Dear Parish Family,

In some ways natural disasters are beyond our ability to control. I say 'in some ways' mostly due to their very nature being an 'Act of God'. That said however they are often exacerbated by 'man's' either greed, corruption or incompetence as buildings are built for example by cutting corners, falling too many trees or in unsafe places. The devastation is no less real for those who fall victim to the natural disaster, homes and lives lost, grief, hunger, homelessness are a result. There is much then for those around to be generous and much too as a response in empathy from all of us who share in the human condition that has to transcend either creed, race, place or faith. We are all human, brothers and sisters, created in God's image after all. You may well have already made a response to the Haiti appeal, given to Catholiccare's August appeal or indeed dropped food into our little bins before we were in lockdown. On their behalf I thank you for your acts of kindness and generosity.

There are many things to be overwhelmed by in our world at the moment: not least amongst them are the tragedies unfolding in Afghanistan, Haiti and Turkey.

If you are looking for an interesting movie see about watching 'The Man Who Sued God' starring Billy Connolly. For all of the commentary in it there are many interesting points to reflect upon.

I have been challenged by Joe Biden's response to the situation in Afghanistan and indeed Scott Morrison's. What could have been done differently I ask myself? Maybe sticking to the original plan of a much slower withdrawal may well have saved lives. The 'photo' opportunity of pulling out on the anniversary of 9/11 I suppose, to good an opportunity to pass up but at what cost! I have vague memories the end of World War II was planned to coincide with a significant date as well, prolonging a conflict that could well have ended much earlier and with some significant savings to loss of life and damage to communities and property.

I think what is challenging however is the seemingly disregard for life and a lack of ownership for getting wrong from two supposedly Christian men. Clearly they don't see it the way I do. The human side of all of us seeks to find blame else where when we get it wrong and there is a natural part of the human condition that seeks revenge for wrongs and hurts. It is not the Catholic or Christian way however. Jesus teaches and models something very different. Joe Biden's commentary in the wake of the latest bombings in Kabul whilst reflecting the natural desire for payback and never forget is hardly the order of the Christian call. Bringing to justice however quite different. I find it hard to go past, that much of what we are seeing right now in Afghanistan has been caused by Western leadership. Wouldn't it be nice if one politician might step up and say 'I got that wrong' or indeed say 'I'm sorry' and actually mean it.

Sadly I suspect many might think less of them in that scenario rather than more, not appreciating both their honesty and a desire to find ways to make things right, that owning our guilt, really owning our guilt, demands. I'm not sure how anyone is going to make Afghanistan right now. Or how any more people are going to be saved now that Islamic State has waged into the devastation unfolding there. Whilst I know that sometimes this can feel futile when things look so horrible all we have sometimes is an ability to pray, and in this case pray we must.

And should we get a chance to own our own infallibilities and frailties we need to take it with both hands. What the world really needs right now is peace and healing. Forgiveness and Reconciliation are the only ways we can truly bring peace and offer healing. In the small and in the large when we say I am sorry, mean it and seek to heal what has been broken we send out into the world the peace that Jesus sought to bring and to leave with us. It is life and too the full!

There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not re-

spect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture: This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me. The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are only human regulations. You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.' He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within and make a man unclean.'

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LATEST NEWS FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS

The **Promoters of Safeguarding** continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish. So, in preparation for **National Child Protection Week** (5th-11th September 2021), we are raising awareness about protecting the rights of children and preventing child abuse. This is a job for everyone in our community through educating ourselves about how to have a child-safe environment by monitoring them, listening to them, believing them, speaking up if you believe something is unsafe.

To this end, we are sharing with parents, grandparents and community members, the following top 10 internet safety rules:

1. **Do not** communicate your address nor personal information online.
2. Maintain **privacy settings** when accessing major websites such as Facebook.
3. Practice **safe browsing** – avoid dubious websites as these could share your personal information or infect your device with malware.
4. Ensure your internet **connection is secure** (not a public WiFi connection) before you provide details of your bank accounts.
5. Be mindful that downloads can try to **steal information** or contain **malware** (software intentionally designed to cause damage to a computer or client) which can be disguised in innocent-looking apps such as games, traffic reports or weather.
6. Choose a **strong password** that is unique and complex – at least 15 characters with a mix of letters, numbers and special characters (eg. ! @#\$\$%^&*).
7. Make online purchases from **secure websites** – those with addresses which commence with a **padlock symbol** next to the address bar or commence with **https:** (the 's' stands for 'secure') rather than those that commence with **http:**
8. Be careful what you **post online** – any comment or image posted may remain online forever because removing what you posted does not remove whatever someone else has already copied.
9. Be careful of who you **meet online** – they may not always be who they claim to be.
10. Keep your **antivirus program** up to date – internet security software can prevent and remove most malware.

