
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## From the President's Desk

Dear Fellow Officers and Club Members,

The Piney Wood Model A Ford Club deliberated on a motion from members in early 2024 regarding our continued involvement in the Gulf Coast Tour. This tour has traditionally been sponsored by Golden Triangle A's, Greater Houston A's, and Piney Wood A's with each club rotating sponsorship. Our leadership took a very hard look at reported attendance and tours from 2015 through 2023. The results showed multiple club cancellations and a track record of poor attendance.

The Board of Directors voted to cancel our sponsorship in the Gulf Coast Tour. This was a difficult decision since our Model A hobby thrives on participation in national events, local tours and the fellowship of friends and neighboring clubs. Many of our members belong to these other clubs.

This decision was subsequently brought before the general membership for another (optional) vote. The club responded in like, and the members voted to cancel sponsorship for the Gulf Coast Tour for 2024 and future Gulf Coast Tours.

We share the hope that our clubs find alternative events and activities that can be jointly participated in and that our club leaders recognize the value in our clubs continuing to share our experiences, friendships, and future functions. Our club looks forward to responding to and initiating any ideas and invitations for such activities.




Meeting: April 10, 2024 Held: Valley Ranch Restaurant




After living there for a short time, he fell and fractured his pelvis. He was hospitalized for several months until his death due to other complications that developed.

We saw patches of Bluebonnets, but the red Paintbrush and yellow Coreopsis were plentiful and made a beautiful addition to the drive.



Gonzales is known for being the location of the start of the Texas Revolution for Independence from Mexico and so it was fitting to learn the history of the area.

In 1831 while the colonists were under Mexican rule, the government loaned the citizens of Gonzales a small bronze cannon to protect themselves against hostile Indians with the understanding the colonists would return the cannon at the request of the government. In 1835 when soldiers were sent to retrieve the cannon, the colonists sent word they were keeping the cannon and took the soldiers sent to collect it as prisoners.



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The colonists buried the cannon and sent for help. The Mexican army sent 100 soldiers to make a more serious request for the return of the gun. The Texians, as the colonists were called, had taken the motto of "Come and Take it" by this time. A few days before a battle over the cannon ensued, two young ladies made a flag with an image of a cannon and the words "Come and Take It". The flag was raised above the cannon during the first day of battle in Gonzales.





You can see the original cannon and a replica of the carriage made for it at the Gonzales Memorial Museum. The cannon and flag were transported to San Antonio to serve there, but the flag was lost along the way and never rediscovered.

Along our 72-mile drive, we stopped at the marker for the first shot fired of the Texas Revolution on October 2, 1835. An Alamo A's member gave us a very informative talk on the beginning of the revolution.

After lunch in Shiner, we had suggestions of visiting the brewery, returning to Gonzales to explore the city or visiting an antiques and art shop with a large selection of beer and wine. The group split up and went to explore on their own. Maybe some went back to their hotel and took a nap?



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## MODEL A RESTORERS CLUB MILEAGE PROGRAM GUIDELINES

### PURPOSE

The purpose of the MARC Mileage Program is to offer national recognition for all miles driven by MARC members. There is no intent to supersede or cancel any Regional or local driving programs now in existence; rather, the program seeks to further them by offering a driven-car recognition for all registered MARC vehicles.

### GENERAL

All Model A's owned by MARC members and registered in the MARC Mileage Program, and which meet the following standards, are eligible.

- A. Of original manufacture from 1927 through 1931.
- B. Titled or registered as a Model A in accordance with respective state requirements.
- C. Authentic in overall appearance, with a minimum of the following basic features:
  - 1. Original Ford four-cylinder engine produced from 1927 through 1934.
  - Body style for year of manufacture.

### RULES FOR MILES DRIVEN

- All ground mileage is credited, except for non-emergency tow.
- B. All credited mileage is cumulative from year to year and to each higher award level.
- Mileage to be credited must be attested.
- D. No mileage is credited for any period of time that the owner is not a member of the Model A Restorers Club.
- E. Mileage does not have to be updated every year to maintain eligibility.
- F. Mileage is accumulated through the reporting of the odometer reading as of December 31 of each year.
- G. The MARC Mileage Program Chairman is the final authority on mileage credit and awards.

### NATIONAL AWARDS

- A. Award recognition begins at 2,000 miles; the second award level is 5,000 miles; and subsequent levels are at each additional 5,000 miles thereafter.
- B. A radiator plaque is awarded with the first mileage level, and a replacement mileage tab is awarded thereafter.

### REGISTRATION

- A. A registration fee of \$1.00 is required at time of vehicle registration and is good for as long as the owner is a member in good standing of MARC. If MARC membership is allowed to lapse, vehicle must be re-registered. Mileage reported during prior MARC membership may be carried forward.
- MARC shall maintain the original registration as a permanent record for each vehicle registered and receiving recognition.
- C. A vehicle transferred to another MARC member who re-registers the car may maintain its reported mileage award level and continue eligibility for further awards.



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## **Bonnie's Bits of Yesteryear**

### Soda Clerk or Soda "Jerk"

Soda jerks were typically young men who prepared and served soda drinks and ice-cream sodas. Soda fountains were typically found in drugstores or "5 & 10 Cent Stores" such as Woolworths. The drinks were made by mixing flavored syrup,



carbonated water and sometimes malt powder over ice or over a few scoops of ice cream. The beverages were always served in a tall glass with drinking straws or a long-handled spoon known as a "soda spoon".

