Preval Sprayer

Use Preval Sprayer and remember to remove the filter screen on the suction straw to spray the mixture.

The Preval Sprayer is sold online https://preval.com or Home Depot or Amazon and is reusable. Home Depot also sells the replacement pressure cartridges.



Klass Kote Epoxy Paint – Satin Black.


It is a bit pricey but is impervious to gasoline

Mix Equal Parts by volume of Epoxy, Catalyst, And Reducer In Very Small Amounts Using A 2 Tbs Measuring Spoon.

Satin Black #900 (klasskote.com) - Side-A Epoxy

Requires equal amounts by volume of side-B catalyst component. Can be used with either Gloss Catalyst #405 or Satin Catalyst #463.





Klass Kote Epoxy Reducer #500 - Epoxy Reducer / Thinner

This is standard Reducer / Thinner used for Klass Kote Epoxy. It works with all colors, clear, and primers.

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Carburetor Theory and Construction Technical Handout





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The Zenith carburetor utilizes a "compound nozzle" to provide consistent fuel to air mixture through the entire engine operating range. This system is comprised of the Main Jet, and the Cap Jet / Compensating Jet acting in tandem.

The system relies on the relationships of these three features:

- 1) Engine volumetric efficiency (50%) and volumetric flow
- 2) Venturi Size (.840 inches is standard)
- 3) Jet sizes and corresponding flow rates (see below)

Zenith Carburetor Jet Recommended Flow Ranges

Revision C

Main: 150-155 (150 might be too lean for some cars. Works on mine, but not always on others. 152-154 achieves best performance and fuel economy).

Comp: 140-142 (comp and main jet determine fuel economy at high speed. This can be changed with the GAV. 140 is standard. This may need to be increased if secondary circuit misbehaves or new repro carb with different circuit routing).

Cap: 170-180 (The cap jet only directs flow from the comp and GAV so it is less critical – it can be large unless it starts effecting low/mid-range performance. 175 may be needed if body is ported differently – repro. Carburetor or secondary well does not flow well. 170-173 should be good for most cars).

Idle: 44-48 (42 is too lean. 44-46 is good for most cars).

Why doesn't just drilling a hole work? There are too many variables and factors. See experiment below.

I bought my Model A in March 2018. I contracted the bug early in childhood. Through the ensuing years, I only imagined how much fun it would be to own one. My wife indulgently gifted books about Antique Fords on Father's Day, Christmas, and Birthdays. Finally, I got around to having one of my very own. In addition to the attendant fun of being this automobile's caretaker, the most gratifying privilege is the unique opportunities afforded to meet the most wonderful people.

My new friends Marta Carvajal, along with her daughter Blanca Navarro, rode with me one beautiful Sunday evening around our Atascocita neighborhood. Although late August in Houston, the sun was calming down by 6:30pm and the windshield was gapped widely open. Marta celebrated her 90th birthday on July 22nd and I was delighted to be a belated part of the celebration, along with my 1928 Phaeton.

I learned within the first few minutes of our introduction that Marta and her family have a quite literal history with Henry Ford. Her father, Felix Carvajal, had the first Ford Dealership in Marianao, Havana, Cuba in 1945. She spent considerable

childhood time around Ford's, albeit newer models than mine. In the first decade of business, Mr. Carvajal's Ford agency had the highest sales volume in Latin America. He traveled to Chicago to receive an award. Undoubted the best part, he was gifted a Ford Convertible which went back to Cuba with him. Marta stated that Ford's were just the best cars.

Upon informing her that my car sold new in July 1928 for \$395.00, she laughingly responded, "are you saying my father was that cheap?"

As we made our way down the avenues, there were plenty of greetings and waves from families spending outdoor time in the evening; each of course dutifully answered in kind with the famously enthusiastic Ah-OOO-Ga! Our birthday girl intoned, "You've made me famous today." Midway through our jaunt, Marta observed, "I feel like I belong in this car. It's like being in a time machine." That's the best summation of how many of us feel about our beloved Model A's. They are a magical, mechanical portal to simpler times





and fond memories. By the way, Marta's favorite of all her Dad's cars was his Lincoln Continental. I was proud to inform her that my car shared a multiple disc clutch design with the Lincoln Motor Company, though little else.

Happy Birthday Marta, good health, and many blessings. Call me for 91. We'll put the top down next year.

IT STARTED FROM HERE....October 16, 1955

The following month, on November 13th, they met again to vote on bylaws and officers, and thus unsuspectingly started what was to become the nation's biggest single-car club.

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Era Fashion – Flowers as Fashion

In the modern world, we think of corsages and boutonnieres as fresh flowers worn for formal occasions such as weddings or proms. But in the Model A days, they were a much more common sight. Fresh floral arrangements were still the thing for those formal occasions, but artificial flowers were very visible in day-to-day life.

Please note that in this article, we are going to focus only on the use of flowers for fashions other than hats. Flowers as ornamentation on hats was extensive and as such, should be the subject of an article all on its own.

Imitation flowers were quite popular for home interior decoration in the Victorian era, and quickly made the transition to wearable art. Flowers

were worn on hats, dresses, and coats. Both single blossoms and clusters of flowers were popular. These bouquets could be made from a vast variety of materials. Common textiles used were silk, cotton, organza, organdy, rayon, velvet, and even leather, Ribbon blossoms were also utilized.

Corsages were a staple of the welldressed woman. The word "corsage" is French and in the 19th-century it was a common term for a woman's bodice or jacket. Flowers pinned to the bodice were often referred to as "bouquet de corsage," and over time this phrase was shortened to just "corsage."

