Dear Parish Family,

You will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.

As a student in the seminary, I was required to teach religion classes in the local state primary school at Manly. One day, I was teaching a class of year fours, and I asked them to draw for me a picture of what the Ascension might look like. Well, most of them did a fairly conventional portrait of Jesus rising up on a cloud or just rising up. However, I remember one of the students, who was a particularly gifted artist, he had Jesus blasting off into the sky with Jesus holding on to a rocket. On the side of the rocket, it had NASA. I asked why a rocket, and he said..."Jesus had a long way to go"!

Since Easter we have been reflecting upon our life, in light of the resurrection and what it means to us. Over the last Sunday's, our gospels had Jesus at the last supper reflecting upon going home and trying to comfort his disciples by talking about the coming of the advocate, the Holy Spirit. He reflected upon the gifts of love and peace and how wondrous but also challenging these gifts are if we are to live these in the world. Now he talks about witnessing to the truth – *not many days from now, (you) will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.* A baptism that will help, guide and shape the church to proclaim and be the good news to the end of earth and until the end of time.

The author of the gospel of Luke is also the author of the Acts of the Apostles ...this weekend's gospel and first reading. We could say, as one book ends, the other begins as the gospel finishes with Jesus' Ascension and Acts begins with the story of the Ascension. It highlights the life of the disciples after the Ascension and Pentecost telling the story of spreading the good news even further then Jesus was able to do in his earthly life. The Acts of the Apostles really doesn't end at Acts 28.31 (that's the end of that book) because that's all that was recorded. Why? The Acts continues in the same ministry carried on by millions of people just like you and me throughout time and place.

As we conclude Reconciliation Week, the opportunity for reconciliation never ends as we are challenged by the Spirit in the call to love, peace and truth. Reconciliation takes place when we sit at table together, when we listen and not just hear, when we love and are loved, when we bring peace and experience peace, when we forgive and are forgiven. We have come a long way, we can't change our past, but we can acknowledge its hurts and pain and make a better present and future. As Pope St John Paul II once said to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities: You are part of Australia and Australia is part of you. And the Church herself in Australia will not be fully the Church that Jesus wants her to be until you have made your contribution to her life and until that contribution has been joyfully received by others.

As we approach Pentecost next weekend....we will hold our Gifting Sunday asking for you to put up your hand to support the various ministries within our parishes. As St Peter writes....Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received. (1 Peter 4:10) What gift am I already gifting to our community or what could I gift? As we pray come Holy Spirit come.

Sunday 01 June 2025 Ascension of the Lord Year C

First Reading (Acts of the Apostles 1:1-11)

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is,' he had said, 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.'

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'

Responsorial Psalm (Ps 46: 2-3. 6-7. 8-9. Rv.6)

(R.) God mounts his throne to shouts of joy: a blare of trumpets for the Lord.

- 1. All peoples, clap your hands, cry to God with shouts of joy! For the Lord, the Most High, we must fear, great king over all the earth. (R.)
- 2. God goes up with shouts of joy; the Lord goes up with trumpet blast. Sing praise for God, sing praise, sing praise to our king, sing praise. (R.)

3. God is king of all the earth. Sing praise with all your skill. God is king over the nations; God reigns on his holy throne. (R.)

Second Reading (Ephesians 1: 17-23)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians

May the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, give you a spirit of wisdom and perception of what is revealed, to bring you to full knowledge of him. May he enlighten the eyes of your mind so that you can see what hope his call holds for you, what rich glories he has promised the saints will inherit and how infinitely great is the power that he has exercised for us believers. This you can tell from the strength of his power at work in Christ, when he used it to raise him from the dead and to make him sit at his right hand, in heaven, far above every Sovereignty, Authority, Power, or Domination, or any other name that can be named, not only in this age, but also in the age to come. He has put all things under his feet, and made him, as the ruler of everything, the head of the Church; which is his body, the fullness of him who fills the whole creation.

Gospel Acclamation (Matthew 28: 19. 20)

Alleluia, alleluia! Go and teach all people my gospel I am with you always, until the end of the world. Alleluia!

Gospel (Luke 24: 46-53)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Jesus said to his disciples: 'You see how it is written that the Christ would suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that, in his name, repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses to this.

'And now I am sending down to you what the Father has promised. Stay in the city then, until you are clothed with the power from on high.' Then he took them out as far as the outskirts of Bethany, and lifting up his hands he blessed them. Now as he blessed them, he withdrew from them and was carried up to heaven. They worshipped him and then went back to Jerusalem full of joy; and they were continually in the Temple praising God.

Reader: That those who have died will be raised to new life with Spirit, especially John McEwen, Fr John McEnearney and Ross Turton whose anniversaries occur during this time.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

Presider: God of all ages, through your mighty power you have glorified Jesus who ascended into heaven. Hear our prayers and send us forth as your witnesses to all the earth. We ask this in the name of Jesus your Son.

What's happening in the Diocese and Surrounds ...

Join us for the Called & Gifted Discernment Process

The Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle is excited during the Jubilee Year to launch the Called & Gifted Discernment Process within the Diocese. The process is designed to help Christians discern the presence of charisms in their lives. Charisms, or spiritual gifts, are special abilities given to all Christians by the Holy Spirit to give them power both to represent Christ and to be a channel of God's goodness for people. Mission & Evangelisation is working directly with the Catherine of Siena Institute to offer the Called & Gifted Discernment Process this year. The process will be facilitated online by professionally trained practitioners based in the USA.

Part One of the Called & Gifted process will take place across four Tuesday evenings from **10 June to 1 July, 7:30pm - 9:00pm** and you will learn:

- The role of every Catholic and of the local parish in the mission of the Church to the world.
- The critical role of charisms in the life and service of other lay Catholics and in the life of the parish or Christian community.
- The signs and characteristics of 24 common charisms.
- How discerning and using your charisms can change your life and the life of others, your parish, and the world.

Part two of the process will be a **one hour personal gifts interview** held from 7 **July to 25 July**. Experienced CSI-trained gifts interviewers will be helping you with recognising patterns in your life that may indicate the presence of a charism and choose one charism to discern.

Part three of the process is **Discernment in Faith** held across 4 Tuesday evenings from **29 July to 9 September.** You will now be put into practice what you have learned about discernment. You will pick one charism to "experiment with" (two hours a week for a minimum of 6 - 8 weeks) – and see what God does!


2025 NAIDOC WEEK COMMUNITY FESTIVAL

Let us continue to be a people of compassion and action. In times like these, the Gospel is made visible not only in our words, but in our willingness to accompany and uplift one another.



LATEST NEWS FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS 01 JUNE 2025

The **Promoters of Safeguarding** continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish.

The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of protection within our Parish. In view of our current diocesan flooding, we mention **supporting young people during the recovery phase following a natural disaster**. They may be suffering from losses which are:

- Direct loss of possessions, loss of sense of safety, death of loved ones or pets/animals.
- Indirect through stories of family and friends affected, and children's increased likelihood of viewing graphic content, particularly via social media.

The following tips are helpful in the initial days and weeks following a natural disaster:

- Discuss the importance of young people's need to focus on physical and emotional safety
- Support young people to engage in activities that promote a sense of calmness
- Supporting young people to return to some routine and to get back to doing what they used to do as much as possible (e.g. school, games, sports, hobbies)
- Support connection with others, especially those who help young people feel OK.
- Include young people in the repair and recovery of their community and support them to identify ways that they can safely connect with themselves, peers, and families in ways that are meaningful and purposeful to them.
- Limit exposure to traumatic information through stories and media (social and traditional).
