the wealthy man.

Much of Jesus' teaching focused on money so we need to develop the right attitude toward it and be concerned about its use and misuse. Whether God gives us little or much money, we need to be faithful stewards of it and learn an attitude of contentment. According to the Apostle Paul, we are very rich if we are satisfied with what we have. In 1 Timothy 6:6-10 he wrote:

"But godliness with contentment is great gain. For we brought nothing into the world, and we can take nothing out of it. But we have food and clothing, we will be content with that. People who want to get rich fall into temptation and trap and into many foolish and harmful desires that plunge men into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil. Some people, eager for money, have wandered from the faith and pierced themselves with many griefs."



Unfortunately, so many people have become so eager to have money and the things that money can buy that they have lost much of life's real value and life's real purpose. Poverty is a problem, not only with those who have no money, but also with those who have much. There are many who don't lack money but lack satisfaction because no amount of money satisfies.

As we examine our attitudes toward money, we need to remember that money can do many things, but it can't buy happiness or heaven.
