# Prints of Peace



### "This is a trauma in slow motion."

That's one of the ways I've been describing the COVID pandemic for over a year now. The American Academy of Experts in Traumatic Stress defines traumatic stress as: "The emotional, cognitive, behavioral, physiological experience of individuals who are exposed to, or who witness, events

that overwhelm their coping and problem-solving abilities."

We usually think of a *trauma* as a particular *event*, something terrible that happened to us that leaves open psychological wounds. And that's true; a trauma is often exactly that. Some people have indeed endured that sort of trauma in the last year – perhaps losing a loved one to COVID, or perhaps healthcare workers witnessing the surge of hospitalizations, and so forth.

But I think that most, perhaps all, of us have endured a different type of trauma throughout the past year, one in *slow motion*. If the lockdown had lasted only a few weeks, like many of us expected a year ago, then it might have been just a blip in our lives we could have looked back on and laughed about. We could have dealt with it and moved on. But this has gone on, and on, and on, and the longer it has gone, the more it has affected us, like dripping water that slowly creates a canyon. We have gone through abnormal circumstances for a very long time, and I believe that it has taxed our coping and problem-solving abilities.

The worst of COVID seems behind us, at least in the United States. We should be re-emerging in the coming weeks and months, able to enjoy many things the way we used to. And that is reason to celebrate! But we should also be aware that trauma leaves marks, deep marks that don't always heal on their own.

Even when things are back to "normal," you may find it difficult to concentrate sometimes. You may find yourself more irritable or touchy. You may find it hard to sleep, or hard to stay awake. You may find that you have a fear of particular places, events, or even people. These things are normal reactions to a traumatic situation. And you can get help for them.

I urge you to try to be patient with yourselves over the next few months, and patient with each other. We're all dealing with things we've never experienced before, and even when the pandemic ends, the emotional fallout will last a lot longer. Take time to breathe. Just focus on your breath, and be there with the breath for a minute. Talk to a trusted friend about what you're experiencing. These simple things might help, but if they don't, don't blame yourself. And know that there is help. I am here to listen to you. I am not a trained counselor, but I can listen and offer you the hope of Christ. I can also help you get connected with a counselor, or perhaps a support group.

I've got a strong feeling that mental health professionals are going to be busy over the next few years — there's a whole world of people who will soon be coming out of this slow-motion trauma. There is no shame in needing help, whether short-term or longer. God did not make us in a way that we can do everything ourselves; God made us to be in relationship with one another. Seek that help. If you need help seeking, let me know.

### **COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS**

- Council approved a proposal from Baker Landscaping and Hardscape to create a walkway from the parking lot to the grove through funding with grant applications to the ELCA and Synod. Additional monies would come from Capital Improvement or the Property Committee budget.
- Council discussed the "New Normal". Step by step coming back to normal. Committees involved in the rethinking of ways we may change for the future.
- We have raised well over \$1200 toward our goal of \$1400 for the Zeiser Leadership Fund (\$100.00 for each year Bishop Zeiser was Pastor at Prince of Peace). A few more donations are still coming in. Council has approved using the \$225.00 from an old "Legacy Fund" to put toward the Zeiser Foundation Fund.
- The Faith Education For All Committee has tentatively agreed to plan a joint VBS with East Bangor Methodist Church in person and outdoors at a neutral site.

### **Turtzo Missionary Bequest:**

This year Social Ministry was given \$4,438.00 to support the work of missionaries. Missionary work has always been special to God. God has always been fundamentally driven by a missionary heart. Therefore, when He calls missionaries to do his work, He is calling people to participate in the work that has driven the history of God's work in the world from Eden to today. The amount was awarded as follows: \$1,500.00 to Gene Williams of Disciple Makers in State College. Their primary goal is to make disciple makers of Jesus Christ among college students, as opposed to only bringing people to faith in Christ. This is a great program for young men and women away from home for the first time. We also awarded in equal amounts of \$1.469.00 to Dr. Mark & Linda Jacobson and Dr. Stephen & Jodi Swanson. They are currently serving as healthcare workers in Tanzania. Through this generous bequest we are able to continue to do God's work in supporting the work of missionaries. 
### TURTZO SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS







### May 2021 Update

### Dear Prince of Peace Lutheran Church,

One year ago we were in the midst of wondering whether we should stay in Tanzania or leave in very questionable times. When we think back to "what we knew" then, in the midst of pandemic uncertainty and closing borders, we were living on the edge. Though there are still unknowns and risks, it seems our feet have landed on more certain ground. At the same time, we are aware of great losses for so many of our friends and supporters. Loss of loved ones is at the top of the list. For those of you who have lost close family members or friends, we hope you find comfort and peace.