The formal job title of the drugstore assistant who operated the fountain service was "soda clerk." However, "soda jerk" was a pun on that name which was inspired by the "jerking" action the server would implement to move the fountain handle back and forth when adding soda. The term became very popular in the 20s and 30s and even lasted into the 50s.

The soda fountain spigot was typically a sturdy, shiny fixture attached at the end of a pipe which protruded over the counter and curved down at the end for filling glasses. Since most drinks required carbonated water, the tap handle was large to accommodate the frequent use of the fountain.

The position of soda clerk was a coveted one, and usually only awarded after a prolonged position of menial labor in the store. Soda jerking was dominated by popular young men with flashy personalities and good people skills because of the popular environment and "cool" association. These boys who worked at the shops were expected to serve the drinks and also socialize and entertain the quests.

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Soda jerks were known for having their own lingo for how their drinks were made. They created nicknames for different drinks. For example, they called a glass of milk a "baby" and a strawberry milkshake became known as a "milkshake in the hay". A coke\_with ice was called a "scratch one". They also had lingo to express how they wanted their drink to be served. Coffee would be served strong if called "draw one from the south". And if a drink was ordered with extra ice, it was "heavy on the hail".

**P.S.** While there are no longer any Woolworth stores, there is still a Woolworth Soda Fountain in Ashville, NC.

### WOMEN IN AIR RACING

Ever since humans invented motorized flight, they have attempted to race airplanes in the sky. Air racing thrived in the 1920s and 1930s when air travel was a novelty to the American public. Thrilling narratives of the races appeared on the front pages of leading national newspapers and periodicals. The popularity of air racing—which lifted to a high altitude in the early decades of the twentieth century—was grounded by the end of World War II. The popularity of the air races and exhibitions expanded across gender and race lines. In 1906, the first woman flew an aircraft. In 1921, Bessie Coleman became the first African American (man or woman) to earn a pilot's license (she had to travel to France to receive it, as no domestic institute would offer her one).

The First Women's Air Derby was a transcontinental race that began in Santa Monica, California, and culminated in Cleveland, Ohio, for the 1929 Cleveland National Air Races. Amelia Earhart, Pancho Barnes, Louise Thaden, Bobbi Trout and other women aviators of the era brought international attention to women in aviation. That same year, The Ninety-Nines Women's Aviation Organization was born... literally under the wing of an airplane in Cleveland. The organization was founded November 2, 1929, at Curtiss Field, Valley Stream, Long Island, New York. All 117

women pilots at the time were invited to assemble for mutual support, the advancement of aviation and to create a central office to keep files on women in aviation. In 1931, Amelia Earhart was elected the first President, and the group selected the name "Ninety-Nines" to represent the 99 charter members.

Seventy women held U.S. Department of Commerce licenses in August 1929, but only 40 met the race requirements. Participants had to have 100 hours of solo flight including 25 hours of solo cross-country to points more than 40 miles from the starting airport. The pilot also had to hold a license from

the Fédération Aéronautique Internationale (FAI) and an annual sporting license issued by the contest committee of the National Aeronautics Association (NAA). Each participant also had to carry a gallon of water and a three-day



food supply. Twenty women entered the Derby. The course took eight days to fly and navigate using only dead reckoning and road maps. Undaunted by route changes, sabotage, and death, 14 women completed the Derby with Louise Thaden finishing first.

Prior to the Bendix Trophy Race, air racing officials just would not believe that women were skilled enough to compete against men. Women were encouraged to hold their own competitions. From this came competitions such as the Women's International Free-For-All. Occasionally, women were allowed to compete with the men, such as the National Air Race and Transcontinental Handicap Air Derby, but any accident gave race officials one more excuse to exclude women.

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
## Jim's Tech Tips "Difficult Steering"

Many Model A owners find their car hard to steer when parking or maneuvering at low speed. After you confirm that there is oil in the steering gear box (not grease), the tires are all inflated to 35 psi, and everything on the front axle has been properly greased, you are left with the most likely cause: The spindle bolt (kingpin) "thrust bearings" are defective or they are not shimmed up properly to support the weight of the car. You can confirm this by using a floor jack to take some weight off of the front wheels, and then see if the steering effort is drastically reduced. If it is, the problem is the bearings.

To correct this, you need to remove everything from the spindles to get to the kingpins and remove them. See Les Andrews' Red Book, starting on page 1-209, for directions. The illustration below comes from later in that section.

Clean the thrust bearing and replace it if it does not turn smoothly or shows any signs of wear. Pack the bearing with grease before reinstalling.

When reassembling, you need to test fit the spindle with the kingpin fully locked in place with the locking pin. Temporarily leave the large felt seal and metal washer off of the bottom of the spindle for this. Start with the number of shims previously used, then add 1 shim at a time until very little or no vertical movement of the spindle is felt on the kingpin. It can take up to 4 shims to compensate for wear.



At some point, adding a shim may jam up the spindle, making it hard to turn on the kingpin. If it does, take that last shim out, reassemble, and confirm that the spindle again moves easily, as it should. Now reassemble the spindle on the axle with the felt seal and the cupped metal washer installed between the axle and the bottom part of the spindle (the metal cup touches the axle, the felt touches the spindle). The added thickness of the felt seal may temporarily make the spindle a bit stiff turning on the kingpin, but it will quickly flatten out and move smoothly when you drive.

Now reinstall everything that attaches to the spindle, install the brakes, maybe use this as an opportunity to clean and repack the wheel bearings, then install the drums and the wheels. Grease all of the fittings well. Go for a test drive, enjoy the easier steering, and Have a Model A Day!

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














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## The International Order of the Rubber Chicken
