
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August 17, 2024

Our monthly meeting was brief; therefore, no meeting minutes were taken.









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

We are quite sure George Ross, Gene and many other antique car owners are already spinning tall tales in their Heavenly Home.



To satisfy your curiosity at once as to myself, I will tell you all about it. I was, for some years, a member of congress. In my last canvass, I told the people of my district, that, if they saw fit to reelect me, I would serve them as faithfully as I had done; but, if not, they might go to h—, and I would go to Texas. I was beaten, gentlemen, and here I am." The roar of applause was like a thunder-burst.

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MAFFI Minute - Win Betsy

Through the generosity of Donna Lewis, former MAFCA President and MAFFI Trustee, "Betsy," a 1930 Ford Model A has been donated to help raise funds for the expansion of the beloved Model A Ford Museum. The car remains in the same condition as restored by Red Grow in the 1950s. Enjoy driving "Betsy," your newest Model A, to your next cruise-in or car show. This is a truly historical vehicle, once owned by a MAFFI Hall of Fame inductee.

"Betsy," became famous as the best Model A in the world. The Ford Model A has gathered 32 top place trophies in the 34 shows which the car was entered. That includes two national shows in 1957 and 1962. Overall, the car won 39 trophies. It is said that Red Grow's car, "Betsy," was an inspiration at the time. It drove many people to do their best in restoring their own car. This urge to do the best restoration possible, developed the need for more information about how to a better job. As a result, the Judging Standards evolved. We can thank Red Grow and the MAFCA founders for their vision.

In 1967, Red sold "Betsy" to a Ford car dealer named Dave Grubbs for \$5,000, an unheard-of price in those days. As a result, Dave Grubb placed the car in a glass cage centered in his dealer showroom. 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Women, Exercise and Workout Clothes

The perception of exercise for women changed dramatically during the 1920s. At the turn of the century the common thought was that a woman's body was not suited to strenuous exercise. Suggested activities included horseback riding (where the horse does all the work), walking, dancing, calisthenics, badminton, tennis and bicycling. Basketball was also played using modified rules. Although we still do these things today, early 20th century women were cautioned not to overdo strenuous activities that could cause physical strain or damage to their reproductive organs.

In 1900 one woman participated in the Olympics in a sailing competition. By 1924 more women were competing in other events, which caused many to re-evaluate the benefits of more strenuous activity.

The fashion styles of the era changed as well. The corseted figure was out and the long, sleek look was in. If a woman wanted to take advantage of corset-less fashions, her body needed to be sleek as well. Other than wearing a girdle, the only way to achieve a slender body was through exercise. The clothes worn for exercise evolved during the 1920s and 1930s. The Model A era is right in the middle of this transition. Acceptable clothing changed slowly, but not completely until the mid 1930s. The most common exercise attire for both girls and women were bloomers, a middy (sailor) blouse in long or short sleeves and black leggings. At the time there was no alternative clothing for more strenuous activity. However, women became more creative using what was available.

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Some wore lingerie.



Some wore loose fitting pajamas.



Others wore bathing suits.

As the pre-runner to the leotard, the swimsuit was well suited to exercise. It had tank top shoulders, a skirted bottom with shorts underneath and was made of a knit fabric which moved with the body. Swimsuits were also made to get wet, so perspiration was not a

problem.

Catalogs like Sears and Montgomery Ward were selling girl's and young women's gym suits as an alternative to bloomers and middy blouses. The gym suits were sleeveless, belted, one piece garments with elastic at the bottom of the pant legs. The 1932 Sears Roebuck catalog sold them in sizes 8 -22 years. Size 22 years would fit a person with a bust of 40 inches. Likely many older, more mature women could fit into these as

well. However, it wasn't until the early-to-mid 1930's that society as a whole accepted this new athletic wear as proper attire.

