Prints of Peace



Boo! It's the spooky season, as Halloween decorations are all over the stores. The air is getting cooler, the trees are starting to change, the days are growing shorter. At the end of this month, kids all over will put on their best costumes and walk around town and receive copious amounts of sugar. Halloween is the spooky season, and sometimes perhaps the **scary season**.

As grown-ups, most of us aren't scared of ghosts or goblins, black cats or witches. But there are things we do fear. Among the biggest things we fear are **change** and the **unknown**.

And that's exactly where we find ourselves right now. We have emerged from the COVID-19 pandemic to find a world that has changed, a world that continues to change. A world that contains so many unknowns. Even our churches are not exempt from this; the future of the church is not clear. But one thing is clear: just like the world around us, the church of the future will not look like the church of the past. And that's okay.

On October 31, when kids around the world will be celebrating Halloween, Lutherans will also be recognizing the day as **Reformation Day**, commemorating the day that Martin Luther began the Protestant Reformation. (At Prince of Peace, we recognize this each year on the last Sunday of October.) Reformation Day is a day to remember that *the church is always reforming*. The church is always changing. And no wonder: the lifeblood of the church is the Holy Spirit. And the Holy Spirit is always, always changing and flowing and energizing and rebuilding and driving us ever onward and upward. The Holy Spirit is rebuilding us right now into the church of 2024. We don't know what that will look like! But we can trust God that it is good.

In October, we are celebrating the newness of the Holy Spirit in a few ways. On October 15, our Task Force will host an informational meeting to describe for you the vision we have of going into 2024 as a more sustainable congregation. *That same day*, October 15, will be Harvest Home, and "Bring a Friend Sunday," a day to celebrate the newness of the harvest of love that God brings in anew each day. And on October 29, we will celebrate the confirmations of five of our young people: Izzy Baker, Emma Confalone, Sarah Harrison, Allison Manicke, and Alex Scholtes. These five have been such a blessing in the past few years, and we have high hopes for their future as part of the church. All these things celebrate *change* and *reform* that are coming to our congregation. I hope you can join us for these events, and for weekly worship.

Change is scary, but it doesn't have to be. Change can be good if we trust that God is there with us through it. Someone once gave me a decoration for my office that I look at every day. It says: *I Don't Know What Tomorrow Holds, But I Know Who Holds Tomorrow*. That's a good description of what it is to live in a time of change. God is holding tomorrow, and that's a promise we can trust.

Now go enjoy some Halloween candy!

TASK FORCE NEWS

In September's newsletter, the Task Force shared with you an overview of our plan to cut our budget deficit by \$27,000 in 2024. We'd like to take an opportunity this month to explain the plan in more detail. (Eagle-eyed readers will notice that a few of the numbers below are not the same as in the September newsletter. That's because this is still a work-in-progress, and we're still fine-tuning it. The total still adds up to be more than enough to offset the budget by the necessary amount.) Here are the changes we are suggesting:

Postage (Projected savings of \$500). This is a fairly easy one. We send this newsletter out by email to some people, and via the US Postal Service to others. We are trying to reach out to many of the people receiving via US mail and try to see if they would be willing to receive via email, or to pick up their printed newsletter at the church.

Insurance (Savings of \$1,300). This one is already done! We have changed insurance carriers, which has resulted in better coverage for a cheaper price.

Mission Support (Projected savings of \$3,000 – changed from September). "Mission Support" is the name for the money that we send to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and to the Northeastern PA Synod. (It used to be called "Benevolence.") For several years, Prince of Peace has committed to giving 10% of all offering income to Mission Support. This has made us one of the strongest churches in Mission Support in the synod, which is something to be proud of. Our recommendation is to reduce our giving from 10% of receipts to 7.5% of receipts. We felt that it was important to still give generously, but this change will help with our budgetary concerns. One important note is that this is still connected directly to our own offering receipts, so if we have a very good year, we will share that good harvest with Mission Support. (And conversely, if our year is not so good, our giving will go down proportionally.)

Promoting Weis cards after church (Estimated income of \$1,600 – changed from September). For many years, we have had Weis gift cards available for purchase. Prince of Peace purchases them in bulk from Weis markets, and they give us a 5% discount. We then sell them to congregation members at face value, and thus make 5% on each purchase. The trouble is, we haven't been good at promoting this. (You might not have even known this was an option!) That's going to change – soon, you will see someone in the narthex after worship every week selling these cards. If you shop at Weis, please consider supporting POP in this way – it costs you nothing. We are grateful to Weis Markets for their generosity.

