Fifth Sunday of Lent Year B

Dear Parish Family,

Some of you will have had the opportunity to visit the sacred sites of Jesus life and our faith in the Holy Land. It saddens me somewhat that it could be many years before those sites are safe to visit again. To note too that even should I get to visit again they wont quite be the same. That part of our world has changed forever. It was incredibly difficult before it will harder now. And to know of the current conflict and its impact has altered those sites in ways yet to be felt.

Walking in the footsteps of Jesus has a profound impact on the Lenten Journey as it unfolds. The places that are referred to, I have had the privilege to see and touch; the garden of Gethsemane, Golgotha, the Sepulchre, the crown of thorns tree. The visuals enhance the scripture as it is read. It is no small thing if you can even to look these places up on google. Whilst you don't smell and hear you still can see.

I have been in the habit for years of watching movies with the passion or scriptural themes. I might have mentioned a couple of weeks back the great movie with Charleton Heston 'The Ten Commandments'. It was the first movie my family went to together. I remember it as the day I got my 'P' plates, so a number of things make it indelible in my brain. However, I can't hear or read the Exodus without some of the imagery of that movie. I know it is someone else's interpretation, but it really does aide my prayer and the invitation that I receive from the scriptures.

There are many other movies: 'Risen' is a particular favourite, so to 'The Passion' directed and produced by Mel Gibson. Not for the faint hearted but it does bring home the suffering Christ on the Cross and the price of the ransom paid. You might remember 'Ben Hur' somewhat dated but still good, 'The Gospel of John', and 'The Greatest Story Ever Told'. Whilst they might not appeal to a wide audience, they could appeal to family members as they gather with you over Easter. The older ones are a bit dated but good. 'The Passion' is incredibly graphic and I would adhere to the rating on the label. I have already mentioned 'The Ten Commandments' which is still powerful although probably lacking the modern cinematography of the modern movie maker. Kids will still love it, I think.

This weekend's Gospel has a significant amount of sacrifice contained in it. A dying to self and the values of the world. What are we prepared to let go so that we might have life and have it to the full. Sacrifice is almost anathema to a modern understanding of the world. I know as school systems, doesn't matter the system, we spend a lot of time helping young people get a sense of their own resilience, strength and wellbeing. Everything today is about wellbeing and a lot of that is personal wellbeing. The Gospels and scriptures give us all of that in how we live our lives together and in Christ. Failing as we hear isn't the end of the world. Rejection a hurdle to make us stronger. vilification and calumny a tool for growth, for digging deep, putting your head up not down. Loss and suffering a tool for getting through and going on. Everything we need to survive is found in the life we live in Christ and all of it leading us to the graces of new life, fresh starts and better days. It's a light for days of darkness, and a joy for days of celebration.

Looking forward to seeing you on Wednesday at the next step in our Lenten Journey with our brothers and sisters of the Watagan Deanery.

LATEST NEWS FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS

The **Promoters of Safeguarding** continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish.

This week our focus is on **Promoters of Safeguarding Network (PSN) meeting for the Diocese of Maitland -Newcastle in February 2024 regarding the 2023 Australian Catholic Safeguarding Ltd (ACSL) audit.**

The first 2024 Promoters of Safeguarding Network (PSN) meeting for the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle was held on Wednesday 28 February. This was a briefing on the 2023 Australian Catholic Safeguarding Ltd (ACSL) audit of our Diocese. This audit was a rigorous analysis of our compliance with the 10 National Catholic Safeguarding Standards Edition 2 regarding both children and vulnerable adults. A letter from Bishop Michael Kennedy regarding the audit has already been published in our Parish Bulletin.

Sean Tynan, Diocesan Director of the Office of Safeguarding, chaired the PSN meeting. He opened by saying:

- Parish safeguarding compliance is not about the destination, but a journey of continuous incremental improvement by setting realistic goals subject to available resources.
- Of the 98 indicators listed in the 10 National Catholic Safeguarding Standards Edition 2, only 50 require parish evidence as the remainder are the responsibility of the other agencies.
- All parishes require a formal evaluation of compliance with these 50 indicators – with 38 parishes in the Diocese, this process will be on an on-going rotation over a 5-year period with each parish being on a different step of an A to E cycle.
- 96 out of a possible 98 audit indicators have been either progressed or substantially progressed when reviewed against the compliance assessment scale – one of the highest scores for any Diocese in Australia.
- The 2 indicators still requiring progress come from the critical Standard 2: Children and adults are safe, informed and participate. Embedding these indicators have become points of focus in refining and improving safeguarding practices.
- The number of contacts with the Diocesan Office of Safeguarding has risen most concern PERSONAL rather than STRUCTURAL issues 2023 saw 2,000 contacts with most being general welfare concerns and only a small percentage leading to an enquiry.
- It is important for our Diocesan community to know that there is a process in handling an issue but not the 'nitty gritty' of that process about 20 cases are active at present.
- As yet, there have been no critical secular responses to the findings of the 2023 Australian Catholic Safeguarding Ltd (ACSL) audit of the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle.

I am writing to let you know about our forthcoming online program for Extraordinary **Ministers of Holy Communion.**

Australian Catholic University's online training program for EMHCs is one of the most comprehensive online liturgical ministry training programs for Catholic parishes in Australia. It presents high quality, doctrinally sound content in an innovative way and it enables all communities, especially those with fewer resources or those in remote areas of the country, to access rich and engaging formation easily and to reach a greater number of people through a reliable, contemporary, and consistent learning experience.

Crucially, this program engages the role of an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion on a variety of levels. The development of practical hands-on skills in the local parish comes only after substantive formation in the history and theology of Eucharist and ministry.

As you may know, the ACU Centre for Liturgy is endorsed by Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and as a national centre for liturgical formation in Australia, ACU has the knowledge, technological capacity and educational expertise to provide locally-made, consistent liturgical ministry training on a national scale.


