<u>Meeting Minutes</u>: Minutes of the Club Meeting held on September 7. 2024, were provided to club members in the September 2024 Newsletter for review. Treasurer, Frank DeLucia reported an error found in the minutes of September 7,2024 meeting regarding the Treasurer's report:

Minutes reflected Frank DeLucia provided financial reports for the months of July, August, and September. The minutes are corrected to reflect "Frank DeLucia presented financial reports for May, June, July and August 2024." Written correction of the minutes was provided to the secretary by Frank. 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Model A Days at Gilmore Museum

We recently attended Model A Days held at The Model A Museum on the grounds of The Gilmore Museum in Hickory Corners, Michigan. We've attended this event for three years and have a great time each year. It's a great time to visit with friends you've made traveling, friends you met there, and friends in the Piney Wood A's! If I didn't tell the story before, please indulge me.

Two years ago, in 2022 while I was volunteering in the MAFCA tent, I saw a couple walk by. The man looked familiar, but not the lady. The third time they walked by I couldn't stand it and I went up to ask if his name was Roger. He looked at me and said my name. It was Roger and Tavie Minson! He came to his very first PWA meeting on that Tuesday night and was in Hickory Corners on Friday. They've been at Model A Days the last two years as well. This year, Roger and Tavie volunteered in the MAFCA tent. (Knowing the Bullards isn't all it's cracked up to be sometimes.) We appreciated the help they gave and it gave us more time to visit with them.



In case you don't know the details of Model A Days at The Gilmore, it is a two-day fundraising event for the Model A Ford Foundation, Inc. which owns and operates the Model A Museum on the Gilmore campus. This year has been a big year for MAFFI. They've broken ground on the Model A



Museum expansion project and completed the 6-year restoration of a Model A public transportation bus. This year there were 475 Model A's attending, 75 swap meet vendors, 300 Friday night dinner guests and 1,440 paid attendees. A huge Thank You to the MAFFI trustees, volunteers and attendees for making Moel A Days a success.

The weather this year wasn't as delightful as the last several years, with rain falling Friday afternoon and Saturday being pretty warm if you were in the sun. That didn't stop the people from coming, though.

Friday morning while I was volunteering in the MAFFI tent, a young man walked up wearing a t-shirt with a picture of a Model A on it. I asked if it was his Model A and he said, "Yes!" His dad chimed in that he had just gotten the car a few days before. He is 17 years old and I got the impression that he bought the car himself.

I introduced him to Robert and by the time the weekend was over,

he'd also met the President of MAFFI as well as Paul Shinn who has since included him in a video. He participated in the Learn to Drive an A program on Friday, but I heard he really didn't need the driving lesson. I saw him Saturday driving the Model A Woodie around the Gilmore campus. That's a very special privilege!

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I had encountered another young man who was very excited about the Learn to Drive an A event scheduled for Friday afternoon. The rain came and I wasn't sure if they ended up havening this event, but I saw the young man later and asked. They did have it and he was so excited to have been able to drive an A. He's now hooked!

Along with visiting the 9 museums on the Gilmore campus, you can attend several seminars, look at all of the A's brought by attendees, take a ride in several different Model A's including a



yellow school bus, see several groups work on and crank up "First Starts" (Model A's that haven't been started in many years), listen to a rag time band, attend an award ceremony where several people are inducted into the MAFFI Hall of Fame and Volunteers of the Year are named.

There's a Model A pulling a calliope that drives around periodically playing music.

There's plenty to do during Model A Days!



The Model A Museum is currently going through an 8,000 square foot expansion. It's an expensive project and fundraising has been ongoing.

Donna Lewis having served as President of MAFCA and MAFFI continues to be a valuable supporter of the Model A hobby.

In 2023 she donated a Sport Coupe that was once owned by Red Grow, the founder of MAFCA.

Red restored "Betsy" to the finest condition such that during 1950'S AND 60'S Betsy gathered 32 top place trophies in the 34 shows she was entered. Overall, Betsy won 39 trophies

and became famous as the best Model A of her time.

Betsy changed hands several times and eventually Paul and Donna Lewis acquired her. Donna felt Betsy should be out on the road being enjoyed rather than in a museum and she donated Betsy to the museum to be auctioned off and raise money for the expansion project. The auction was extremely successful, and a winner was recently named.

Second, it's interesting to note that some outlaws (like "Henry Wells, Old-Time Bank Robber) genuinely liked Frank Phillips. Frank himself was fascinated with Old West bad guys, and even threw an annual shindig at the ranch called the "Cow Thieves and Outlaws Reunion" at which the bad guys commingled with lawmen. Frank's ground rules for the event were that everyone had to check his guns at the gate and that the outlaws enjoyed a grace period while there at the ranch; lawmen could not arrest them on the premises (after all, this here's a party) but would have to try to apprehend them at another time and place.



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1930's In Fashion

In the 1930's, as the public began to feel the effects of the Great Depression, many designers found that crises were not the time for experimentation. Fashion became more compromising, aspiring to preserve feminism's victories while rediscovering a subtle and reassuring elegance and sophistication. Overall, 1930's clothing was somber and modest, reflecting the difficult social and economic situation of the decade. Women's fashions moved away from the brash, daring style of the 1920's towards a more romantic, feminine silhouette. The waistline was restored, hemlines dropped to nearly ankle-length, there was renewed appreciation of the bust, and backless evening gowns and soft, slim-fitting day dresses became popular. The female body was remodeled into a more neo-classical shape, and slim, toned, and athletic bodies came into vogue. The fashion for outdoor activities stimulated couturiers to manufacture what would today be referred to as "sportswear." The term "ready-to-wear" was not yet widely in use, but the boutiques already described such clothes as being "for sport". In place of the bobbed flapper haircut, the standard women's hairstyle of the 1930's was a modest, short perm.

