# Prints of Peace

FROM THE BOOK TO BE SEED TO BE SE

Hard to believe that it's been just about a year since the lock-down started for the COVID pandemic. As I write this in February 2021, I can remember February 2020. We had started to hear stories about a virus that was making its way around several countries. I can remember calling my sister, who lives in Seattle, because Seattle was the first place in the US hit by COVID, over a month before it became so widespread. I re-

member thinking how lucky we were that we lived on the east coast. I remember our parish nurse making announcements that if we just used proper hygiene, everything would be fine. (That was the best health info we had back then!)

But then in March the floodgates opened. I remember March 13, the day the governor declared schools closed for two weeks, and I remember the emergency executive committee meeting we had that evening. I remember finding my video camera and tripod, and how strange it felt to pre-record worship that Saturday afternoon. I thought – so many of us thought – it would only be for a few weeks. We'd be back to normal by Easter, certainly.

Well, we all know how that turned out. We still won't be "back to normal" in time for Easter 2021. It's easy to look back at the last twelve months and mourn how much has been lost. How many people have died or gotten seriously ill? How many funerals have been graveside-only affairs, without the chance for the kind of closure we need? How many holiday parties and weddings have been canceled or severely altered? How much loneliness have people endured? How many people have lost income?

All these things are true. The past year has been extraordinary and difficult. But there have been some bright lights as well. These don't take away the sadness and mourning, or make it unimportant. But the bright lights can help us see that there is hope after all, even amid *this*.

I think about all the ways we've grown as a church. We've learned how to have meetings without being in the same place. Zoom isn't the same as in-person, but it's a reasonable alternative. We've done education the same way: people from six to over eighty are learning online through Bible Studies, Confirmation Classes, and Zoom Zone (our "Sunday School alternative"). We came together to create an outstanding video celebrating Christmas throughout our congregation. We've learned how to worship together while apart. Our online and phone worship have enabled people to feel part of worship who hadn't in years. We have made more use of our beautiful grove than ever before. We have had outdoor baptisms, and car-side communion, and we have shown that our generosity and love can't be stopped, as we continue to provide for the needs of the church, of PUMP, and of so many other things.

How have you grown individually during this year? Again, I am not saying that we should ignore the hurt, or that it isn't real. It's helpful, though, to focus at least sometimes on the good, on the growth. The end of the pandemic is coming. Over time, the hurt will fade. But the growth will stay with us forever. Praise be to God for the growth!

The holy season of Lent began on February 17, and culminates on Easter Sunday, April 4. Our Lenten worship will be different this year, as we are making some adjustments due to the ongoing COVID pandemic. Here is the current schedule, but please understand that further adjustments may be necessary depending on conditions:

**MIDWEEK LENT:** This year's midweek Lenten worship will be offered **online only**. Each week, Martin and Pastor Scholtes will offer a brief service. The theme this year is **The Promises of God.** Watch for more information in PastorMail.

**HOLY WEEK:** Our Holy Week schedule will be changed this year. Normally, we have worship on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. This year, there will only be **one** weekday service, on **Friday, April 2 at 7:00 pm.** This service will include elements of both Maundy Thursday <u>and</u> Good Friday. This service will be recorded and shared online as well.

**EASTER SUNDAY, APRIL 4:** Our **6:00** am Easter Vigil service will be held entirely outdoors, in the grove. The good news about this is that we now have an outdoor heater, and that should make it comfortable! There will also be an indoor service at our regular time of **9:45** am. The 9:45 am service will be recorded and shared online, and hopefully the 6:00 Easter Vigil as well.




#### Easter Meal Drive: Food Collection for P.U.M.P.


This means that 53 cents of every dollar of Mission Support from our congregation supported the Strategic Directions below for mission and ministry right here in the Synod.

## Graceful Generosity

Published to help you grow as a steward of God's grace.

#### What Have I Done for Him?

Lent is a season in the church year during which we particularly focus on the sacrifice Jesus made for us to pay the debt we owed for our sin. We know there is no way we can pay the debt ourselves. Only the sinless Son of God could do that. We have access to heaven only by grace through faith in Christ Jesus.

