The railroad tracks were laid in 1872





Augusta, Texas









The Old Spanish Trail from Nacogdoches to San Antonio was not a straight line as it is today. The original Settlers settled where clean water was available such as springs and clear-flowing creeks. As people flowed into Texas, they would stop at the same locations to barter for food and supplies. Agusta was one of the first locations in Houston County that people passed through. There are many historical markers in the area, these three give a glimpse of a point in time.

Refuge, Texas



Our Club stopped at a place known as Refuge.

Today, there is only a cemetery, but it is an area that is rich in history.

A Party of 31 families on 27 wagons pulled by oxen left east central Illinois in 1833.

They traveled around 1000 miles before arriving here in January of 1834.

Reuben Brown led this wagon train. He was married to Daniel Parker's daughter Sarah.

After a short while the main Parker family

Moved north near Elkhart to form the Predestinarian church.

At this time Cynthia Ann Parker was five years old.

Reuben and others built a fort {called Fort Brown} about two hundred yards west of this cemetery where remnants remain.

There was also an Indian village several hundred yards south closer to San Pedro Creek.

When concerns about the Indians arose, they sought refuge at the fort.

Hench is the origin of the name. Refuge

How a Model A Ford became a part of the Karis Family

Model A Purchase

I purchased my 1930 Coupe when living in Champaign Urbana, IL. In 1977.

The coupe was advertised for sale in the local newspaper for \$600. It was in a dark corner of a barn, left by a serviceman then stationed in California in the care of his mother. A few hot rodders showed up to buy it, but she sold it to me because I planned to restore it. The car had a Texas title which I changed To Illinois.

My father had a Model A Coupe after the war while awaiting the availability of new car production. I recall riding in the Model A and how it would shimmy when crossing the railroad tracks. After seeing a restored A in a car show, I needed one.



Move to Texas

In July 1978, I was offered a job in Houston, Texas. The Model A was totally disassembled now and had to be moved in the moving van in pieces. I changed the title back to Texas.

The car remained in pieces for a while after our move was completed, and a new job was started.

Club Introduction

One day when driving on 1960, I saw a very nice restored 1930 Model Coupe. I followed the coupe to the feed store on Stuebner-Airline and observed a small group of Model A's. The club members were giving rides to some retirement home residents.

This is when I met Don Christener and Chuck Hahn, Piney Wood A members, and was invited to join the Club.

This when I decided to continue my coupe's restoration as a Blue ribbon car instead of a driver. Chuck Hahn was also a member of the Houston A's which I also joined.

Car Judging

I had my Coupe completed in time for the 1987 Texas Tour (24th) in Huntsville and received a 3rd-place blue ribbon award. I also learned how serious some members are about the details.

Also participated as a car judge which provided the opportunity to review other entrants.

New to Texas

Except for a 1972 motor home vacation trip to Texas, we had never been to Texas.

Participation in many Poor Boy and Texas Tours provided us the opportunity to visit places and towns we would not have visited otherwise.

Swap Meets

The Model A interest introduced my family a new experience of attending and participating as a vendor in vintage auto parts and clothing swap meets. My son Ted got involved at the young age of 10.

For many years we made the annual pilgrimage to the Pate swap meet in Fort Worth Texas in search of auto parts, vintage clothes and other vintage items. We also attended the swap meets in Morrilton Arkansas (Petit Jean) and Oklahoma (Chickashaw). We also made trips to the Hershey Swap meet in Harrisburg Pennsylvania.

For many years the Piney Wood A's had an annual swap meet at the Montgomery County Fairgrounds



which was well attended with approx. 1000 spaces and with some large vendors in attendance. The annual swap meet was a revenue producer for the Club and was a joint effort with the nifty fifties auto club.

*The first revenue producer for the Piney Woods was soda sales at the Woodlands Lake in-service event. The first swap meet was held in the parking lot for the Glass Menagerie Restaurant in the Woodlands. Other swap meets were held In the Woodlands and Houston racetrack.

Style Show Involvement

My interest in Blue Ribbon car judging led to Patricia's interest in era clothes judging in which she participated in at Annual Texas Tour for many years. In addition to being a participant, she also judged entrants and co-chaired the style show event at the Texas Tour sponsored by the Piney Woods in Conroe Tx.

National Tours

In addition to the Texas Tours, we attended the combined MAFCA/MARC national tours in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin, and Dallas, Texas.

Club Growth/Involvement

Since becoming a member of the PWA's in 1979, I have witnessed the growth of the club from a few members to a membership approaching 100, in which the club has become very active in the MAFCA organization with two members becoming president.

Most mornings, during her entire life, you would find her in her recliner reading her Bible first thing of the day. Her continual prayer was for all to be saved.

Clarkie and Charles Ray enjoyed antique car clubs and traveling in their motorhome. They took their only granddaughter Denalei all over the US. Clarkie was gifted with great knowledge of history, so it was always interesting to have conversations with her. And when her only great grandchild Jacob arrived, she got to help out and always had a close bond with her 'sweet boy' as she called him.

She will be so missed by family and friends who are saddened, yet celebrate that she joined Charles Ray, her family, and Christ in Heaven. We are glad her body is healed and she is able to move on from this 'blink of an eye' here on Earth into forever eternity with her Maker where we will one day join her. May she rest in peace.