Advertise building rentals (Estimated income of \$1,000). We rent out our Fellowship Hall to congregation and community members for showers, parties, and other functions. We feel there is room to grow in this, and plan to advertise and promote rentals, so that this becomes a stronger source of income.

Jacktown Stand (Estimated income of \$1,800 – changed from September). We have the opportunity to work the food stand at Jacktown three times a year. If we can get a group of POP members to staff this, Jacktown will share a portion of the proceeds with the church. This will take a commitment of time on the part of many people in order to materialize.

Assorted expense budget corrections (estimated budget change of \$3000 – added from September). We have looked at our budget and made corrections to several expense lines which have been consistently overbudgeted for several years. This will not entail a change in our operating procedures – it's simply a way to make the budget more accurately reflect the reality.

Increase Giving (Estimated increase of \$10,000). When the Task Force did a study of our offering income, it became clear to us that there is potential for growth in our regular giving, which is currently at about \$185,000 per year. We felt that an increase of \$10,000 was a manageable goal for 2024. In order to help us achieve this, some members of the Task Force are working closely with the Stewardship Committee to plan a Stewardship Campaign to be held in January-February 2024. This will obviously require a commitment on the part of members to accomplish this, but we believe that capacity is there. (Continued on the next page)

All of these items will be reflected in the proposed 2024 budget which will be presented for consideration at the November 2023 Congregational meeting. We will also be discussing these items at a special **Informational Meeting** to be held **after worship on Sunday, October 15. Please plan to attend this important informational meeting to hear more, and to have your questions addressed.**

RECOMMENDED ENDOWMENT SUBFUNDS FOR 2024

Early each year, 5% of the year end value of our Endowment Fund, plus 20% of the dollar value of all cash gifts made to the fund during the prior calendar year, is disbursed from the Endowment Fund into Subfunds. These subfunds are used for particular purposes to enrich the ministry and/or property of the congregation. These subfunds are voted on at the Annual Congregational Meeting in November. Congregation Council makes motions to approve the adoption of recommended subfunds, and the congregation must approve them at the meeting. Any money not allocated into a subfund automatically goes into the Unbudgeted Property Expense Fund.

Here are this year's recommendations from congregation council. We will vote on these at the Annual Congregational Meeting on Sunday, November 19, 2023.

- 1. Create a "Wider Church Subfund" (3% of total disbursement). Monies from this fund would be used to provide registration, travel, housing, and other expenses for members of Prince of Peace (including the pastor) attending events sponsored by the wider church (i.e. the ELCA and/or the Northeastern PA Synod). The recommended amount for 2024 is small and is intended to cover the costs of Synod Assembly. In future years, this subfund could be grown to also cover other events.
- 2. Create a "Mr. Fix It Subfund" (5% of total disbursement). Monies from this fund would be available for use by the Mr. Fix It Team for any necessary startup costs, or occasional needs. Depending on use of the fund, it might not need to be added to in future years.
- 3. Continue to fund the "Outdoor Enhancements Fund," created in 2022 (5% of total disbursement).
- 4. Continue to fund the "Office Technology Fund," created in 2022 (25% of total disbursement).
- 5. The remaining 62% to go to the Unbudgeted Property Expense Fund.

Proposed Bylaw Change for November 2023 Congregational Meeting


Congregation Council is proposing the following amendment to our bylaws. This amendment will be voted on at the Annual Congregational Meeting on Sunday, November 19, 2023. It requires a 2/3 majority vote to pass.

Existing Bylaw B4 (in part):

Treasurer – The treasurer shall be responsible for the books of account of the congregation, and shall see that all funds are received and disbursed on proper orders, making remittance of mission support to the treasurer of the Synod. The treasurer or designee from the Finance Committee shall make a written report of all financial transactions to the congregation council monthly and to the congregation, together with a satisfactory audit, at its annual meeting. All financial officers shall give corporate surety, in amounts determined by the congregation council, for which the premium shall be paid by the congregation. The treasurer shall be properly bonded. This bonding requirement can be satisfied through the purchase of the appropriate insurance coverage for this risk. Many of these duties may be delegated to a paid accountant. In the case when the congregation has such an accountant, the chair of the Finance Committee shall be ex officio elected as treasurer. The treasurer shall be exempt from the constitutional expectation that "no elected officer shall be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office" (C11.03).