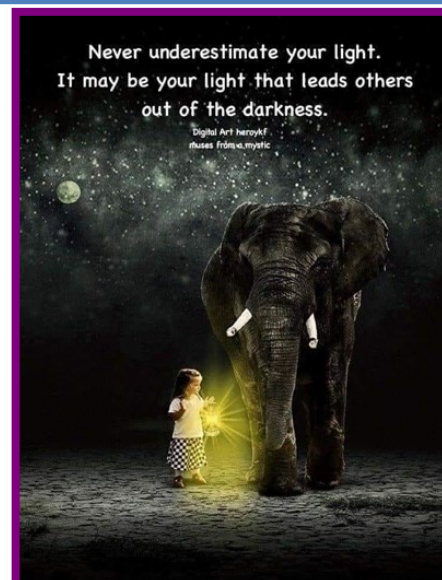

NATIONAL CHILD PROTECTION WEEK 2021

5-11 SEPTEMBER

EVERY CHILD IN EVERY COMMUNITY NEEDS A FAIR GO

BUSINESSES Play their part to protect and care for children and young people in their community by supporting family and friendly environments and sponsoring local organisations.

Ensure conditions of employment value parents and families. Parental and carers' leave recognises the importance of parents having time to build relationships with newborns, to care for children and support each other. Such conditions show that you value your staff as parents as well as employees.

Have flexible, family friendly work conditions and job share available to staff who are parents and carers. Flexibility allows parents to meet the needs of their family, and better cope in times of stress. Partner with a local community organisation or school to support children and families. For example, sponsoring a children's sporting activity increases opportunity for families to be involved in their community.

Be family-friendly and welcome children, for example smiling at and acknowledging children through to providing a play area, that can be supervised by parents or staff, and provide baby change facilities in your business. This recognises the place of children in our society and improves families' access to your business.

If you work with children and young people, develop policies and procedures to guide you and your employees: a child protection policy should promote wellbeing and early intervention practices, as well as be consistent with state/territory mandatory reporting legislation. Ensure and verify that all staff and volunteers engaged in child related work hold a valid Working With Children Check.

Also, a code of conduct for working with children and young people is a practical tool for promoting clear and consistent roles and behaviour. When implemented and supported consistently, these policies work to protect children, workers and the organisation.

Think about safe and respectful ways to be an active bystander if you see an adult being inappropriate towards a child or young person.

RELIGIOUS COMMUNITIE

Play their part to protect and care for children and young people in their community by supporting families and promoting children and young people's health and wellbeing.

Be a positive role model. Children and young people learn from the people that they spend time with, so make your influence positive.

Facilitate a youth friendly environment by creating opportunities for children and young people to engage in and be heard. This could include providing a youth space, holding a community event to showcase children's achievements, or developing a youth action network.

Become informed on the indicators and risks of child abuse and neglect as well as preventative measures. This will increase your awareness of how to support families in your community and prevent harm.

Develop means for family networking and support groups through communication channels such as notice boards, newsletters, online and social media or offering practical support. Reach out to families who are isolated. Be available and approachable.

Develop child related policies and procedures. Child Protection Policies should promote wellbeing and early intervention practices and be consistent with state/territory mandatory reporting legislation.

A code of conduct for working with children and young people is another practical tool for promoting clear and consistent roles and behaviour. Ensure that all staff and volunteers engaged in child related work hold a valid Working With Children Check. When implemented and supported consistently, these policies work to protect children, workers and the organisation.

Support Schools in their promotion of children and young people's safety and wellbeing. Openly encourage reviews of pastoral care systems to ensure they are meeting the needs of staff and students.

Consider the impact on children / young people when making service delivery decisions. Be open to making connections with any child, young person or community member who needs your support regardless of cultural background or religious beliefs, to further perpetuate an environment of acceptance and tolerance.

Think about safe and respectful ways to be an active bystander if you see an adult being inappropriate towards a child or young person.

aMeN caMiNo 2022: Information Session

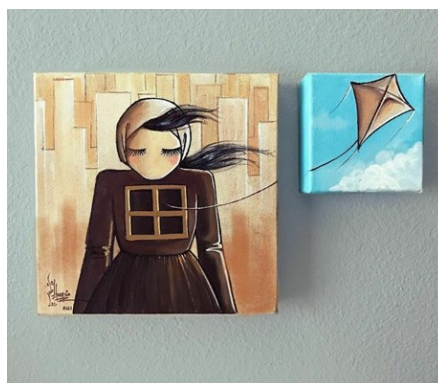
