FROM THE PASTOR

As I write this in mid-March, the biggest news is COVID-19, the coronavirus. We've just made some changes to worship to keep it as safe as possible. By the time you read this, a few things might have happened. Perhaps the scare is over, and everything has returned to normal. Perhaps an outbreak has occurred in our region, and we've taken even more drastic measures to protect one another. Or perhaps it's much the same – trying to walk the line between taking the news seriously and not panicking.

Whatever the case, what is called for right now is bearing with one another. There are some in our community who are ill right now – whether with COVID-19, or the flu, or something very different. It is our Christian duty to care for each other, to offer prayers and support, to provide help in obtaining medical care, and to show each other that the sick are not forgotten.

There are some in our community who are frightened right now – whether by COVID-19, or by some other ailment, or some family problem, or the state of the stock market, or something else entirely. It is our Christian duty to proclaim God's peace to one another, to speak the word that God is truly here, to show in deed that no one is alone.

There are many in our community who disagree with one another. For instance, some think that this pandemic is something to worry a lot about, while others believe the media has overstated the fears. Some believe our precautions at church were an overreaction, while others believe we haven't done enough. It is okay to disagree about this. We are all trying to do our best given the situation we're in. It is our Christian duty to listen to one another, to listen to those who are frightened and those who are skeptical. If we truly believe that Christ is in the heart of us all, then we are obligated to take one another seriously, even if we disagree. (And even if the coronavirus scare is gone, we certainly disagree about a lot of other things.)

Now is the time when we need to be the church. To be the people of God who are united through our baptism into Christ. Now is the time we need to stand together (even if we don't hold hands right now), stand together in love for all of our neighbors. Now is the time for us to embrace what unites us: our love of God, and God's love for us. Now is the time for us to roll up our sleeves, and be God's hands in our community. Care for one another. Pray for one another. Listen to one another. And, so far as it's safe to do so, worship with one another. And trust in the God who will get us through every dark day. Oh, and wash your hands.

Also, I am happy to welcome to the church staff **Linda Waszmer**, our new volunteer Pastoral Assistant! Linda had been a member of Prince of Peace with her husband Bill and daughter Kathryn since 2014. She will be partnering with me to provide professional pastoral care, through hospital and homebound visits, as well as pastoral conversation. Linda already has a deep faith, and gifts for listening and caring. She will also



Discussion regarding COVID 19 precautions- Council discussed a contingency plan in case there is an outbreak of COVID-19 (coronavirus) in our region:

- We will cancel all large group events, including worship.
- ♦ Pastor will work to provide some sort of alternative to regular worship, to include:
 - *Developing a plan to record and broadcast worship online.
 - *Providing resources for people to worship in small groups or at home.
- ♦ We will encourage committees and other groups to use their best judgment on whether to meet or not.
- ♦ We will be following the guidance of outside experts, such as the CDC and the Bishop's Office, to determine when and if to activate this plan.
- Motion to approve Pastoral Assistant Job Description and to pay educational requirements up to \$1000 per year and mileage reimbursement at the current IRS reimbursement rate-APPROVED
- Motion to name Linda Waszmer as our volunteer Pastoral Assistant for a trial period of 6 months.-APPROVED

with others. I believe that, as I support others I am doing the work God calls us all to do = showing love and compassion to others.


I am grateful for the opportunity I have been given, and grateful for all the support already shown to me by Prince of Peace members.

In response to concerns about the security of our church building, the Property Committee has been in contact with a security firm to develop a proposal for enhancing and improving our security. We have also applied for a state grant that offers substantial money to houses of worship to enhance security. If the grant is received, it will pay for all the improvements that are recommended.

The proposal is detailed, but in broad strokes it looks like this:

- Multiple cameras to be installed both outside and inside the building.
- Replacement of door locks. Instead of keys, authorized people would receive electronic key "fobs" to gain entry. This would enable leaders to see who is entering the building when.



If we learn that the grant is received, we will immediately schedule an informational meeting to discuss this with the congregation before changes are made. (We are currently discerning if entering this contract will require an <u>official</u> congregational meeting, but either way, an informational meeting at least will be scheduled.)

"Within the Pages" News From POP Library...

Do you know what the St. John Bible is?



In 1998, Saint John's Abbey and University commissioned renowned calligrapher Donald Jackson to produce a hand-written, illuminated Bible. This was a life long dream of his.

This bible was completed in 2011 with the final word penned in May of that year. It is divided into seven volumes. Gospels and Acts, Pentateuch, Psalms, Prophets, Wisdom Books, Historical Books and Letters, and Revelations.

Illumination means to shine a light on something, or coming to a deeper understanding of something. In the case of these books, their underlying goal is to ignite spiritual imagination and promote meditation on the scriptures.

Each volume is two feet tall

and three feet wide when opened. They are filled with beautiful illustrations. A set was presented to the Pope in 2015 and many people journey to Monmouth Wales to see the original.

Do you know that you don't need to travel any further than our church library to see these books? That's right! A few years ago we purchased copies and they are on display for anyone to see.

There are many books of a wide variety in our library. Most you can sign out to read outside the church, but these must remain in the library. We strongly suggest you take time out to visit the library/conference room and look them over. You won't be sorry.

We are in the midst of revamping the library, so who knows what else we'll find on those shelves! We invite you to come on in and look around, sign out some books, enjoy some quiet time and give us some input! —Sherry Hock, Joan Miller, Carolyn Leidy and Janet Martocci

Trees of Life



(This column draws connections between faith and creation.)



Recently I purchased the book "The Future We Choose: Surviving the Climate Crisis." The jacket describes it as "a cautionary but hopeful book about the world's changing climate and its impact on the fate of humanity." It is not written from a theological perspective, but its opening epigraph and table of contents suggests connections to the way of Jesus. The epigraph is is a quote from Indian poet and thinker Rabindranath Tagore (1861-1902), which says: "Let us not pray to be shel-

tered from dangers, but to be fearless when facing them." This reminds me of two prayers in the New Testament. First, that of Jesus who asks the Father not to take his followers out of the world, but to keep them safe from the evil one. (John 17:15). Second, the prayer of believers in Jerusalem who ask for boldness to speak God's word in the midst of danger and threat. (Acts 4:29)

The Table of Contents in "The Future We Choose" includes "Endless Abundance," "Radical Regeneration," "Let Go of the Old World," "Face Your Grief but Hold a Vision of the Future," and "A New Story." Many of the words and deeds of Jesus fit well with those titles.

Connections between the Jesus Way and the challenges of climate change have been noted by Bill McKibben. McKibben is a longtime leader of the climate movement and is also a Christian, of the Methodist variety. In 2006 he said, "Climate change is an opportunity for which the church was born." I think he's on to something. For if the world is to thrive, change in our lives and generosity towards others are necessary. These values, which we have not always lived, are fundamental to the way of Jesus. When we put those values into action, we join with all people of good will to care for the earth and to bless the generations that will follow us.