Here in Tanzania, the top of our news headlines was the death of our President John Pombe Magafuli. The country held 21 days of mourning and a smooth transition to the incoming, former Vice President, President Samia Suluhu Hassan. She is the first female president of Tanzania, coming from Zanzibar. We are very hopeful that she will preside with wisdom and grace over this country. There is an air of hope that can be felt in Tanzania, and a deep joy over the peaceful transition that characterizes the people of this country.

In so many ways, hope has risen in our hearts even in the midst of that which remains unknown. As of yet, there is no Covid vaccine available in Tanzania, Covid statistics have not been released since May 2020, and the country still struggles to meet demands on it's healthcare system. But there is relief over having survived the last year, and a sense of changes coming. It could also be that hope is rising with the arrival of the long rains as everything has burst out in color! Whatever the reason may be, we hold on to hope.







In 2019, we recruited Evelyine to work with us after her internship was completed.

Dr. Evelyine Mushi is among the top 1% of all doctors I have ever worked with in Tanzania. All who know her admire and respect her work ethic, intelligence,

dedication, humility, and compassionate care for mothers and their children.

Her story is even more remarkable when one realizes that she became an orphan while still in primary school. Against a backdrop of personal suffering, childhood loss of both parents and 2 siblings, she is a testament to resilience and grace. Evelyine is committed to children, to serving in Tanzania, and to one day becoming a neonatologist -- perhaps the first Tanzanian neonatologist in northern Tanzania! I have been privileged to serve as her clinical mentor, supervisor, and friend. Later this year, we will be sending her off to a 4-year pediatric residency program in South Africa. I couldn't be prouder of her.

for a college. There are many factors to consider and the combination of a pandemic and living an ocean away from the US certainly poses some challenges to visiting college campuses. Meanwhile, he is enjoying his classes (in particular Computer Science and Chemistry), and has found time to camp in the forest or climb the trees (with his rock climbing equipment). Hammocking is so much more fun at 60 feet above the ground!

Indya has also settled in well. Besides her regular classes, she thoroughly enjoyed cooking class (eating her homework was the best!), and sewing has become a new passion. She is now making bucket hats for friends. Though art and pottery are in her future next year, she has a passion for the ocean and marine science. We will see where that takes her! She's been an avid reader this break though it is a rare day that she doesn't draw or paint something new.

Hannah is pressing through challenging exams and long research papers and is eagerly awaiting bluer skies and warmer temperatures in MN. St. Olaf College in MN continues to have strict Covid protocols in place, which has been a bit isolating though she has had a few opportunities to see extended family. She was able to receive her first Covid vaccine in April, and the second is soon to follow. She has found a number of international students to whom she has connected which has lifted her heart. She will finish her first year the end of May (and what a challenging one it was!)

- Health and well being for all our family and protection for the kids as they travel back to Kenya.
- Thank God with us for the glorious rain and the growing crops.

### **ELCA Elects The Rev. Dr. Megan Rohrer, First Trans Bishop**



CHICAGO (May 10, 2021) — The Rev. Dr. Megan Rohrer (they/their), San Francisco, Calif., was elected May 8 to serve a six-year term as bishop of the Sierra Pacific Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Rohrer is the first transgender bishop in the ELCA. The election took place during an online synod assembly.

Rohrer was elected on the fifth ballot, with 209 votes. The Rev. Jeff R. Johnson, pastor of University

The bishop-elect has served as pastor of Grace Lutheran Church in San Francisco since 2014 and as community chaplain coordinator for the San Francisco Police Department since 2018. They served as executive director of the Welcome Ministry in San Francisco from 2002 to 2014, assistant night minister for the San Francisco Night Ministry from 2013 to 2018 and community garden coordinator at Project Homeless Connect from 2010 to 2012. Rohrer also served as pastor of a multiparish call serving the homeless and hungry at Welcome Ministry from 2006 to 2014.

Rohrer received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Augustana University in Sioux Fall, S.D., in 2001, a Master of Divinity degree from Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley in 2005, and a Doctor of Ministry degree in 2017. Rohrer is currently a doctoral candidate in transformative studies at the California Institute of Integral Studies in San Francisco. Augustana is one of 26 ELCA colleges and universities.

Rohrer's installation is scheduled for Sept. 11 at St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Walnut Creek, Calif. The Rev. Mark W. Holmerud has served as bishop of the Sierra Pacific Synod since 2008 and will retire June 30.