While we cannot repay Jesus for what he has done for us, his love does require a response. Paul, speaking of our ministry of reconciliation, wrote, "For Christ's love compels us . . ." (2 Corinthians 5:14). We remain on earth to carry out the tasks which Christ left for us to do: to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, care for the sick, and visit the prisoner, (Matthew 25:31-46). James admonished us that ". . . faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead" (James 2:17). We provide the funds that support our pastors, teachers, and missionaries. Again, we can quote Paul writing in 1 Corinthians 9:11-12. "If we have sown spiritual seed among you, is it too much if we reap a material harvest from you? If others have this right of support from you, shouldn't we have it all the more?" Certainly each of us is addressed by the Great Commission: "Go and make disciples of all nations . . ." (Matthew 28:19). The following words from Frances Ridley Havergal are a poignant reminder that Christ's love and sacrifice for us require a response:

Thy life was given for me, thy blood, O Lord, was shed

That I might ransomed by, and quickened from the dead.

Thy life was given for me, what have I given for thee?

And thou hast brought to me down from thy home above

Salvation full and free, thy pardon and thy love.

Great gifts thou broughtest me, what have I brought to thee?



We are saved by grace through faith for works. Let us pray for the desire to be good stewards of the gifts of salvation, health and wealth, and time and opportunity which God has given us that we might have a part in the furthering of God's kingdom.

#### **Second Fiddles Are Needed Too**

The conductor of a great symphony orchestra on tour was being interviewed by a young reporter from the high school paper. She was a charming girl with a great ambition to succeed and no experience whatever with great artists.

"My paper would like to know," she began, with an evident effort to appear professional, "what instrument in the orchestra is the hardest to play." Without a second's hesitation the great musician replied, "A second fiddle! And it's that way with life, too. It is always easy to find those who want to play the solos. It is something else to find those who are willing to provide the harmony and the accompaniment." (Roy Smith)

#### **Meditate on Christ's Sacrifice**

Genesis tells us about the creation of the world. "God saw all that he had made, and it was very good" (Genesis 1:31). It wasn't long, unfortunately, before our perfect world was destroyed when Adam and Eve rebelled against God even though they knew that such an act would lead to death (Genesis 2:17). A just and holy God would have to carry out that sentence, but a merciful and forgiving God would also offer a solution to our sin problem: Enter Jesus, our Savior. This Lenten season, meditate on his sacrifice and thank him for his grace.



#### The Nature of a Servant ...

Poor Peter. He was so flustered. They had all met for the Passover, and no one had taken the initiative to perform the lowly task of washing the feet of the disciples. Now, here was Jesus, with the towel around his waist, coming toward him. How embarrassing! "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus must have known how Peter felt, for he said Peter would understand later.

But this was now, and Peter demurred. *No, you shall never wash my feet.*" Jesus insisted. "*Unless I wash you, you have no part with me.*" And Peter's feet were washed.

No one but Jesus knew exactly what lay ahead. Although he had brought up the subject of his death more than once, the disciples didn't comprehend the words. Maybe if they had, they would have acted differently.

Is that what we say when we miss opportunities to be servants? "Well, if I had known ..." We do know, though. We have the benefit of hindsight, which, we have heard, is 20/20. We know we have a Savior who has conquered death and Satan, and so we take Jesus' command to his disciples as a command to us as well. "Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet" (John 13:14).

#### We Pray

Lord, I am like those disciples ... looking around to see who will serve me instead of whom I can serve. Forgive my stubbornness and pride. Teach me to love and serve as you did that others might see you through me. For Jesus' sake. Amen.

#### Synod Assembly 2021

We are still moving forward on our Synod Assembly for June 3-5, 2021. The theme will be "Growing Young and Vital" and will feature new ideas for ministry around three vital signs - healing the hurting, loving the land, and engaging the stranger. By the first week in March, a final decision will be made about whether the Assembly will be all online, or in-person at the Kalahari resort even if that may mean delaying some portions to a later date. It will depend on the progress of the vaccine distribution and how well we can make arrangements that keep everyone safe. **SAFETY** IS OUR HIGHEST CONCERN.
