## **Facilitating Economic Development**

DI's vision is to serve as a convener and facilitator for economic development activities within losco County related to business development. The organization accomplishes this goal in several ways. For example, in 2023 DI had the County's leader for recycling efforts be the keynote speaker at its fall community meeting. In addition, DI co-hosted a government officials meeting with the County that spring to share pertinent information with leaders about the opportunities to expand recycling services across the county. Subsequently, in 2024, voters approved a millage that created three recycling centers in the south and east parts of the county. DI is pleased to bring important economic development related topics to the forefront of business, community leaders and residents' discussions.

# **Economic Development Capacity Building**

Over the course of 2024, DI assisted 17 members to secure more than \$2 million dollars in grants by accessing grant writing services funded by the State of Michigan's Office of Rural Prosperity's Rural Readiness grant. This \$50,000 grant made it possible for DI to educate nearly 100 people from more than 60 different organizations. We will continue offering grant writing assistance to members until the grant ends in May 2025. Members with projects are highly encouraged to reach out for project assistance.

# **Demographic Profile**

The population in Iosco County, Michigan was 25,319 per American Community Survey data for 2018-2022.

The region has a civilian labor force of 10,091 with a participation rate of 46.8%. Of individuals 25 to 64

in losco County, 17.2% have a bachelor's degree or higher which compares with 35.8% in the nation.

The median household income in losco County is \$46,224 and the median house value is \$118,400.



The Cost of Living Index estimates the relative price levels for consumer goods and services. When applied to wages and salaries, the result is a measure of relative purchasing power. The cost of living is 10.9% lower in losco County than the U.S. average.

# **Wage Trends**

The average worker in losco County earned annual wages of \$56,236 as of 2024Q2. Average annual wages per worker increased 1.7% in the region over the preceding four quarters. For comparison purposes, annual average wages were \$72,405 in the nation as of 2024Q2.

Annual average wages per worker data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and imputed where necessary. Data are updated through 2024Q1 with preliminary estimates updated to 2024Q2.

#### **FY 2024 ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

#### **Collaboration**

DI became a partner of the Northern Michigan Chamber Alliance, with support from both the Tawas Area and Oscoda-AuSable Chambers of Commerce, to represent economic development issues impacting losco County. DI's participation also advances visibility and solutions for Northeast Michigan at the state level.





The Michigan Office of Rural Prosperity invited DI's executive director, Chris Martin, to participate in a panel presentation for the Michigan Rural Prosperity Summit in May 2024 to share the outcomes of the grant writing assistance program for losco County units of government and nonprofit organizations. This program is now considered a statewide best practice model for economic development.

DI attended three statewide childcare events in Lansing hosted by Michigan's Early Childhood Investment Corporation and Pulse of the W.E. Upjohn Institute for Employment Research.





Alpena Community College provided DI access to office and meeting space at the Oscoda Campus to promote economic development and increase visibility of the organization on campus.

# Membership

DI membership increased by 93% in 2024, with 29 new members and one new sponsor generating \$11,000 in additional revenue.

DI members had a 81% renewal rate from 2023 to 2024 generating more than \$38,000 in revenue to support DI's economic development initiatives.

#### **FY 2024 INITIATIVES**

#### **Child Care**

DI completed the Quad County Child Care Coalition project, funded by Michigan's Department of Lifelong Education, Advancement & Potential (MI-LEAP)'s Early Childhood Investment Corporation (ECIC) in August 2024. The Coalition followed up its Child Care Innovation Report (January 2024) with a feasibility study on creating a separate 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization to provide back-office services to child care business owners.

The idea was embraced by other parts of the state and that new entity, the Child Care Back Office (CCBO), was launched in October 2024 and is poised to serve child care business owners across Michigan. The Consumers Energy Foundation and Pulse, from the W.E. Upjohn Institute for Employment Research, provided \$100,000 and \$25,000 in funding respectively to DI to fund the launch. DI was a founding member of CCBO and will continue to participate in supporting child care business owners and family's child care needs in losco County.






#### **Tourism and Recreation**

In 2024, the Develop Iosco Tourism & Recreation Committee was developed to collaborate and implement the promotion and marketing of Iosco County to enhance our tourism and recreation industry.

Key stakeholders for the 2024 committee were the Tawas Area Chamber, Tawas Area Convention & Visitors Bureau (CVB), Oscoda AuSable Chamber of Commerce, Oscoda Area CVB, Tawas Wellness Warriors, Michigan Works! Region 7B, MyMichiganBeach.com, Consumers Energy and the Friends of the Tawas Point Lighthouse.

Key accomplishments in 2024 include: Leading the East Tawas Cruise Ship Initiative, building a relationship with the Northeast Michigan Council of Governments (NEMCOG) to support regional tourism and their marketing campaign, gaining a seat on the US23 Sunrise Coastal Byway Management Council and marketing committee, working with NEMCOG to bring back the Discovery Tour and Legislative Tour as part of the US23 Sunrise Coastal Byway, working with NEMCOG on the potential development of a dark sky park in Iosco County including a potential location on the AuSable River and Lake Huron, and working with the Oscoda Buzz Hub to develop the losco Buzz Hub and connect to the NEMCOG regional event website.





# **Lower AuSable Prosperity Group**

DI participated in all four of the Lower AuSable Prosperity Group meetings in 2024, led by losco County, and has been an integral part of the development of the Prosperity Plan. This plan will help guide the community through any of the three possible scenarios for the future of the dams. We are eagerly awaiting to hear the decision that will be made by Consumers Energy in the first quarter of 2025 on the future of the dams in losco County.
