Lent begins this year on Wednesday, March 5, and ends with the beginning of the Great Three Days on Maundy Thursday, April 17. Lent is a special time of the year, a forty-day journey in which we are reminded of our baptism, reminded that we are creatures of God. Throughout Lent it is good to ponder and honestly consider ourselves, our world, and our relationship with God. And through that pondering, we might just find a glimpse of God's amazing grace operating within and among us.

On the Sundays in Lent this year, we will be looking through the gospel of Luke at stories that connect with some of our experiences in life today. I plan to focus in sermons on what we are called to do in the face of the suffering in our world. We will be exploring questions like, "What do we do when others are violent?" "What do we do when good people die?" "What do we do when we are tempted while suffering?" Together, we'll explore what it means to be faithful in a world that knows pain.

There are a few other offerings for Lent this year. Some of you have joined in a book study I'm leading, entitled By Heart: Conversations with Luther's Small Catechism. Kim Jennings will be leading a discussion in the Thursday morning POP Seekers coffee hour, exploring Max Lucado's *In the Footsteps of the Savior*.

And of course, our Lenten journey in the church is always book-ended by special worship services, as follows:

- * Holy Tuesday, April 15: Taize service, 7:00 p.m. (in the grove, weather permitting)
- ❖ Holy Wednesday, April 16: Stations of the Cross walk, 7:00 p.m.
- ❖ Maundy Thursday, April 17: Worship with Foot Washing and Confession of Sins, 7:00 p.m.
- ❖ Good Friday, April 18: Worship with Silence and the Procession of the Cross, 7:00 p.m.
- ❖ Great Vigil of Easter, April 20: "Sunrise service" at 6:00 a.m.
- ❖ **Resurrection of Our Lord**, April 20: Easter worship at 9:45 a.m.

I wish you a blessed Lenten journey this year. I hope to see you at one or many of these opportunities.



CAUTION

BE CAREFUL OF ONLINE SCAMS

You may have recently received an email or text that said it was from Pastor Scholtes, which asked you for help in getting a gift card. If you looked closely, however, these messages were not from Pastor's email or phone number, but from a scammer pretending to be him. We believe that these scammers have gotten information from our church website and have used it to try to defraud you. The church is doing what we can to reduce the likelihood of scams like these in the future, including removing all personal phone numbers and email addresses from newsletters on our website. There are some tips you can follow as well, to help prevent yourself from being the victim of such a "phishing" scam:

- 1. If there is a lot of misspelling in an email address, it might be phishing, or if there is wrong punctuation in the email address.
- 2. If you don't recognize the email address then verify it before you reply.
- 3. Don't give out any sensitive information (personal, financial, or security(passwords) to ANYONE unless you have verified their identity.
- 4. Don't click on any suspicious link or attachment.

Social Ministry Project:

The VALOR Clinic Foundation provides veteran families in crisis with holiday meals at Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas. They provide a complete day's meal starting with breakfast and ending with dessert. This helps families from having to decide between paying the bills or having a holiday meal. In 2024 on Easter, they provided a complete meal for 125 veteran families, and the number increases each holiday. This committee decided we would help them by collecting 6 of the 21 items needed for a complete meal. The items are: 3 cans green beans; 3 cans of corn (if purchasing the green beans or corn please purchase 3 of each); 1 box stuffing; 1 box cake mix; 1 can frosting, and 1 can pie filling. 
Anthony D. and Jeanne M. Turtzo Scholarship application form is now available for completion.

Carrying Our Own Loads


We all start at the same place: "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23), and we are all rescued from this position in the same way: "But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8). God sees us all the same – sinners saved by his grace. Since we are all equal in his sight, there is no need to measure ourselves by our neighbors. The Apostle Paul, in our text above, declares this a fruitless exercise.

What is helpful, though, is to test our own actions. Am I using the gifts and talents God has given me in a way that brings him honor and that benefits the Body of Christ? Am I spending time in reading his Word and in prayer to him? Am I joining in Christian fellowship as the Word of God is preached and the Sacraments are administered? Am I encouraging others to do good deeds? Am I giving sacrificially and humbly? How am I building up my pastor(s) so he can effectively preach the Word and care for the flock in his care?

As we examine our actions, we must also examine our motives. Do I do "good things" because I'm a prominent member of the congregation and it's expected of me? Do I labor in the church so I'll be noticed and commended? Do I serve others and give of my time in order to earn God's favor? God forbid that those should be our motives! Rather, we say with Paul, "Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, and therefore all died. And he died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again" (2 Corinthians 5:14-15).

Finding the Good Life

Most people believe that money brings happiness, so they always want more of it. But money does not bring happiness. Money and the things that money can buy do not produce the good life. The good life is taking "hold of the life that is truly life" (1 Timothy 6:19) and in using what God has given us to build his kingdom. Building Connections, Strengthening Mission: The Impact of Staff Development

Since 2021, when I joined the synod staff, I have felt a deep passion and dedication for the work God is calling me to do. Over the past three years, the relationships I have built, both with synod staff throughout the synod regions and beyond, have been some of the strongest of my career. I have been a Lutheran all my life, raised in a church and family of faith. So, when the job opened at the synod office, applying felt like a natural choice.



My time on synod staff has shaped my spiritual journey, revealing how God's presence is truly in everyone, including me, in both joyful and challenging times. I often find myself asking, "What is God calling us to do?" "What is God calling me to do?" It's funny how sometimes God's answers are loud and clear, while other times, there seems to be silence, much like a parent stepping back to let a child solve a puzzle or get dressed all on their own.

However, God is not silent in the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod. God is actively working through all of us to move mountains and embody the change Jesus modeled for us. The synod staff have been focusing more intentionally on communication and staff development. Over the past year, the full synod staff, including building staff and the Associates of the Bishop, have gathered for retreats to strengthen our communication. One of these retreats also included the Synod Council, the redesign team, and other key stakeholders around the synod, providing a space for collaboration. Pastor Doug Hill from Abiding Hope in Littleton, Colorado, has helped facilitate some of these retreats, incorporating insights from the Gaining Strength cohorts. Through this work, staff have explored their enneagram numbers, gaining a deeper understanding of how our personalities intertwine and complement one another.

in staff help us grow into the disciples God would have us be. We're not static blobs; we're human beings with hearts, hands, feet, and brains. When we practice and learn, we become more aligned and attuned to the Spirit's work in us and the synod.