By 1934, bloomers and middy tops were mostly phased out. Change is a long and difficult process. There may have been a feeling that these clothes were for younger people and reminded many women of school

gym classes from their past. The personal views of exercise for women needed to change first, they needed to *want* to embark on this new endeavor, and it is only then that the acceptance of new exercise clothing styles could follow behind it.

Engine Overheating





Keeping Your A's Temperature in the Cool Zone

Engine overheating has been around as long as the automobile and the Model "A" is not exempt from the problem. However, the "A's" cooling system, if working properly, is more than adequate for almost any set of driving conditions you might encounter. There are many causes for engine overheating, but once identified, most can be easily corrected.

Fan Belt - Fan belts are prone to slippage and a belt that's loose will not turn the fan and water pump at the proper speed. Belt tension can be adjusted by loosening the generator mounting bolt and pulling the generator away from the engine to take out the excess slack. A ½ to ¾ inch of belt play between the pulleys is about right. After the adjustment is made, tighten the generator bolt securely. Unfortunately, an unmodified Model "A" has no means of locking the generator in place and over time, the belt will loosen again. To alleviate this problem, you can use a "belt tensioning bracket" to hold the generator securely in place when driving. The bracket can be easily removed if the car is to be shown.

Fan - Fans can cause a problem if a "modern" type has been installed and the diameter or blade angle is too small to provide adequate airflow through the radiator. If you're determined to use this type of fan, check with other Model "A" owners to see what they have on their car. There's nothing wrong with the original two blade propeller type fan that came on the Model "A" but it should be checked frequently for cracks or other damage that could make it unsafe to use.

Hoses/Clamps/Petcock -A plugged radiator hose will restrict coolant flow and a leaky hose will cause coolant loss over time. Either condition can cause the engine to overheat. It's a good idea to replace both hoses even if only one is bad because the other hose is probably living on borrowed time. Check all hose clamps for tightness and if you're more interested in driving than showing the car, consider replacing the original wire hose clamps with the modern screw-adjust type. Also, make sure that the drain petcock located in the water return pipe is not leaking.


Water Pump - The Model "A" water pump is simple and robust but it can fail. If the impeller is loose on the shaft, the pump won't circulate the coolant. On the other hand, the pump may deliver too much coolant at highway speeds causing coolant loss through the radiator's overflow pipe. The new "leak-less" water pumps appear to have a higher output capacity and have the capability to overflow a poorly maintained system. Once again, check with others to see what they're doing.

License Plates and Other Radiator Obstructions - The headlight bar seems like the ideal place to mount the license plate, but the plate does block a sizable chunk of the radiator's cooling fin area. A radiator ornament or plaque will do the same thing. On a hot day, consider removing the ornaments and flipping the license plate into a horizontal position to expose more fins to the airstream.

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Tech Snip It Tip: Distributor Cam Grease Application

This small piece of paper was included in the box with the new distributor points. Look closely at where the grease is applied – not to the cam itself, but to the side of the rubbing block. This makes a lot of sense if you think about it. Much like an oil impregnated bearing. The grease is allowed to constantly feed the rubbing block at the interface due to the direction of rotation. A different / maybe new way to look at applying cam lubricant.



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














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The International Order of the Rubber Chicken

At a meeting of the international Order of the Rubber Chicken Society (IORCS), the following rules and silly things have been agreed to and enacted upon. Rule #1

All chapters should name their chicken. It is most appropriate to name the chicken after a member so deserving because of the regularity or quantity of times he/she has had the honorable chicken bestowed up him/her.

Rule #7

Out of respect, the Rubber Chicken shall be honorably retired once its head or both legs has fallen off.

Rule #8

Each chapter should appoint a Colonel Chicken whose job shall be to determine all disputed matters. His/her word is final and not open to debate.

Rule #9

Life Time Achievement Award. The Rubber Chicken shall be permanently given to he/she who run their Model A out of gas while on tour (known as the Pruett Rule of "Don't worry, I have plenty of gas". This is not debatable! Note: an appropriate rubber chicken Mardi-gras necklace may be given in fleu of the original rubber chicken.
