Era Fashions: Mary Jane Shoes

Adapted from Tink Lynn and 'Happy Little Soles'



The Mary Jane shoe. Where would we be without her? She's highly adaptable, perfectly practical and oh so sweet. Her trademark is the 'bar' or strap that goes over the top of the foot and was traditionally fastened with a buckle or button. Before there were 'Mary Janes', they were called 'bar'

shoes and were worn by children in the late 19th and early 20th century. Surprisingly, they were worn more commonly by boys than girls.

In 1904, bar shoes became known as Mary Janes when the Brown Shoe Company of Missouri named their bar shoes after the mischievous cartoon character Buster Brown and his sweetheart Mary Jane.




Mary Jane was a character created by Richard Felton Outcault, "Father of the Sunday Comic Strip", for his comic strip Buster Brown which was first published in 1902. She was the sister of the title character Buster Brown and was drawn from real life, as she was also Outcault's daughter of the same name. In Outcault's own words—and his daughter's—she was the only character drawn from life in the Buster Brown strip, although "Mrs. Brown" did resemble Outcault's wife.

In 1904, Outcault traveled to the St. Louis World's Fair and sold licenses to up to 200 companies to use the Buster Brown and Mary Jane characters to advertise their products. Among them was the Brown Shoe Company, who realized the marketing benefits of commercially associating themselves with 'Buster Brown' and paid \$200 for the rights. They later hired actors to tour the country, performing as the Buster Brown characters in theaters and stores. This strategy helped the Brown Shoe Company become the most prominently associated brand with the Buster Brown characters. The style of shoe both Buster Brown and Mary Jane wore came to be known by her name, Mary Jane.

Mary Janes continued to be popularized throughout the 20th Century, particularly during the Model A era. They were a common pairing with the 1920's flapper dresses.

And tried to hide his grin, when I'd lose a hunk of skin


To the ego of the family Model A.

Tech Tip: Lock Maintenance & More by David Teale

Locks are an integral part of our Model A from the ignition system to the doors to even the keeping unwanted thieves from stealing your spare tire. With all the locks on our cars, you would think that they would get regular maintenance just like everything else, but unfortunately, locks are one of the least maintained devices on our cars.

Common Lock Issues: 1) Failure for the tumbler to rotate with key. 2) The infamous jiggle to get things moving or to rotate. 3) Frozen locks. 4) Failure to accept a key. 5) My favorite – I locked it, but now it won't unlock.

Most of these issues are caused by two culprits: the most common is poor lubrication and the second is dirt or debris in the lock mechanism. Another problem for most outdoor locks is also corrosion due to exposure to moisture.

Common Mistakes: Don't reach for a can of WD-40. This is the worst thing you can put into a lock mechanism. It is not a good lubricant; it will disappear over a very short time and leave residue and contaminants. All oils, greases, and the like should be strictly avoided.


Quick Easy Fix: I have found that the best product for maintaining and even fixing some common lock problems is Lock-Ease. It is a graphited lock fluid specifically formulated to penetrate the lock mechanism and carry the graphite everywhere. The fluid portion also lubricates and eventually disappears without leaving harmful residue, while providing a long-lasting wearing film. It will even prevent locks from freezing in sub-zero temperatures and the film won't run in the Texas heat.

There are several versions of this product available online, but I prefer the liquid version. I have used it on all the locks on my Model A and all kinds of locks around the house. If a lock starts to act up, this is the bottle I reach for and 99% of the time, the problem is fixed immediately.

Additional Tip: It's a great speedometer cable lube too! It coats the entire cable from top to bottom with its fluid carrier and then leaves a thin film of graphite everywhere. This is the proper way to lubricate the cable anyway. It is also good on bicycle cabling. I have heard it is also good for fishing reels, but I have not given that a try yet.

I hope this quick Tech Tip helps with any of your lock issues and keeps everything working smoothly for many tours to come.





AFTER 43 YEARS LETS LOOK BACK AT SOME PWA CLUB HISTORY

The Following Article, By Gwyn Machacek, Entitled "CRANKED UP IN 1977", Was Published In Our September 1995 & July 2012 Newsletter By Paul Lewis:

"For several years there was talk between Model A'ers about trying to form a Model A Club North of Houston and in Montgomery County. Four people said, "Let's try". Notices were posted everywhere in the Spring, Woodlands, and Conroe area telling of the first gathering to be held August 9, 1977 at the Gulf State Auditorium in Conroe. Those four people were Keith Jenkins, Buddy Moore, Larry and Gwyn Machacek.

Eight families attended the gathering and they all said, "Let's give this club a try". Officers were selected and then one of the big topics of discussion was what can we call ourselves. Suggestions such as; Conroe A's, Montgomery County Motometers, Piney Wood A's, Big Thicket A's and Rambling A's were suggested. It was suggested that a name would be picked at the September meeting. Everyone then browsed through the display of literature on the Model A that Keith Jenkins and Larry Machacek had set up.

At the second meeting the name Piney Wood Model A Ford Club (Piney Wood A's, for short) was chosen and a Newsletter's name of "The Ford Squeaks" was selected. Moreover, the club grew by 4 new members.

By the end of 1977, the newly formed club had 16 families. They were Bryant Baugus, Donald & Cindy Chrisner, John & Judy Davidson, Monte Fine, Jerry Fisher, Thomas Gilbert, Dick Hand, Keith & Marlene Jenkins, Benny Klekar, Tom & Joan Lowery, Larry & Gwyn Machacek, Donald Mog, Buddy & Sandy Moore, Guy & Betty Nightingate, Harold & Carolyn Smith, and Thomas Wilkerson.

The following year (1978) saw the club becoming a chapter of the Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA). Years later, in 1983, the club became a region in the Model A Restorers Club (MARC). "THE REST IS HISTORY."

At our 35th Anniversary luncheon July 14, 2012, we all receive a souvenir print out of all the Piney Wood A's meeting minutes for 1977. The club today has far surpassed any vision our founding fathers might have had 35 years ago.

We all should be proud of that as we tack on the future years to come and, be very thankful for that meeting held on August 9, 1977 when "Let's Give This Club A Try" received enough "Yes" votes.
