A letter from Pastor...

I was recently elected president of the Slate Belt Ministerium. I'm honored that my colleagues in the region consider me a good candidate for this position. I thought I'd tell you a bit this month about what the Ministerium is, and how we do ministry together in the Slate Belt.

The Slate Belt Ministerium is composed of clergy and lay leaders from congregations throughout the Slate Belt, from Wind Gap to Portland. We meet monthly for a breakfast meeting, and at any given meeting there are usually between six and twelve of us present. Those of us who participate regularly include Lutherans, Methodists, UCC, Presbyterians, and a few nondenominational folks.

We plan a few events together, the biggest of which is the annual Slate Belt Community Thanksgiving service, which is held at a different congregation each year. The Thanksgiving service is a great opportunity to worship together with our neighbors of various denominations. (We have tried holding an Ascension service as well, but that only lasted two years before drifting away.)

At our meetings, we often have a guest speaker, often someone representing a non-profit in the area. This enables us to learn more about the work of places like Bloom, Recovery Revolution, Resilient Lehigh Valley, Kidspeace, and more. We have also hosted guests from the Pen Argyl and Bangor School Districts, as well as our two family centers, Families First and Slater Family Network. Contacts made at these Ministerium meetings have led to connections with individual churches – for instance, Prince of Peace got connected to the foster family network through a guest speaker I met at a Ministerium meeting.

One of the most important ways the Ministerium makes a difference is through our Ministerium Relief Fund. This fund is available to help people in our community who are struggling to make ends meet. Almost always, we distribute these funds at the request of Families First and Slater Family Network. We are blessed to have these organizations in our area who are better equipped to vet and help people. We rely on them to do the legwork, and we provide much-needed funds to help. The money in the relief fund comes mainly from two sources – participating congregations and clergy contribute "dues" once a year, and we also take an offering at the Thanksgiving service. Some congregations offer additional help along the way as well.

As president, my role is to schedule and lead our meetings, coordinate the special guests, and approve requests for the Relief Fund. It's important to note that my participation in the Ministerium is part of my call as your pastor. Building relationships with my fellow clergy, and our neighboring congregations, is one way that we share the good news of Christ in our community. I thank you for giving me the opportunity and privilege to serve in this way.

Next month, I'll tell you a little about another leadership role I have – the role of Dean of the Pocono Mission District.



Council is now accepting ideas for new sub accounts for 2025. The ideas received will be reviewed, considered, and council will make their recommendations at the Annual Meeting. Contact a council member by August 1st for the form to submit your idea. (See Page 9 for details.)

Investment or deposit accounts have been established for all sub accounts. As a review:

 - Permanent Property received \$7,750.00
 - Office Technology received \$3,125.00
 - Outdoor Enhancements received \$625.00
 - Wider Church(new) received \$375.00
 - Mr. Fix It (new) received \$625.00



POP Endowment Sub Fund Proposal Form

Instructions:

Please read the info below and provide the completed form to Council for consideration of your Endowment Sub Fund proposal. Please keep the following points in mind relating to the evaluation, possible approval, and possible disbursement of funds related to your proposal:

- 1. Please provide all requested information with your application.
- 2. Please provide as much detail as possible so that Council will have a clear and complete understanding of all facets of your proposal.
- 3. Completed forms should be submitted to Council prior to the September Council meeting.
- 4. Council will review all submissions and recommend those that they feel have merit for consideration by the congregation at the November Congregational meeting.
- 5. If your proposal advances to consideration at the November Congregational meeting, it will be voted on by the congregation. If approved, it will then be an official sub fund for the next calendar year.
- 6. Before any action requiring funding can be taken on your proposal, a payment request must be made to Council (or their designated subgroup) detailing your request for funds. No action should be taken, or commitment made to pay for any sub fund expenses until your request is approved by Council (or their designated subgroup).
- 7. If your request is approved for payment, the trustees should then be notified of your approval so we can arrange payments as needed.
- 8. Annual disbursements are made to fund sub funds by February 15 each year. No money will be available to support any expenses related to your proposal until after February 15.
- 9. Be prepared to allow sufficient time for trustees to free sub fund monies from investments to pay for any approved expenses. This may require several business days to access the funds.
- 10. Please see any Trustee or Council Member with questions.

