The days are getting longer, the weather is getting warmer. Spring is finally upon us. Did you know that the word *Lent* comes from an old English word that means "spring?" (Think of *Lent* = *lengthen*, like the daylight is doing.)

Throughout Lent this year, we've been looking at ways to deal with the difficult times in our lives. I invite you to continue this journey with me into April. I also invite you to join us for Holy Week, and especially the Great Three Days, the time when we focus most closely on the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, the culmination of Lent, the high point of the church year, the observance and celebration of our salvation!

Our services are listed below. I hope you can make these services part of your Lenten observance this year. All are welcome.

Sunday, 4/13, 9:45 a.m.: Palm Sunday/Sunday of the Passion. This special Sunday service begins with Palm Sunday, the day we celebrate Christ's arrival at Jerusalem in glory the Sunday before his crucifixion. The service then pivots to Sunday of the Passion, remembering the story of his arrest and death. This service features palm branches to wave, and the dramatic telling of the Passion story from memory.

Tuesday, 4/15, 7 p.m.: Taize Service. The music of the Taize community in France is beloved by Christians around the world. These simple, repetitive, meditative songs can be a deeply moving spiritual experience. We will have a guest guitarist to lead us. If the weather cooperates, this service will be outside in our grove.

Wednesday, 4/16, 7 p.m.: Stations of the Cross walk. We are blessed with beautifully painted Stations of the Cross on the walls of our sanctuary during Lent. I will lead us in a guided walk through these stations, with prayers and readings for each station.

Thursday, 4/17, 7 p.m.: Maundy Thursday, the first of the Great Three Days. We will remember Christ's institution of Holy Communion, as well as his betrayal and arrest. This service includes laying on of hands for confession and forgiveness, foot-washing, Holy Communion, and the stripping of the altar.

Friday, 4/18, 7 p.m.: Good Friday, the second of the Great Three Days. We will remember Christ's suffering and death for our sins. The service features the Adoration of the Cross and the Bidding Prayer.

Sunday, 4/20, 6 a.m.: Vigil of Easter, the third of the Great Three Days. This unique service begins outside with the lighting of the new fire. It continues in darkness with several readings and an affirmation of baptism, culminating in the bright celebration of Christ's resurrection. Bring bells to ring! If you've never attended a Vigil before, try it out!

Sunday, 4/20, 9:45 a.m.: Resurrection of Our Lord. Our regular worship service on Easter Day is filled with decorations, songs, and alleluias. Bring bells to ring!

I hope you can join us for worship during Lent and the Great Three Days.

New Project

Valley Youth House is a shelter for young people, often, when youth arrive at the shelter their only possessions are the clothes they are wearing. The shelter makes up "welcome baskets" for when youth arrive so that they can be given a warm welcome and a basket of items they can call their own (as well as take with them when they exit the shelter. The list of items is long, 17 items, Social Ministry is asking only for the following 10 items: toothbrush/toothpaste/floss; wash cloth/soap and soap holder; chap stick; bath towel; razors (male & female); deodorant (male & female). This was a project we did a couple of years ago and it was very successful, I have no double it will be again with your support. 

6261:

Something New, Yet Something Old

6261: 6 congregations sharing 2 full-time pastors, 6 Licensed Lay Ministers (LLMs), and 1 full-time deacon. A parish-type model presented by Bishop first Christopher deForest at the Synod Assembly of 2023. A flexible framework to help congregations collaborate and thrive, while remaining unique and true to their own God-given A model designed to gifts. vitalize each congregation as together, they expand their ministries within the

community. A focus on the Gospel by increasing opportunities for worship, Bible studies, service, music, and ministry into the community.

There are currently 15 different areas across the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod at various discernment and exploration points about 6261. There is at least one area in each of the Synod's 9 Mission Districts.

The Synod's first 6261 Ministry Community officially launched on February 1, 2025 in Reading, PA as the "Pretzel City." This partnership includes six congregations: Bethany Lutheran (West Reading), Christ Lutheran (Reading), Hope Lutheran (Reading), Nativity Lutheran (Reading), St. Paul Lutheran (Reading), and Zion Spies Lutheran (Reading) along with Hope's Table (a Synod-Authorized Worshipping Community).

On February 19th, the Pretzel City 6261 Ministry Community hosted a potluck dinner, hymn sing, and celebration worship, co-lead by Bishop deForest and Deacon Kat Tigerman. In addition to the six Pretzel City congregations and 2 of their LLM candidates, members of Synod Council and congregations from around the Synod and West Berks Mission District attended to mark this momentous occasion.

The celebration worship included a reflection on the primary ministry project of the Pretzel City 6261: a food web ministry. Pastor Rebecca Knox gave this reflection, drawing on Psalm 126 and

how God brought these congregations to this joyful point and will be with them as thev continue to plant seeds, literally both and spiritually. Bishop deForest led а participatory reflection on Isaiah 58 including loud shouts of praise and the kind of fasting God wants: for us to love, heal, and



engage with our neighbors. Bishop deForest also lifted up the sacrifice each congregation made for the good of the whole 6261 Ministry Community so that it could more fully live into this "fasting" call of service. The 6261 Ministry Community Covenant was signed by each President of the 6 congregations, and each congregation received a Pretzel City plaque as a reminder of their partnership and commitment to pray for one another. A joint 30-person choir sang "Lord, We

> One United." As а beautiful anthem for the offertory right after from members each congregation and Pastor Bruce Osterhout led the assembly in prayer. Worship concluded with Holy Communion and a special update from Pastor Drew Neidig celebrating some surprise gifts to the Pretzel City Bundle to help

with their food web ministry. We are blessed to see such hope among us in such unprecedented times. We celebrate with Pretzel City, knowing that God goes before each of us on our ministry journeys so that we may have life abundantly (John 10:10).