Two of the most prominent and influential fashion designers of the 1930's were Elsa Schiaparelli and Madeleine Vionnet.

Elsa Schiaparelli showed her first collection in 1929 and was immediately hailed by the press as 'one of the rare innovators' of the day. With her exciting and inventive designs, Schiaparelli did not so much revolutionize fashion as shatter its foundations. The first pullover she displayed in her windows created a sensation: it was knitted in black with a trompe-l'œil white bow. She consistently turned out notable collections thereafter. Schiaparelli was a close friend of Christian Bérard, Jean Cocteau, and Salvador Dalí, who designed embroidery motifs for her and supplied inspiration for models like the desk suit with drawers for pockets, the shoe-shaped hat, the silk dresses painted with flies and bearing a picture of a large lobster, respectively. All of Paris thronged to her salon at 21 Place Vendôme as collection succeeded collection.



Madeleine Vionnet found her inspiration in ancient statues, creating timeless and beautiful gowns that would not look out of place on a Greek frieze. Queen of the bias cut (cutting diagonally across the fabric's lengthwise threads), she produced evening dresses that fitted the body without excessive elaboration or dissimulation, employing a flowing and elegant line. Her perfect draping of chiffon, silk, and Moroccan crêpe created a marvelously poised and sensual effect. The unparalleled success of Vionnet's cuts guaranteed her reputation right up to her retirement in 1939.



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Mainbocher, the first American designer to live and work in Paris, was also influential, with his plain yet supremely elegant designs, often employing the bias cut pioneered by Vionnet. The luxury goods manufacturer Hermès began to sell handmade printed silk square scarves in the early 1930s, in addition to popularizing the zipper and many other practical innovations. Toward the end of the decade, women's fashions took on a somewhat more imposing and broad-shouldered silhouette, possibly influenced by Elsa Schiaparelli. Men's fashions continued the informal, practical trend that had dominated since the end of the First World War.




















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Tech Q and A for October, 2024

Model A Tech, What's New / By Paul Shinn

Q: Rayburn Mitchell writes- Gentlemen,

I often see Model A's that owners have converted to 16" tires and wheels. I have spoken to a few of the owners as to the rationale behind the change. I am beginning to suspect that it has more to do with the "look" as compared

to the actual advantages as to the change. I would appreciate your honest feedback as to the real advantages of this change. Is more tread on the ground for traction and braking the primary or only reasons for this change? I would also like to know the disadvantages (I know cost and speedometer are two).

The background for this question is that several years ago I purchased an "A" that had 16" wheel and tires and I nearly have it ready for the road. I have those as well as 19" ready to go. Which one should I use?

A: Lots of people go to 16's or other wheels for the looks. Others because they want to run modern tires that are available at almost any tire shop. Some people want to go to larger, wider tires because their car's front end is worn and instead of fixing the worn part(s), they switch to wider tires so the car handles better. Lots of reasons. -Paul

Q: Brenden Johnson writes- Hi do you know the number for the wix filter that goes in the [glass] sediment bowl on the Model A?

A: Wix 33039 or Napa 3039. -Paul

Q: Sam Weston writes-

Recently I had the engine rebuilt by Bert's Model A in Colorado. I just reinstalled it and tried to start the car. I have adjusted the timing using the nu rex tool and the method Paul Shinn outlined in one of his YouTube videos. The car does start, however, it only runs for less than a minute before it stops. Any suggestions on how to keep the engine running or what systems you would look at? And last question, when the engine is running for a brief minute, I cannot shift the transmission into first gear with lots of grinding. Is it something to do with the clutch pedal adjustment (where the peddle is linked up to the clutch under the car) or something else?

A: Hello Sam-First thing I would check is your fuel line. Disconnect at the carb, place a can under the line (to catch gas) and turn on the gas. The line should flow freely and steadily. As for the clutch, it needs adjustment. Make sure you have about one inch of "free play" before the pedal starts to engage with the throw out bearing. -Steve Schmauch


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Paul adds- Hey Sam, I agree with Steve (as usual!) about the fuel flow being the likely issue. Just for giggles, try running it with the gas cap removed from the top of the gas tank to be sure it isn't a venting issue. -Paul

Sam Responds- Hi Steve and Paul, Thank you so much for your help. It was a gas flow issue. Once I removed the gas cap and found the gas flow was much better. I have a new gas cap ordered from Berts. Thanks!

Q: Hello Model A Tech Team! My name is Mike Froeder, from Brazil. I need to know, before I open my engine, how much play in the distributor's drive shaft (spinwise) is normal? What causes it and how to fix it? The engine backfires when slowing down, could this be a symptom of it?

A: Hello Mike–There should very little play in the distributor shaft, maybe a few thousands of an inch back and forth to almost none. If you have more, then it indicates a worn distributor drive gear located below the distributor shafts (2) and visible in the valve chamber. This unit is driven by the camshaft. Many vendors carry a replacement gear and it is a fairly simple job to do. The engine backfires could be a symptom of timing. I would replace the drive gear first. -Steve Schmauch


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














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The International Order of the Rubber Chicken