- 1. Provide the name of your Endowment Sub Fund Proposal.

- 3. If a group, please specify the primary contact person including phone number and email address.
- 4. On one or more separate pages, please explain your proposal. Be very detailed. Take all the space you need to address the bullet points below that might apply to your proposal including:
 - What is your proposal?
 - How does it work?
 - What will be required for it to work?
 - How will your proposal benefit our congregation or the neighboring community?
 - Is there either a general or specific timeline that will need to be followed specific to your proposal?
 - Do you have other materials that you can provide that will enable the Council to evaluate the suitability of your proposal? Examples that may apply include:
 - Estimates of costs associated with your proposal.
 - o Plans
 - o Drawings
 - o Specs
 - o Pictures
 - o Models or other physical representations related to your proposal
 - o Printed materials
 - o Other reference materials.
- 5. Please be sure your proposal submission is legible. Preference to typed material to ensure legibility.
- 6. Please organize all materials so that they make sense for Council to review.
- 7. Please keep a copy for yourself of all materials submitted with your proposal. Council may not be able to guarantee the return of any items submitted as part of the approval process.

Worshiping the Lord

The old man was bedridden, victim of a stroke. His eyes gleamed mistily as we talked of our little church, its rapid growth, its new building. "Pastor," he murmured, "I'd give anything to be able to come to church one Sunday, but I know I'll never get out of this bed."

Smiling, he went on, "There was a time when I could have come to church every Sunday—but then I preferred to stay in bed."

It is ironic how our sense of values can change. Fortunate is the man who awakens in time to the worth of worship and work in the house of the Lord. (Henry B. Luffberry)

There is the story of a pastor who announced one Sunday to his congregation: "I have good news and bad news. The good news is that we have enough money to pay for our new building program. The bad news is the money is still in your pockets."

Stewards Need God's Wisdom

As stewards, we have the responsibility to be knowledgeable and wise. In order to be effective in our stewardship, we need to seek God's wisdom. "For the Lord gives wisdom and from his mouth comes knowledge and understanding" (Proverbs 2:6).

God's Word illustrates the poor consequences that result when we think and act foolishly. For example, in Matthew 6:26-27, we read of the man who built his house on the sand, and, when the rain came, the house came crashing down. Wisdom teaches us to build our houses on solid ground.

Yet another example of not acting with wisdom is the Parable of the Ten Virgins. Five



virgins did not remember to bring enough oil so they missed the wedding celebration. By not thinking ahead, they missed the festivities. Jesus didn't condemn these people for their wickedness but rather their lack of preparedness.

Jesus uses the Parable of the Rich Fool to point out more foolishness. In this parable, Jesus tells us about a successful farmer who built bigger barns for the purpose of becoming wealthier. Jesus called him foolish because he didn't acknowledge God as the provider of all that he had. When God took his life, his wealth was meaningless.

Just as Jesus is critical of foolish thoughts and activities, he praises those who act wisely. In the Parable of the Shrewd Manager, Jesus praises the dishonest steward for how quickly and astutely he handled things when he was told that his job was coming to an end. Although the Shrewd Manager was dishonest, Jesus said there are even things that unbelievers do that we as believers can learn from and do. After the master told the Shrewd Manager his job would be ending, he became very wise, creative, and alert with his master's money, and he assured

himself of his temporary earthly future. In the same way, we can use the money God has given us to make friends who will welcome us into eternal dwellings.

As God's stewards, we can best fulfill our calling when we seek and use his wisdom. With God's wisdom, we will build on solid ground; we will acknowledge God as our source of all things, and we will be prepared for Christ's coming again. Because God grants us his wisdom, we can be God-pleasing stewards.

Our Attitude toward Money

Money is what we make it. Money can own us or be owned by us. Money can be our servant or our master. It depends entirely on our attitude. And this is why the Bible says that it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter God's kingdom (Matthew 19:24). It is not the rich man's money, but the rich man's attitude toward money that turns him away from God, away from other people, toward himself and his money. Likewise, it is not the poor man's poverty, but the poor man's attitude toward money that turns him away from God, away from other people, and makes him covetous, grasping, and every bit as selfish in his poverty as the wealthy man.

