




Along with the Hubley races and displays, there were over 200 raffle items, 7 car evaluations, 10 fashion model entries, 5 fashion displays and 5 car games

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The Grand Tour





The First stop on our Grand Tour was the Caddo Mounds State Historical Site.



As the Indians adapted to the changes over the centuries, one site remained. The Hasanti group settled in this area. Today 3 large mounds are intriguing. It is believed that these are not burial mounds but sites of temples.

Today there are replicas of the types of homes that they lived in.

They were still here until the 1830's when they moved further west near the Brazos Valley area

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Onward to the next stop on the Grand Tour. The Mission Tejas State Park.

This park site was originally home to Mission San Francisco de los Tejas, the first Spanish mission in the province of Texas.

In 1690, Catholic missionaries from Spain began settling the region in hopes of Christianizing the local Nabedache Indians and establishing a buffer against France's colony in Louisiana.

Today there is a replica of the type of mission that would have been built at the time.









Located within the park is the Rice Family home

Originally constructed in 1828, the home was added on twice, and completed in 1838. The home is 80% complete and was lived in until 1918.

The home was donated to the state and relocated from nearby to the park in 1974

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On to the next stop and a lunch break at Ratliff Lake. This site was at one time the largest logging mill in Texas Lunch was great and by the smiles, everyone had a great relaxing time.

4-C Sawmill Built in 1902 and in operation for 16 years, the 4-C Mill was the largest sawmill in Texas and produced 300,000 feet of lumber a day. Operated by Louisiana and Texas Lumber, the mill was named for Central Coal and Coke Company, which owned the lumber company.













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One of the tour visits was to the Sterne-Hoya House Museum and Library located in Nacogdoches.

The home was an 1830 dogtrot-style home built by Adolpho Sterne and later sold to the Von der Hoya family in 1869











Once again thanks to the Dallas Model A Ford Club for hosting an outstanding tour in a great historical area.

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MAFFI Minute - Win Betsy

Through the generosity of Donna Lewis, former MAFCA President and MAFFI Trustee, "Betsy," a 1930 Ford Model A has been donated to help raise funds for the expansion of the beloved Model A Ford Museum. The car remains in the same condition as restored by Red Grow in the 1950s. Enjoy driving "Betsy," your newest Model A, to your next cruise-in or car show. This is a truly historical vehicle, once owned by a MAFFI Hall of Fame inductee.

"Betsy," became famous as the best Model A in the world. The Ford Model A has gathered 32 top place trophies in the 34 shows which the car was entered. That includes two national shows in 1957 and 1962. Overall, the car won 39 trophies. It is said that Red Grow's car, "Betsy," was an inspiration at the time. It drove many people to do their best in restoring their own car. This urge to do the best restoration possible, developed the need for more information about how to a better job. As a result, the Judging Standards evolved. We can thank Red Grow and the MAFCA founders for their vision.

In 1967, Red sold "Betsy" to a Ford car dealer named Dave Grubbs for \$5,000, an unheard-of price in those days. As a result, Dave Grubb placed the car in a glass cage centered in his dealer showroom. It's a necessary ingredient.

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Jim's Tech Tips

"Make and Carry a Temporary Gas Gauge"

Every now and then you will come across a car or truck with an inoperable gas gauge. For example, the float sinks. You don't want to go driving around without knowing how much fuel you have in the tank.

Here are some basic instructions that you can use to make a temporary gas gauge, to use until the gauge is repaired. It's not a bad idea to carry it with you, to use on your car or to help someone traveling with you.

Take a simple paint stirring stick, like they give away at a paint store, and measure up from the end to mark the place indicating a Full tank. From there, you can use a ruler to estimate the $\frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{1}{4}$ and $\frac{3}{4}$ levels. Score a line in the wood at these 4 places, and then darken each line with a black marker.

The gas tank changed design between 1928-29 and 1930-31. The '28-29 tank holds about 10 gallons, and the larger '30-31 tank holds about 11. That means that the distance to Full is slightly different between the two tanks.

I score and mark one side of the paint stirrer with the '28-29 height to Full of $7\frac{1}{4}$ ", and then mark off the quarters from there. Then I do the same on the other side of the stick using the 1930-31 height to Full of $8\frac{1}{2}$ ". Label each side. Now you have a stick that can be used on any year Model A.

