# GOING TO THE EDGE JANUARY 22 2022

## History in a Pecan Shell

Founded by Dr. John Edge in the 1870s, it appeared alongside the Old San Antonio Road. It acquired a post office in the mid 1890s which remained open into the 1930s.

Dr. Edge had two brothers and the three were partners in the community's first store. In the mid to late 1890s, Edge prospered with eleven businesses. The first population figure was 25 residents in 1900.

J. M. Lawless opened a cotton gin in 1906 and the population had reached 50 by 1910.

A high school opened in 1912 but the building burned in 1940. Later, the local schools merged with those in nearby <u>Kurten</u>.

The population broke the 100 mark in 1933 and the community has been so comfortable at the number, they have continued to use it through the 2000 census.

Saturday, the 22<sup>nd</sup> of January, We met at McDonalds in Magnolia.

We began our drive at 9:00 am to Edge General Store in Edge, Texas. It was a beautiful sunny but cold day in the upper 20's. Thanks to our tour guide, Ron and his wife Susan Cherry, we passed through some beautiful areas such as Dobbin and Richards before stopping at Roans Prairie.

We had 12 model A's and one modern car for the tour.


Thanks to all who planned out all the details for a great day.





## LOOKING ONE'S LOVELIEST IN 1928 By: Jill Barrett , MAFCA Fashion

It was in 1928 that Henry Ford's River Rouge Complex in Dearborn Michigan, an auto plant begun in 1917, was completed as the largest factory in the world. In 1928 the United States were still consumed by Prohibition and the Roaring 20's. Fats Domino, Lefty Frizzell, Maya Angelou, Rosemary Clooney, Elias James Corey, Dick York, Bob Crane, Jimmy Dean, Dick Van Patton, and Ralph Waite are some that have one thing in common. Only one was an American chemist Nobel Prize laureate but they all were born in 1928. And on that note, 1928 was the first year of our Model A era.





Anne Rittenhouse, fashion contributor for McCall's Magazine, wrote in 1928, "Not a knee was to be seen." She also wrote, there was a new trend of practicality. Every woman could wear the same dress at home, to work and to then to the store. One costume for the day was sufficient. Another trend for women's fashion in 1928 was the open season for all fabrics between two Januarys. Cedar chests were now used for interior furnishings.

In 1928, waistlines were right at the widest part of hipline. New belts livened up old frocks. Designers used simple straight lines. The hem line was straight with flares and pleats that allowed the skirt to open with the movement of a woman's knee brought on by new dance demands.

A vivacious evening and afternoon tea dress was preferred to a sedate one. A wider variety of colors were accepted. Women's clothes were now referred to as romantic and acquiescently Victorian similar to the feminine gowns in the late 1880's when Queen Victoria lived. There were no plain surfaces on a dress in 1928. Dresses had ruffles, full skirts, a flare below the knee and uneven hemlines. In 1928 there were flounces, jabots, pleating, decorative girdles, odd seams, flying scarfs, floating sleeves, raglan shoulders, and hip yokes that were features to attract attention and prove change from the last season.

Necklines were softened with lace using its old sway over the neck opening. The decorative neckline went hand-in-hand with the flowing, straight skirt. Coats in the summer were not only for comfort but often as a decoration. Coats were not meant to hide the dress but slyly reveal it. Well fitted shoulders were a necessity. The slim arm was as important as the slim ankle. Muscles were taboo. Stringy tendons were abhorred. Women went to great lengths to look just right.





Women's fabric colors in 1928 were bright and vivacious. Fabrics in garden colors let in brilliancy. With bright colors available, black and white, dark blue and mist gray were running mates. For more information about colors in the Model A era, check out *The Color of Fashions in Your Model A World* written by MAFCA member Peggy Gill. Her research and color descriptions will steer you in the right direction to recreate that perfect ensemble.

In young girls fashions, there was the allure of the new smocking which simplified fitting with straight under-arm seams. Another great trend was hand stitchery with effectively placed dainty flowerets made from French knots.



Men's clothing was like women's fashions, proper etiquette and correct attire was the norm. Wool was the primary fiber although other fibers were woven in to create subtle patterns. Popular colors included blue, gray, blue and black. In warm climates, lightweight suits were worn without vests.

The year 1928 offered many clothing options, and the beginning of the Model A era. Be sure to read the following articles for each year in this series, Looking Your Loveliest in 1929, 1930 and 1931, to see what a difference a year makes.



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

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## AFTER 43 YEARS LETS LOOK BACK AT SOME PWA CLUB HISTORY

The Following Article, By Gwyn Machacek, Entitled "CRANKED UP IN 1977", Was Published In Our September 1995 & July 2012 Newsletter By Paul Lewis:

"For several years there was talk between Model A'ers about trying to form a Model A Club North of Houston and in Montgomery County. Four people said, "Let's try". Notices were posted everywhere in the Spring, Woodlands, and Conroe area telling of the first gathering to be held August 9, 1977 at the Gulf State Auditorium in Conroe. Those four people were Keith Jenkins, Buddy Moore, Larry and Gwyn Machacek.

Eight families attended the gathering and they all said, "Let's give this club a try". Officers were selected and then one of the big topics of discussion was what can we call ourselves. Suggestions such as; Conroe A's, Montgomery County Motometers, Piney Wood A's, Big Thicket A's and Rambling A's were suggested. It was suggested that a name would be picked at the September meeting. Everyone then browsed through the display of literature on the Model A that Keith Jenkins and Larry Machacek had set up.

At the second meeting the name Piney Wood Model A Ford Club (Piney Wood A's, for short) was chosen and a Newsletter's name of "The Ford Squeaks" was selected. Moreover, the club grew by 4 new members.

By the end of 1977, the newly formed club had 16 families. They were Bryant Baugus, Donald & Cindy Chrisner, John & Judy Davidson, Monte Fine, Jerry Fisher, Thomas Gilbert, Dick Hand, Keith & Marlene Jenkins, Benny Klekar, Tom & Joan Lowery, Larry & Gwyn Machacek, Donald Mog, Buddy & Sandy Moore, Guy & Betty Nightingate, Harold & Carolyn Smith, and Thomas Wilkerson.

The following year (1978) saw the club becoming a chapter of the Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA). Years later, in 1983, the club became a region in the Model A Restorers Club (MARC). <u>"THE REST IS HISTORY."</u>

At our 35<sup>th</sup> Anniversary luncheon July 14, 2012, we all receive a souvenir print out of all the Piney Wood A's meeting minutes for 1977. The club today has far surpassed any vision our founding fathers might have had 35 years ago.

We all should be proud of that as we tack on the future years to come and, be very thankful for that meeting held on August 9, 1977 when <u>"Let's Give This Club A Try"</u> received enough "Yes" votes.