Much of Jesus' teaching focused on money so we need to develop the right attitude toward it and be concerned about its use and misuse. Whether God gives us little or much money, we need to be faithful stewards of it and learn an attitude of contentment. According to the Apostle Paul, we are very rich if we are satisfied with what we have. In 1 Timothy 6:6-10 he wrote:

"But godliness with contentment is great gain. For we brought nothing into the world, and we can take nothing out of it. But we have food and clothing, we will be content with that. People who want to get rich fall into temptation and trap and into many foolish and harmful desires that plunge men into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil. Some people, eager for money, have wandered from the faith and pierced themselves with many griefs."



Unfortunately, so many people have become so eager to have money and the things that money can buy that they have lost much of life's real value and life's real purpose. Poverty is a problem, not only with those who have no money, but also with those who have much. There are many who don't lack money but lack satisfaction because no amount of money satisfies.

As we examine our attitudes toward money, we need to remember that money can do many things, but it can't buy happiness or heaven.

Worship & Art: A Congregation's Journey

A few years ago, Calvary Lutheran Church, Laureldale, set out on a journey to be as inclusive as possible. This journey led the congregation to install state-of-the-art cameras (for streaming worship), three 85-inch monitors (for reading the liturgy and music), and a new sound system (that would enable everyone to hear and engage during worship). This was the beginning of the trek to become the congregation God was calling them to be!

The people of Calvary knew they could do more to engage in worship or worshipful experiences so they asked, "How can we engage more of our bodies in worship?" They pondered, brainstormed, and listed ways they could inclusively engage their bodies in worship and Christian life. They decided that creating together would align with their values of inclusivity. This came to fruition through their first collective art project. They began with a Lenten collage that created a dark scene with the tomb of Jesus. The congregation loved the project so much that they asked for more. The next project was for Easter, which included a prominent cross and a rainbow collage surrounding and illuminating the cross. The congregation is currently working on a Pentecost piece that includes a centralized bird erupting from rings of fire. The congregation is in conversation with an art organization to place their piece on display for the wider community to enjoy.

New Outreach Ministry is Found at POP's Treasures

POP's Treasures was established by Prince of Peace Evangelical Church in Bangor to create a location where the community/congregants can donate gently used items /clothing. Presented in a "boutique style" store front where the visitors can see creative displays and purchase said items at a fair price.



The outpouring of community involvement has far exceeded our initial plan. The community supports us with items, and they also attend monthly during the sale days. We have had several new members at the church since the boutique was opened May of 2023. Our attendees support us in other posts on Facebook, letting the community at large know of our location. We are constantly reminded how they feel that this is a wonderful program. We also have individuals who come in our doors that ask to help volunteer.

We applied for and received a Witness and Service Ministry Team Grant to help with the costs to prepare a location on our property and purchase a connex container. The container is used to repurpose and store inventory. Items not sold at the boutique, are then stored until we have our spring or fall rummage sale. Items not sold there are donated to a clothing collection box and other organizations. Currently we utilize the 2 back rooms of the church, along with part of the fellowship hall during the days of our sale, which in total in 7 hours for both days.



While our program was set up to respond at the end of the fiscal year. As we hear of a need, we act in trying to make it happen if we can. It is difficult to say how many attend during the sale days. However, recently we provided a free clothing and houseware day that was attended by 200 individuals.

We currently have provided 3 meals at Safe Harbor, a transition shelter for the homeless. We have donated children's toys, and a stroller to the foster care program. There were also monetary donations to a local youth program, animal shelter, Portland food pantry (PUMP), and the purchase of animals from ELCA Good Gifts.

You may wonder if your congregations could do the same. Yes! If the organizers have the faith it will work, be willing to make changes and to realize that there are many paths to take to make it work. Success can be measured by outreach to the community and the programs it helps. We have been blessed beyond our wildest hopes and dreams.