Slip Dress

Bikinis, Bell-Bottoms & Little Black Dresses, by Kate Mulvey

The slip dates back to the 1920s, when the streamlined "flapper" dresses required feminine undergarments in order to hang properly. Unstructured, clingy and light as a feather with its thin spaghetti straps and its lacy edges, this slinky descendant of the petticoat also carries with it a sense of seminakedness that draws attention to the body, giving it powerful sex appeal. These new style chemises which were highly decorative, deliberately sensual and often transparent became the forerunner of today's fashion slip. They were made of rayon, crepe de Chine or silk tricot so they were smooth, soft to touch, and considered to be the height of luxury.

The slip continued to be worn in the 1930s and 1940s, changing its shape and hemline as required by the current fashion. As American regulations regarding advertising became relaxed in the 1950s, the language of lingerie was changed forever. In 1958 the US company Maidenform pro-



moted its bras and slips on television for the first time. Vogue and other magazines showed beautiful women in their underclothes, bringing the intimacy of lingerie into the public domain. The slip took on a sexy image in the bedroom thanks to the silver screen; curvaceous slip-clad stars like Elizabeth Taylor in Cat on a Hot Tin Roof (1958), and Janet Leigh in Psycho (1960) sparked demand for similar styles in boutiques and shopping malls.

The slip moved out of the bedroom and into the fashion arena in the 1990s with the beginning of the waif look and a desire for a more feminine style of dress. Whether teamed with dainty kitten heels and a cardigan or dressed down with a denim jacket and biker boots, the slip will never lose its allure.

Tech Q&A - Chassis - Front End

FRONT AXLE

Question:

I am a new member of MAFCA and I am restoring a 1931 standard coupe (85B) as a driver (hydraulic brakes, etc.) The problem is the front axle is apparently installed backwards so that the spindle locking bolts have to be installed from the rear of the vehicle with the long nuts at the front of the car. The axle is apparently a 1928-29 with small Ford script but has a tapered pinion locking pin. The caster seems OK. The nuts on the bottom of the spring perch have damaged threads and don't want to come off. Is it OK to leave the axle this way. This is not a points car and the spindle locking nuts still keep the wheels from turning too far.

Answer:

The front axle has no front and back side. It can go either way. That is why FORD script is printed on the front right side and left rear side of the axle, no matter which way it is installed. Your problem is that someone has just put the spindle locking bolt in backwards. It can also go in from either side, but should be inserted from the front. Remove the spindle locking bolt and insert it from the front. Be sure to knock the bolt all the way in before applying the nut so as not to strip the threads by forcing the bolt in with the nut. I would suggest leaving the spring perch nut alone if it is still tight. Spring perch bolts are always a problem. They are usually rusted into the axle and can be very difficult to get out. By the way, my answer above assumes you still have a Model A axle and Model A spindles with those hydraulic brakes.

FRONT SUSPENSION

Question:

Do I take your comments (below) to mean that 1-1/2 to 2" is the acceptable play in the steering box? Mine has always had that much (maybe just a little more). If so, I'm surprised. I've been looking for something under 1/2". Well, Well.

"Try to adjust the steering box using the procedure in the "Model A Mechanics Handbook". You should be able to adjust it so that you have no more than 1-1/2 to 2" of side-to-side movement measured at the outside circumference of the steering wheel (with wheels straight ahead). If it can't be adjusted up then you will probably need new sector housing bushings and races and bearings.... "

Answer:

Factory spec is 1" free movement with wheel straight ahead (or steering in center of travel). The amount of free play will increase as the steering wheel is moved right or left from center. This is all designed in to prevent binding. Two inches is acceptable but I would suggest you try adjusting it to get closer to the 1". To get the 1" you will probably have to make all three adjustments and a rebuild as I described to you earlier. The closer to 1" you get, the better it will handle. Careful with the adjustments. You do not want any binding. -- Les Andrews, 1998 Technical Director

"HIDDEN" OIL POINTS by Eric Engle
While pampering my 31 Coupe (oil/filter change, lube, etc.), I happened upon Paul Shinn's video on just that subject. It's an excellent video, covering all aspects of doing the job right. I thought maybe I should bring to light some of the "hidden" areas that need lubrication also...spots that are often overlooked, or forgotten.

Using a I oz. plastic bottle with a needle tip (from Amazon, Hobby Lobby, etc.), fill with 30W oil to reach the following: Hood hinges (3), Door hinges, Horn armature felts (2), Distributor "base oiler" cup and (if you have one) the hole in the top of Cam Screw, Throttle linkage cups (2) (mounted to back of block), all brake rod Clevis Pins. Also, be SURE to squirt some oil from your oil can onto the front engine mount where it passes through the front crossmember. Strange noises can come from that area if it isn't periodically oiled. And don't forget to periodically lubricate the speedometer cable with a dry graphite.

With a good spray lubricant (ie. Lucas Oil Red N Tacky Grease, White lithium grease, etc.), spray brake cross shaft where it passes through the frame. Also remember to spray some lube up inside parking brake mechanism and inside door latches.


And don't forget to put a **small** dab of silicone grease on the points cam inside your

distributor. Your point's rubbing block will thank you.

These are some of the "hidden" areas that require lubrication every so often, to help keep your car in tip-top working condition for years to come.