To use it, remove the gas cap (and the screen in the filler neck, if the car has one) and just dip the stick straight down until you touch the bottom of the gas tank. Now lift it out and see where the wet gas level is on the gauge. It will be approximate, close enough to drive with some confidence, knowing you will have enough fuel.

I hope you never get stuck with an inoperative gas gauge, but if you do, now you can be prepared with this temporary stick gauge.

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WHAT ARE HUBLEY CARS AND HOW DO WE RACE THEM?

The Hubley Company of Pennsylvania made accurate metal replicas of Model "A" Fords and other cars for any years. There are seven Model "A" Ford body styles available: Fordor Sedan, Station Wagon, Coupe, Roadster, Pickup, Victoria, and Phaeton.

One day many years ago, someone got the idea that it might be fun to "race" these model cars down a track similar to the "Pinewood Derby" track used by the Boy and Girl Scouts. Initially only appearing in local and regional MAFCA events, the Hubley Derby came into the national spotlight when it was an official event at the 1994 Tacoma MAFCA/MARC National Meet.

Over the years, three separate manufacturers had taken over production of these model kits: JBL, Gabriel, and Spec Scale Models. All the parts are interchangeable between them, and they are equally suitable for racing. The model kits are no longer being produced, but the original Hubley, JBL, Gabriel, and Spec Scale Model kits can still be located at swap meets, antique stores and at online sites like eBay.

The kits contain several metal body castings and an assortment of plastic parts. It does take some time to clean up all the pieces and paint them, but the results are well worth the effort. This is a great family participation project for the younger members, as everyone who races a car must be involved in some part of the building of it. And for those of us living in the Northern climate, what better way to chase away the winter blues than playing with toy cars.

Hubley races are a great participation and spectator sport. Crowds really get involved in the runoffs and cheer for their favorites. The format is side-by-side racing on a two-lane track with elimination races until the age group champion is finally crowned. Some of the fiercest competition is in the 18 and over group. (Taken from the Central Iowa A's)

Our Treasure Valley Model A Club owns a Hubley Derby Race Track and it is stored in Elvin's Shop. We are going to try to hold a Hubley Derby later this summer at one of our monthly meetings. If you have a model car get it ready to race. If your model kit is "in progress" finish it. If you want to build one contact Ron Carr – he had 3 kits with him at the May meeting and is willing to sell them for \$30 each.

Get your kids and grandkids involved. It is a great way to introduce them to Model A's and our Club activities.

Straighten Wheels

Question: I have two 1930 Model A's. Before I put new tires on my old rims I would like to make sure that the rims are not bent or warped. Is there a Co. that can straighten wire wheels and that can powder coat. Is there a company that specializes in this. -- Albert Welledits

Answer: A tire and wheel shop in my town advertises that they will straighten modern wheels, so you might check with one in your area. A few Model A Chapters have their own spoke wheel straighteners and provide this service to others . I have an original wheel straightener made by Wheel Service Equipment in 1934. You can also go to Vince Falter's "Ford Garage" website to see his article and more pictures of my wheel straightener. Another article; "How to Straighten Model A Wheels" can be found in Vol. 8 pg. 53-58 in the MAFCA Store book "How to Restore Your Model A". Several companies also manufacture wheel straightener machines priced from \$7 to \$22,000 but they are primarily for modern aluminum alloy wheels but might also work on our spoke wheels. **David Bockman**, 2016 Technical Director posted 05/10/16

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JUNE BRIDES By Harriet McNeill



With the June wedding season approaching, here is what a bride needs before the wedding, as suggested in *McCall's*, 1931.

For each bed, four sheets, six pillowcases, one pair of blankets, one comforter. Also, one dozen bath towels, eighteen face towels, eight guest towels, one dozen wash cloths, two bath mats, one dozen dish towels, six glass towels, table cloths, tea cloths or place mats, large or medium size napkins, tea napkins, bureau covers, doilies, dusters, etc. The custom was that if the girl could afford it, she was to bring into the marriage enough of the household linens to start the running of a new house or apartment. She could have had embroidered sheets to dozens and dozens of table napkins, but the bride could also start comfortably with items from the above list.

Personally, for clothing, especially underthings, the bride was to have enough to last at least six months to a year. She needed not less than: four sets of underwear, four nightgowns, six pairs of stockings, three good pairs of shoes (two day and one evening), one kimono/negligee and slippers, twelve handkerchiefs, two morning dresses. Also a good suitcase was needed and maybe a trunk for going away AND enough loose cash in her purse so she did not have to ask for money on the very first day of the wedding trip.



