Dear Parish Family,

I was watching a documentary out of America recently on a phenomenon affecting many of their young people, and I would presume ours too. I learnt a new word out of the documentary, 'sextortion.' Teenagers and young adults sending explicit photos of themselves to what they believe is a young person their own age. Instead, they have been caught up in a scam, often international, from our 'favourite' scamming country, although those being arrested include people from within local communities. Scammers demanding money to keep the photos or videos from being made public.

These young people often find themselves blackmailed and with huge demands for money. The threat to send these explicit photos publicly to their family and friends. You can put some of the dots yourselves I guess to the fatal outcome for these young people who find themselves feeling like there is no way out. The embarrassment too much.

There is a push in America from the victims' families for media platforms to be more accountable for what happens on their platforms and for the government to do more to bring those responsible to justice. It is a common conversation it seems right around the world with no real solution or outcome.

The parents interviewed had been vigilant with the young person's internet usage. Young adults are adults. They had done everything. What struck me however was a comment that many of the parents made: they had had the conversation about don't do it, don't send photos, be careful what you post on social media – all the don'ts, what they hadn't done they said was an important part of the conversation 'but if you do come and tell me', 'if something goes wrong I can help fix it', nothing is so bad that I can't help', 'if you do I am here'. They had done all the don't dos but not the 'if you do, I am here.'

That's our message as a community all the time isn't it. Reconciliation, forgiveness, fresh start are all part of the Christian message. Nothing is too big that God cannot forgive, heal, fix, mend or give a fresh start too. There are ramifications and obligations sometimes, together though they can be faced. Nothing though in his love that cannot be given that new start too. We hear the don't do but I wonder how many of us take seriously 'but if you do, I am here' of Jesus voice.

I wondered parents whether that was something you might think about for your teenage children and grandparents for your grandchildren. It's a conversation worth having. They are a lot more vulnerable in this modern world than I was. We all have a part to play in keeping them safe.

First Reading

(2 Chronicles 36:14-16. 19-23)

A reading from the second book of Chronicles

All the heads of the priesthood, and the people too, added infidelity to infidelity, copying all the shameful practices of the nations and defiling the Temple that the Lord had consecrated for himself in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, tirelessly sent them messenger after messenger, since he wished to spare his people and his house. But they ridiculed the messengers of God, they despised his words, they laughed at his prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against his people that there was no further remedy.

Their enemies burned down the Temple of God, demolished the walls of Jerusalem, set fire to all its palaces, and destroyed everything of value in it. The survivors were deported by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon; they were to serve him and his sons until the kingdom of Persia came to power. This is how the word of the Lord was fulfilled that he spoke through Jeremiah, 'Until this land has enjoyed its sabbath rest, until seventy years have gone by, it will keep sabbath throughout the days of its desolation.'

And in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord that was spoken through Jeremiah, the Lord roused the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to issue a proclamation and to have it publicly displayed throughout his kingdom: "Thus speaks Cyrus king of Persia, "The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth; he has ordered me to build him a Temple in Jerusalem, in Judah. Whoever there is among you of all his people, may his God be with him! Let him go up."

Because it is by grace that you have been saved, through faith; not by anything of your own, but by a gift from God; not by anything that you have done, so that nobody can claim the credit. We are God's work of art, created in Christ Jesus to live the good life as from the beginning he had meant us to live it.

Jesus said to Nicodemus:

'The Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved. No one who believes in him will be condemned; but whoever refuses to believe is condemned already, because he has refused to believe in the name of God's only Son. On these grounds is sentence pronounced: that though the light has come into the world men have shown they prefer darkness to the light because their deeds were evil. And indeed, everybody who does wrong hates the light and avoids it, for fear his actions should be exposed: but the man who lives by the truth comes out into the light, so that it may be plainly seen that what he does is done in God.'



LATEST NEWS FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS

The **Promoters of Safeguarding** continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish.

This week our focus is on **Awareness about Gambling** with Young people.

With the NRL season underway, there is much discussion about the advertising and exposure of young people to gambling. Especially with the ease of access to apps which potentially allow unrestricted access to sites designed for adults.

Australians are the biggest gamblers in the world, losing \$23bn a year. Despite having just 0.3% of the world's population, Australia also has more than 20% of the world's poker machines – half of which are in NSW alone. (source <u>https://www.theeducatoronline.com/k12/news/why-fixing-australias-gambling-problem-starts-in-theclassroom/280863</u>)

The Office of Responsible Gambling's Youth Study 2020 found that over a third of young people aged 12-17 are gambling, mostly via purchases made in video games.

While these 'micro-transactions' might seem harmless, research by CQUniversity shows gamers who purchase the increasingly popular in-game feature of 'loot boxes' tend to gamble more often, and gamble larger amounts than those who don't.

A separate study, conducted by the Australian Gambling Research Centre, found 20% of adolescents who play simulated gambling games move to online commercial gambling.

Talking to young people about gambling gives them a chance to understand what gambling is and helps them make an informed decision about their gambling behaviour. It also highlights that the issue is important and can be a problem for some people. It can also give them guidance with regard to gambling responsibly. Some ideas to help you start a conversation:

- Talk about what gambling is and the different types of gambling that are in our community. Don't forget to mention the less obvious types of gambling such as lotteries, online gambling games including those found in video games.
- What is house advantage? The odds of winning on any game is hardly ever in your favour. Talk about probability in the sense that it does not matter how many times you have played the same game, the chances of winning have not changed. Even in well thought out sports betting, encourage the young person to understand that they are still relying on chance.
- The gambling industry exists to make a profit. Consider the reality of the gambling industry.
- Discuss peer pressure and family influences
- Talk about the reasons people gamble, not forgetting that this can be to escape negative thoughts and feelings to zone out.
- Discuss the differences between online gaming and gambling. It is good to send the message that some online games are considered gambling sites
- Discuss the difference between responsible gambling and problem gambling

Before you have this conversation be sure you know your stuff. If a young person asks you

a question and you do not know the answer, be honest and find the answer out together.

I am writing to let you know about our forthcoming online program **for Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion**.

Australian Catholic University's online training program for EMHCs is one of the most comprehensive online liturgical ministry training programs for Catholic parishes in Australia. It presents high quality, doctrinally sound content in an innovative way and it enables all communities, especially those with fewer resources or those in remote areas of the country, to access rich and engaging formation easily and to reach a greater number of people through a reliable, contemporary, and consistent learning experience.

Crucially, this program engages the role of an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion on a variety of levels. The development of practical hands-on skills in the local parish comes only after substantive formation in the history and theology of Eucharist and ministry.

As you may know, the ACU Centre for Liturgy is endorsed by Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and as a national centre for liturgical formation in Australia, ACU has the knowledge, technological capacity and educational expertise to provide locally-made, consistent liturgical ministry training on a national scale.


