PINEY WOOD MODEL A FORD CLUB Minutes for March 14, 2023 Meeting Valley Ranch BBQ

<u>Call to order</u>: President Jim Hartzog called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm.

Invocation: Mitzi Shaddix led the group in prayer.

<u>Pledge of Allegiance</u>: Jim Hartzog led the members in the Pledge of Allegiance.

<u>Minutes</u>: Robert Bullard made a motion to accept the minutes of the February 18, 2023 meeting. The motion was seconded by Marilyn Hitchcock. The minutes were approved.

<u>Presentation of MAFCA Award:</u> Robert Bullard, President of MAFCA, presented to the Piney Wood Ford Model A Club the MAFCA 45-Year Longevity Award in recognition of the PWA chapter's many years of support in maintaining the history and heritage of the Model A Ford. Jim Hartzog accepted the award on behalf of the PWA chapter.

PATE Swap Meet Presentation: Robert Wheeler, President of the Antique Automobile Club of America, was introduced by Robert Bullard. Mr. Wheeler spoke to the members of PWA about PATE, one of the largest automotive swap meets in the United States. Held annually over a three-day period in April at the Texas Motor Speedway in Fort Worth, Texas, the PATE event hosts approximately 9,000 vendors and is visited by 200,000 to 400,000 automobile enthusiasts each year, depending upon the weather.

As Mr. Wheeler explained, profits are distributed, after payment of all the event expenses, to the member clubs based on the number of individual members in each club. The annual PATE swap meet is managed totally by volunteers from the various member clubs. PATE expects each member club to provide volunteers numbering approximately 10% of the club's total membership. Volunteers are needed for all aspects of the event, including security, vendor coordination, booth set-up support, event registration, garbage pickup, lost & found, and breakdown and clean up after the event.

Mr. Wheeler reported that there is a two-year buy-in for new members during which 50% of the distributable profit for a new member will be retained by PATE. This buy-in period provides time for the new member and PATE to determine if the new association is a good fit for both organizations. Within the two-year period, the member club or PATE may terminate the association with no further financial obligation. Mr. Wheeler noted that the next event is already scheduled and it is too late to accept new member clubs for participation in the 2023 event next month.

The members of the PWA agreed to consider membership in the PATE organization as a potential source of future income.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Frank De Lucia presented the Treasurer's Report for February 2023. David Teale made a motion to accept the Treasurer's Report. David Gould seconded the motion. The motion was passed.

<u>Newsletter</u>: Troy Walling encouraged the group to forward pictures taken on tours, functions and ladies' activities for publication in the newsletter.

Sunshine Report: The Sunshine Report was presented by Mitzi Shaddix.



Fashion Innovation: Slide Fasteners (a.k.a. Zippers)

Ithough not common during the Model A Era, the slide fastener, which we now call a zipper, could be found in an array of items. One example is the Saks Fifth Avenue advertisement to the right from a 1931 New York Times, featuring a sportswear outfit including a suede blouse with the "convenience of a Talon fastener."

The story begins in 1851, when Elias Howe, Jr., inventor of the sewing machine, received a patent for an "automatic, continuous clothing closure." Howe's device was more like an elaborate drawstring than a true slide fastener, but because of the success of the sewing machine, he did not pursue marketing his clothing closure system.

In 1893, Chicago inventor Whitcomb Judson marketed a "clasp locker" device, similar

to what Howe described. Being first to market, Whitcomb got credit as the "inventor of the zipper." Still, his patent did not use the word zipper.

Judson's "clasp locker" was a complicated hook-and-eye shoe fastener. With businessman Col. Lewis Walker, Judson launched the Universal Fastener Company to manufacture the device. While the clasp locker debuted at the 1893 Chicago World's Fair, it found little commercial success. The Universal Fastener Company moved to Meadville, Pennsylvania, where it

operated for most of the 20th century as Talon, Inc.

The zipper's eventual success came from the work of Swedish-born electrical engineer Gideon Sundbäck. Hired to work for Universal Fastener, his design skills and marriage to the plant-manager's daughter led to a job as head designer. In that role, he improved the far-from-perfect "Judson C-curity Fastener." After the death of his wife in 1911, the grieving Sundbäck busied himself at the design table. By December 1913, he came up with what would become the modern zipper.

Sundbäck's improved system increased the number of fastening

elements from four per inch to 10 or 11, had two facing rows of teeth that were pulled into a single piece by the slider, and a larger opening for the teeth guided by the slider. His patent for the separable fastener" was issued in 1917.

Naming the Zipper. The term zipper, based on the sound it makes, was first used in 1923 by the American B.F. Goodrich Company. The company opted to use Sundbäck's fastener on a new type of rubber boots (or galoshes) and called it the zipper. The term stuck.

The two chief uses of the zipper in its early years were for closing boots and tobacco pouches. Zippers began being used for clothing in 1925 by Schott NYC on leather jackets. In the 1930s, a sales campaign began for children's clothing that featured zippers. The campaign hailed zippers as a way to promote self-reliance

in young children, as they made it possible for them to dress themselves.