Gifts were always sent to the bride, and if they arrived after she left for her honeymoon, they were opened by her mother and recorded in the "bride book" so the gifts could be acknowledged promptly upon her return.

The wedding dress and bridesmaids' dresses were to be simple and youthful unless the wedding was in the evening, then they would be conservative evening dresses. I thought it interesting that if you were married in your going away dress, you would only have a maid of honor who would wear a street dress and hat.

The most practical thing was consideration of expenses. The bride's family and the groom's family were responsible for certain expenses just as they are today. One note------there was no mention of a rehearsal or rehearsal dinner.

The word for the day was:

Don't start your life's greatest venture with nerves and body below par.

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5 Things Every Great Workbench Has

Many DIY shop or garage staples exist, but the workbench stands above the rest. Having a work surface other than the floor can make working on projects safer, more efficient, and more enjoyable. Sadly, just because benches are ubiquitous does not mean each one is good.

Like so many other things in life, a workbench must balance budget, function, appearance, and specialization. While we can't help you with the last one on that list, we can get you to a great starting point by calling out some of the attributes that every good workbench will have. Whether you are building a new one or checking up on one that you've been using for years, here are five characteristics every great workbench needs.

A Flat Surface

You don't need to rebuild a carburetor on a certified granite slab, but you do want a surface that can be clean and smooth while not allowing parts to roll away. You'll often need to level your bench using shims or some other method, because garage floors are not typically very even—occasionally, on purpose.

Dozens of materials can be appropriate for bench tops, so be sure to take a deep look at what kinds of projects you think you'll tackle and choose a material that can take the amount of weight you need it to and that won't deform during use. Butcher's block surfaces have been great to me, though there are a few sections of my bench that have some serious dents from hammer blows or heavy parts.



Height

The standard countertop height is 36", and for me, an extra inch and three-quarters makes my bench a lot more comfortable. It might be tempting to plan your workbench around the height of a kitchen countertop (36 inches is standard), but be careful: Most kitchen tasks are less precise than most DIY projects, and food prep and cooking don't require leverage



or a large range of movement like garage work often does. A lower work surface height is more tolerable in a kitchen, the arrangement of which needs to be somewhat standardized. Your workspace has no such constraints. Set your bench at a comfortable height for you and the work you do. That might even mean two benches at two different heights: parts cleaning is best done at a lower bench, while carburetor rebuilding is best done at a higher one so that it's easier to see.

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Heft

A flimsy bench makes work difficult in several ways. If you've got a component plopped on top of your workbench, and every time you move it or shift something for access, the whole bench moves, you won't feel confident in the work you're doing.

Again, be careful: You can have too much of a good thing. Nice and sturdy does not require using 6×6-inch steel tubing for legs and 1/2-inch plate for the top. There's a place for a bench like that in a welding shop, but it would be more annoying than helpful in most home shops.

A Solid Vise

A sturdy vise is mandatory for any workbench.

The third hand we always seem to need, a vise, is a necessity for any shop for many reasons. It can be an anvil, a press, or an anchor that can help projects big and small in a multitude of ways. Don't believe me? Try working without one for a while.

Like the other characteristics listed here, consider your specific needs and choose accordingly. Do we all need Wilton Bullets*? No, but most people would be better served with one than with an import vise whose jaws don't line up evenly and have a ton of slop. If you're on a budget, consider buying an old vise to restore. It's a fun project, and we can honestly say that cast metals aren't what they once were.

Sturdiness

When wrenching on something, it's nice to have a workbench that doesn't move an inch to the left when trying to loosen something and an inch to the right when tightening something. Especially if you are not planning to bolt the bench to a wall or other structure in your garage, consider using an underbench shelf for storage: It will add a nice, low weight and improve stability.

Bonus: Wheels

These are stem-type castors that make for easy installation. I've said it before and will say it again: The ability to bring your tools and workspace to your project is a superpower. Buy a good set of double-locking casters, put them on your bench, and suddenly, it is a tool that goes places with you. The other side of the shop? Easy. The driveway? No problem. Putting multiple benches together to create a super bench? Also, an option! Use this power wisely.

No matter what, having a workbench is better than not having one. If you are looking to maximize your workspace and haven't assessed whether your workbench is working for or against you, now is the time.


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














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The International Order of the Rubber Chicken