The Ford Squeaks Page 26 of 35 "Boutonniere" is also a French word, meaning buttonhole, and in most references, it is indicating a flower worn in the buttonhole on the lapel of a man's suit. But I found floral women's accessories titled boutonnieres.

The text for the boutonnieres to the right clearly indicates that these are meant for ladies' fashion. The first says "...made for coat or dress" and the one to the far right is "...flowers for coats, furs or dresses." And I can't imagine the below boutonnieres being worn by a gentleman.

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One new reference I ran across was for "Trails" or "Trailers." This apparently refers to the loose, flowing style of these attachments.

The Gorringe's catalog page to the right has an illustration of a young lady wearing a long floral trail. It seems to be attached at the shoulder and then lays loose the remainder of its length.

Shorter versions of this style were also used, as illustrated in the below catalog picture.

Coats were a common place to find flowers elegantly displayed on the collar. The examples below illustrate the usual placement on the left side. A single large flower or a bouquet of smaller blooms were both common options.





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Era Fashion – Plus Four Knickers for Fun

Knickers or Plus Four trousers certainly set a style in the Model A Era. The look was one of fun and carefree activity. While the origin of knickers and Plus Fours came from the early 19th century, the practical use for men and women were on the sporting fields, shooting range, golf courses, and for a casual drive in a sporty Model A roadster.

They were called plus fours because they bagged below the knee and were 4" longer than knickerbockers. Plus fours were made in tweeds, linen, corduroy, flannel, and wool. Today women, men, or youth can wear a pair of Plus Fours either in the Original Category fashion judging or in the Era Image Category. Appropriate Coordinating Apparel would be a long sleeved shirt with a sweater vest, a patterned sweater, or a matching or contrasting suit jacket. A jacket belted in the back, made the outfit more "sporty" looking. The heavy argyle socks worn with tie shoes were often the first features noticed by others. Sometimes the socks and sweater were



matching to add a daring flare to the ensemble. For accessories, a man, or woman might use a golf club, a road map, a suitcase, or a walking stick. For youth, accessories might be sporting or camping equipment or schoolbooks.

Fashion enthusiasts can make their own pair of Plus Fours from a pair of roomy trousers with or without front pleats, measure 10-12 inches from cuff and mark this line with safety pins. Try on pants, sit down, and make sure you have plenty of comfort room to bend your knees plus an extra 1/2 inch for the seam allowance. The safety pinned line should



not curve up your knee but be parallel to the floor. If necessary, adjust the whole line. You can always trim length, but not add it back on. When you are satisfied your knees will have plenty of bending (sitting) room, and then cut the excess lower leg fabric. Save the cuff cut off the trouser leg for making the band that will fit just below the knee. Fasteners on the band can ease putting the Plus Fours on and will help to hold the band in place below the knee.

Another option is to make a casing, inserting wide elastic that measures the circumference of your leg just below your knee. The extra length of fabric will fall over the band creating the ballooning of the fabric, which gives Plus Fours the characteristic style.

As more Model A enthusiasts are finding Era Image a comfortable way to travel, wearing a pair of Plus Fours while driving your Model A will add value to your experience and will certainly catch the eye of onlookers!

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
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AFTER 43 YEARS LETS LOOK BACK AT SOME PWA CLUB HISTORY

The Following Article, By Gwyn Machacek, Entitled "CRANKED UP IN 1977", Was Published In Our September 1995 & July 2012 Newsletter By Paul Lewis:

"For several years there was talk between Model A'ers about trying to form a Model A Club North of Houston and in Montgomery County. Four people said, "Let's try". Notices were posted everywhere in the Spring, Woodlands, and Conroe area telling of the first gathering to be held August 9, 1977 at the Gulf State Auditorium in Conroe. Those four people were Keith Jenkins, Buddy Moore, Larry and Gwyn Machacek.

Eight families attended the gathering and they all said, "Let's give this club a try". Officers were selected and then one of the big topics of discussion was what can we call ourselves. Suggestions such as; Conroe A's, Montgomery County Motometers, Piney Wood A's, Big Thicket A's and Rambling A's were suggested. It was suggested that a name would be picked at the September meeting. Everyone then browsed through the display of literature on the Model A that Keith Jenkins and Larry Machacek had set up.

At the second meeting the name Piney Wood Model A Ford Club (Piney Wood A's, for short) was chosen and a Newsletter's name of "The Ford Squeaks" was selected. Moreover, the club grew by 4 new members.

By the end of 1977, the newly formed club had 16 families. They were Bryant Baugus, Donald & Cindy Chrisner, John & Judy Davidson, Monte Fine, Jerry Fisher, Thomas Gilbert, Dick Hand, Keith & Marlene Jenkins, Benny Klekar, Tom & Joan Lowery, Larry & Gwyn Machacek, Donald Mog, Buddy & Sandy Moore, Guy & Betty Nightingate, Harold & Carolyn Smith, and Thomas Wilkerson.

The following year (1978) saw the club becoming a chapter of the Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA). Years later, in 1983, the club became a region in the Model A Restorers Club (MARC). <u>"THE REST IS HISTORY."</u>

At our 35th Anniversary luncheon July 14, 2012, we all receive a souvenir print out of all the Piney Wood A's meeting minutes for 1977. The club today has far surpassed any vision our founding fathers might have had 35 years ago.

We all should be proud of that as we tack on the future years to come and, be very thankful for that meeting held on August 9, 1977 when "Let's Give This Club A Try" received enough "Yes" votes.

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"The Ford Squeaks" is the official monthly publication of the Piney Wood Model A Ford Club, Inc.