The Battle of the Fly. A landmark moment happened in 1937, when the zipper beat the button in what was called the "Battle of the Fly." French fashion designers raved over the use of zippers in men's trousers and Esquire magazine declared the zipper the "newest tailoring idea for men."

Zippers in the Model A Era. The MAFCA Fashion Guidelines mention slide fasteners or zippers six times. "Slide fasteners or zippers," the Guidelines say, "were discussed in magazines for men's tailors, but were not commonly used in the fly until after the Model A era." They mention they "could be found in pockets or down the front of coveralls" and also picture a heavy cotton outdoor clothing set "with sliding rustproof fastener [that] is practical for boys and girls." The document also mentions zippers use in men's and women's golf bags for the ball and shoe compartments.

The two images above come from the same Talon advertisement in a 1931 Ladies Home Journal. "Traveling Case — equipped with a Talon Slide Fastener. It can be opened or closed in an instant — but it can't come open accidentally."

The ad also says if you are heading to the beach, "The very newest knitted bathing suits have a Talon Slide Fastener at the back of the jersey. Beach pajamas are cotton mesh and Talon-fastened at the side. And the polo shirt of cotton mesh is Talon-fastened, too — at the front."

While slide fasteners did exist in the Model A Era, they were not as accepted and used nearly as much as they are today. Θ




RON'S TECH TIP PAGE

OIL YOUR DISTRIBUTOR FREQUENTLY

I was called upon to visit one of our longtime members to see if I could get his 1930 Coupe running after a rollback-home incident while he was on a leisurely jaunt around the local area. The coupe



hadn't been driven much in the past few years, and while out, it just quit running. No fire during cranking, eh? I missed the part about a knock recently during running. That's a symptom of a more serious problem than just dirty ignition points. Anyway, I gathered a few tools and arranged a time to see the car. Points and electric all as they should be, fresh gas was there, but no fire during cranking. In fact, the distributor rotor was not turning at all - WHAAAT? That means the timing gear was probably not turning, or the shaft driving the distributor from the cam was having a problem.

After consulting with our trusty Hub City advisor (one of

many), I rounded up some Model A guys to share the blame in case I was wrong and decided to pull the timing gear cover. Sure enough, some teeth were chewed off the timing gear, and you

could see, under close examination, where the gear hub was coming loose from the fiber part. That is probably the explanation for the recent noise. The distributor was next to be removed, and it was definitely tight enough to cause the teeth to be chewed off the fiber gear. The lesson here is, if your A sits around a lot, every time you take it out, oil the upper and lower oil points on your distributor. Each time you shut your car off after a drive, moisture in the crankcase eventually tends to condense around the distributor.



If it sits a long time between runs, the bushings and shaft corrode and get tighter and tighter. Over time, it will cause the timing gear teeth to fail. They are designed to be the weak point in the drive chain so the gear teeth on the cam are protected.

Get in the habit of oiling the distributor regularly.





AFTER 45 YEARS LETS LOOK BACK AT SOME PWA CLUB HISTORY

The Following Article, By Gwyn Machacek, Entitled "CRANKED UP IN 1977", Was Published In Our September 1995 & July 2012 Newsletter By Paul Lewis:

"For several years there was talk between Model A'ers about trying to form a Model A Club North of Houston and in Montgomery County. Four people said, "Let's try". Notices were posted everywhere in the Spring, Woodlands, and Conroe area telling of the first gathering to be held August 9, 1977 at the Gulf State Auditorium in Conroe. Those four people were Keith Jenkins, Buddy Moore, Larry, and Gwyn Machacek.

Eight families attended the gathering and they all said, "Let's give this club a try". Officers were selected and then one of the big topics of discussion was what can we call ourselves. Suggestions such as; Conroe A's, Montgomery County Motometers, Piney Wood A's, Big Thicket A's and Rambling A's were suggested. It was suggested that a name would be picked at the September meeting. Everyone then browsed through the display of literature on the Model A that Keith Jenkins and Larry Machacek had set up.

At the second meeting the name Piney Wood Model A Ford Club (Piney Wood A's, for short) was chosen and a Newsletter's name "The Ford Squeaks" was selected. Moreover, the club grew by 4 new members.

By the end of 1977, the newly formed club had 16 families. They were Bryant Baugus, Donald & Cindy Chrisner, John & Judy Davidson, Monte Fine, Jerry Fisher, Thomas Gilbert, Dick Hand, Keith & Marlene Jenkins, Benny Klekar, Tom & Joan Lowery, Larry & Gwyn Machacek, Donald Mog, Buddy & Sandy Moore, Guy & Betty Nightingate, Harold & Carolyn Smith, and Thomas Wilkerson.

The following year (1978) saw the club becoming a chapter of the Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA). Years later, in 1983, the club became a region in the Model A Restorers Club (MARC). "THE REST IS HISTORY."

At our 35th Anniversary luncheon on July 14, 2012, we all receive a souvenir printout of all the Piney Wood A's meeting minutes for 1977. The club today has far surpassed any vision our founding fathers might have had 35 years ago.

We all should be proud of that as we tack on the future years to come and, be very thankful for that meeting held on August 9, 1977, when "Let's Give This Club A Try" received enough "Yes" votes.
