


'Rural' encompasses 94% of Michigan's geography and 20% of its population

Opportunities for Rural Michigan

Recent disruptions can reverse – or exacerbate – long-standing population and economic trends that impact health outcomes, educational attainment, and future income of rural residents

Remote work allows for relocation

Climate migration forecasts opportunity for population growth

Outdoor recreation amenities/industry are key quality of life and economic assets

21 universities are located in Michigan's rural areas















Capturing opportunity in rural Michigan requires strategic and coordinated investment in people and place

Resources are available, but rural areas face staff, procedural, and financial challenges in accessing programs and funding



MDARD's Office of Rural Development was established by Gov. Whitmer in January 2022 to elevate and address rural priorities

Gov. Whitmer's bipartisan budget includes \$3 million in one-time funding for grants to support needs related to housing, high-speed internet, infrastructure, workforce needs, and other rural priorities.

ORD is hiring 3 staffers to focus on policy/interagency coordination; community support/capacity building; and rural engagement and outreach.



Interagency coordination

- Identify opportunities for policy and program changes that will positively impact rural outcomes
- Ensure rural input on policy and programs



Increase statewide engagement & action on rural priorities

- Connect communities to share rural best practices and successes
- Improve coordination and collaboration
- Build regional and statewide preparedness and economic competitiveness



Staff & resources to support communities

- Build local capacity act as information resource and partner for local programs and projects
- Fill in financial and other gaps needed to kickstart local initiatives





Local and regional engagement informs ORD priorities and activities

- Outreach and connections with economic development/community development collaboratives, key stakeholders, issue-specific workgroups
- Work together with state agencies on outreach, projects, and programming
- Bring partners together to explore collaborative solutions
- Planning for new events and platforms for engagement
- Adding staff and funding programs in 2022/early 2023



Housing

- Rising development costs and subsidy needs
- Infrastructure expansion and costs
- Regulatory barriers
- Limited local capacity
- Communications



Infrastructure & Broadband

- Reduced revenue has led to deferred infrastructure maintenance
- Costs are barrier to private and public providers
- Accurate maps needed to show biggest gaps for federal funding



Workforce & Economic Development Barriers

- Childcare costs, availability
- Transportation needs and access
- Skills mismatch and training needs

Housing and childcare projects, internships and apprenticeships, technical assistance


Local and regional plans for high-priority issues
