


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Sediment Bowl & A-Filter Assembly Added To 1931 Model A's

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Jim's Technical Tip

There are several places on a Model A where you are installing something that is attached with multiple screws. For example, here are a few:

Instrument panel

Valve cover (under exhaust manifold)

Oil pan

□Window trim



When installing them, start each screw with only a few threads. Leave them all pretty loose to start. Then you can move the piece around, as needed, to finesse each subsequent screw into the next threaded hole. The last ones are often the hardest to get aligned. I use an awl in the hole where the screw will be going to adjust the piece to get the holes to line up.



Get all of the screws started, and then go around and tighten them all up in several passes. Have the screw head just touching the piece at first, then make them all snug, then make them all fully tightened. Just like you do when tightening head nuts, start with tightening the screws in the middle and then work your way out to the ends. Alternate sides left and right as you go on each tightening pass.

I hope this helps you get things together a bit faster and easier next time.

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


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Era Fashion -- Beach Pajama Looks

1930's Beach Pajama Looks: Borrowed from Sailors and Farmers

We've always been a fan of wide-legged trousers for women. [If the widest part of your body is the upper thigh, trousers that fit tightly at the ankle will make you look like a parenthesis (), the "Venus" of Willendorf, or her sister, the "Venus" of Lespugue, especially from the rear. If you hate wide-legged pants, a classic trouser that drops straight from outer thigh to foot is a flattering choice.]

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Era Fashion -- Mens High Waisted Pants

1930s Mens High Waisted Pants, Wide Leg Trousers

Men's pants in the 1930s were high waisted, full around the hip, and long column-like wide legs. The high waisted look lasted until the early 60s. Men's wide leg pants started in the mid-20s and gradually narrowed down into the 1950s. Men wore patterned trousers in the 30s such as plaid, herringbone, check, tweed, windowpane and stripes for both business and casual wear. Some younger men's looks had wide "Hollywood" waistbands and a pleated front for extra fullness. Finding 1930s vintage or reproduction pants in your size can be difficult. However, with the right modern pants, you can approximate the 1930s look.

Choose wide leg or classic fit pants that come up to your belly button (you may need to order up 1 or 2 sizes from your "normal" pants size.) Avoid skinny or low rise modern fit pants at all costs. A pleated waist helps create fullness. Pants could be wide cuffed (most



popular) or uncuffed. Typically men's 30s pants matched a suit jacket or paired with a contrasting sportscoat in a darker color. Grey, tan, ivory, and navy are great vintage choices.

Blue jeans and overalls were mostly worn by working-class men. Knickers or plus fours were worn by boys and men playing sports such as golf. Scroll down to see these and more vintage 1930s men's pants pictures.

We handpicked the following trousers for their high waisted rise and wide legs as well as color and patterns associated with 1930s men's fashions.

1930s Style Mens Shoes & Boots

Step back in time when men's fashion was classically good looking. 1930s style men's shoes were sleek yet fancy and formal yet casual. The classic oxford of the '20s expanded to include more two-tone color combinations as well as more brogue (small holes) embellished all over the shoes. These became the staple 1930s dress shoe for men. Black and white, brown and white, brown and tan and grey and black were common color combinations reflecting the Art Deco movement. Naturally solid black and brown cap toe or wingtip oxfords were options too. In summer the all-white oxford was an essential pairing with white or light grey suits.

On the casual side 1930s men's leather sandals came into existence for days on the beach and rubber sole sport shoes Keds and Converse were worn on weekends. At home, a comfortable pair of loafers were all you needed. For work, a sturdy pair of thick sole lace up boots were strong and durable. 

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AFTER 43 YEARS LETS LOOK BACK AT SOME PWA CLUB HISTORY

The Following Article, By Gwyn Machacek, Entitled "CRANKED UP IN 1977", Was Published In Our September 1995 & July 2012 Newsletter By Paul Lewis:

"For several years there was talk between Model A'ers about trying to form a Model A Club North of Houston and in Montgomery County. Four people said, "Let's try". Notices were posted everywhere in the Spring, Woodlands, and Conroe area telling of the first gathering to be held August 9, 1977 at the Gulf State Auditorium in Conroe. Those four people were Keith Jenkins, Buddy Moore, Larry and Gwyn Machacek.

Eight families attended the gathering and they all said, "Let's give this club a try". Officers were selected and then one of the big topics of discussion was what can we call ourselves. Suggestions such as; Conroe A's, Montgomery County Motometers, Piney Wood A's, Big Thicket A's and Rambling A's were suggested. It was suggested that a name would be picked at the September meeting. Everyone then browsed through the display of literature on the Model A that Keith Jenkins and Larry Machacek had set up.

At the second meeting the name Piney Wood Model A Ford Club (Piney Wood A's, for short) was chosen and a Newsletter's name of "The Ford Squeaks" was selected. Moreover, the club grew by 4 new members.

By the end of 1977, the newly formed club had 16 families. They were Bryant Baugus, Donald & Cindy Chrisner, John & Judy Davidson, Monte Fine, Jerry Fisher, Thomas Gilbert, Dick Hand, Keith & Marlene Jenkins, Benny Klekar, Tom & Joan Lowery, Larry & Gwyn Machacek, Donald Mog, Buddy & Sandy Moore, Guy & Betty Nightingate, Harold & Carolyn Smith, and Thomas Wilkerson.

The following year (1978) saw the club becoming a chapter of the Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA). Years later, in 1983, the club became a region in the Model A Restorers Club (MARC). <u>"THE REST IS HISTORY."</u>

At our 35th Anniversary luncheon July 14, 2012, we all receive a souvenir print out of all the Piney Wood A's meeting minutes for 1977. The club today has far surpassed any vision our founding fathers might have had 35 years ago.

We all should be proud of that as we tack on the future years to come and, be very thankful for that meeting held on August 9, 1977 when "Let's Give This Club A Try" received enough "Yes" votes.

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The International Order of the Rubber Chicken
