Dear Parish Family,

On the Cross of Christ Lies our Victory

The people of God as they embarked on their Liberation journey from Egypt to the Promised Land, were faced with challenges in the wilderness and lost patience with God and complained against Him and Moses. God sent snakes to bite them to death. Finding themselves in such a deadly situation, they accepted and acknowledged their wrongdoing and requested Moses to plead on their behalf. Moses pleaded and God gave instructions on what should be done for their safety. A bronze serpent was to be moulded and set up on a pole such that those bitten would look at the bronze serpent and be cured.

Moses lifted up the bronze serpent in the wilderness and those affected by the snake venom looked up at it and were healed. After so many years, in a clearer fashion, Christ in our time was lifted up and crucified on the cross, that all who believe in Him and follow His way might be liberated and saved. This was in line with what Christ said about Himself in today's gospel that, "as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life."

The cross was an object of mockery, in the time of Jesus. It was designated for those who committed heinous crimes and was chosen by Jesus to show the depth of His Love for us. Identifying with us and acknowledging our sinfulness before His Father, "He bore our sins in his body on the tree (cross), that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By his wounds you (we) have been healed" (1Pet. 2:24). Primarily, it was not only our sins that took Him to the cross but His Love for us which surpasses everything.

The salvation offered to the Israelites in the wilderness through the bronze serpent was perfected in Christ as salvation offered to the entire children of God through the Cross. We are now liberated and are victorious through the Cross of Christ. Therefore, in celebrating the Feast of Exaltation of the Cross, "we are reminded that the cross was not the defeat of Jesus or the defeat of love, but rather the triumph of Jesus and of God's love for us."(MK)

Considering the 'cross' from this perspective, how do we go about the crosses that come our way in our lives. In the gospel of last Sunday, our Lord Jesus Christ told us, "Anyone who does not carry his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple". How are you handling your own cross?

So, today September 14th the Church celebrates the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, also known as the Feast of the Triumph of the Cross. This feast commemorates the discovery of the True Cross in 326 by St Helena the mother of Emperor Constantine; initial exaltation of the cross for public veneration at the Church of Sepulchre in 335; and the recovery of the Cross from the Persians in 628 by Emperor Heraclius. In this celebration, we look at the true cross of Christ as the ultimate symbol of Christ's victory over death and a sign of healing, hope, and divine love for all humanity.

Again, in solidarity with the Church throughout Australia as it observes National Safeguarding Sunday, our diocese also marks the Perpetual Day of Remembrance, the day we remember with heavy hearts, the wounds inflicted to the body of Christ - the Church, and to some of her members - the abuse of children, young people, and vulnerable adults, by some ministers of the Church and her representatives. We keep praying for the victims.

Sunday 14 September 2025 The Exaltation of the Holy Cross, Feast

First Reading (Numbers 21: 4-9)

A reading from the book of Numbers

On the way through the wilderness, the Israelites lost patience. They spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt to die in this wilderness? For there is neither bread nor water here; we are sick of this unsatisfying food.'

At this God sent fiery serpents among the people; their bite brought death to many in Israel. The people came and said to Moses, 'We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you. Intercede for us with the Lord to save us from these serpents.' Moses interceded for the people, and the Lord answered him, 'Make a fiery serpent and put it on a standard. If anyone is bitten and looks at it, he shall live.' So Moses fashioned a bronze serpent which he put on a standard, and if anyone was bitten by a serpent, he looked at the bronze serpent and lived.

Responsorial Psalm (Ps 77: 1-2. 34-38. R.v.7)

(R.) Do not forget the works of the Lord!

- 1. Give heed, my people, to my teaching; turn your ear to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth in a parable and reveal hidden lessons of the past. (R.)
- 2. When he slew them then they would seek him, return and seek him in earnest. They would remember that God was their rock, God the Most High their redeemer. (R.)
- 3. But the words they spoke were mere flattery; they lied to him with their lips. For their hearts were not truly with him; they were not faithful to his covenant. (R.)
- 4. Yet he who is full of compassion forgave their sin and spared them. So often he held back his anger when he might have stirred up his rage. (R.)

Second Reading (Philippians 2: 6-11)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to Philippians

The state of Jesus was divine, yet he did not cling to his equality with God but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave, and became as men are; and being as all men are, he was humbler yet, even to accepting death, death on a cross. But God raised him High and gave him the name which is above all other Names so that all beings in the heavens, on earth and in the underworld, should bend the

knee at the name of Jesus and that every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia! We adore you, O Christ, and we praise you, because by your cross you have redeemed the world. Alleluia!

Gospel (John 3: 13-17)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus said to Nicodemus:

'No one has gone up to heaven except the one who came down from heaven, the Son of Man who is in heaven; and the Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved.'

Together we are all on the path of healing and as today's liturgical celebration calls for the faithful to look upon the Cross and see there the revelation of divine love that embraces all humanity and offers new life wherever there is suffering and death, let us respond positively to Bishop Michael's calling, as he invites "those who have been hurt and are still hurting in any way because of abuse, either personally or because you are a member of the Body of Christ, to bring your hurt, your anger, your suffering, to the cross of Jesus Christ, look upon Christ there and know the love of God for you, know that he wants to set you free, know that he wants to and will lead us all from this wilderness."(MK)

Finally, as we humbly resolve to carry our crosses and follow Christ, we must make sure that we are not the cross others are carrying, that our attitudes are not the burdens others are suffering from, that our deliberate silence and omissions are not the pains others are going through. May we learn from the Cross of Christ, 'Love not hatred, Compassion not indifference, Forgiveness not vengeance' (Pope Francis).



LATEST NEWS FROM OUR

SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS 14 SEPTEMBER 2025

The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish. This week, your attention is drawn to 'Safe and Savvy: A Guide to Help Older People Avoid Abuse Scams and Fraud.'

Elder financial abuse can take many forms and can include repeated or oneoff actions, threats or even a lack of action. Here are the last 5 most common types of abuse.

- 1. **Theft** While theft is a risk for all people, older people are particularly at risk, especially if they have care needs. Thieves can exploit an older person's specific physical or mental vulnerabilities.
- 2. **Inheritance impatience** This occurs when adults feel entitled to an ageing relative's assets. This could cause them to try and take their assets from them. Examples include stealing money from parents' bank accounts, or transferring assets to another person.
- 3. **Guarantors gone wrong** Often older parents will help their adult children purchase a home or start a business by being a guarantor to a loan. In some cases, this can create situations where the older parents might lose their home, despite there being no bad intent.
- 4. **Failure to provide promised care** This occurs when an (often well-intentioned) arrangement for family members to provide care to older relatives in exchange for financial assistance breaks down, often because of a change in circumstance (e.g. employment) for the younger person.
- 5. **Emotional blackmail** This can be one of the subtlest and least visible forms of abuse. Examples include an adult child refusing access to grandchildren, except in return for a loan; or an emotionally dependent adult child abusing their parents' concern by demanding money.

Financial abuse is often not technically illegal – Often elder financial abuse involves someone unethically exploiting power of attorney or other legal mechanisms that give them control over an older person's assets.

Financial abuse often causes psychological, not physical harm – Often elder financial abuse doesn't involve obvious physical threats or violence (although it sometimes does). Instead, the abuser inflicts profound emotional harm and psychological distress on the victim.
