Jerusalem remembers in the days of her affliction and wandering all the precious things that were hers from days of old. When her people fell into the hand of the foe, and there was none to help her, her foes gloated over her; they mocked at her downfall. (Lamentations 1:7)

My grandfather and I attended a concert recently where we heard *Tenebrae* by the Argentinian composer Osvaldo Golijov. It was a piece that was based on the French tradition of applying a musical setting to the Book of Lamentations. We learned that *Tenebrae* was written shortly after Golijov had visited Jerusalem, the city at the heart of Lamentations, and witnessed for himself the first days of the Second Intafada (a series of terrorist attacks in Jerusalem from 2000 to 2005).

We were assured that the concert program was put together before October 7<sup>th</sup> and the conflict between Israel and Hamas that has now seemed to spread throughout the Middle East, and even beyond, and which has now, unfortunately, claimed the lives of three of our service members. Nevertheless, it's hard to imagine anything other than the current conflict was on the minds of anyone in the audience, including myself and my grandfather.

Of course, conflict is nothing new to Israel or Jerusalem, and the Book of Lamentations, the inspiration for Gojilov's *Tenebrae*, is dedicated to Jerusalem's destruction at the hands of foreigners, almost 600 years before the birth of Christ. Now, there are plenty of cities that get destroyed in the Bible, so why is an entire book dedicated to the destruction of this one city?

The destruction of Jerusalem was the start of the time of the Babylonian Captivity. Millions lost their homes. But for the people of Old Testament Israel, Jerusalem wasn't just a home, it was a promise. God dwelled with His people in His Temple in Jerusalem, and He promised that all nations would be blessed through His people Israel. So when Jerusalem was destroyed, including the Temple of God, there was good cause for lament.

But Jerusalem wouldn't stay destroyed, and neither would God's Temple. The time of exile would not last forever. Both the city and the Temple would be built. And God would keep His promises. He would dwell with His people, but this time in the flesh – in Jesus Christ.

Like how the Temple was destroyed and rebuilt, Jesus would be killed, and He would rise again. But today, the Temple in Jerusalem is still destroyed. Unlike the Temple, Jesus is alive. He reigns in glory with His Father in heaven.

It may seem we live in a more precarious time now than we have for the last few years, at least internationally. But even with all the instability we see in our world, we can be confident in the sure hope of our Lord. Because He lives and reigns with the Father and the Holy Spirit. One God, forever and ever. Amen.

#### DCE Message

Some of you may know, and if you don't, you will soon, that we have an awesome group of volunteers who spend the afternoons on many Thursdays throughout the year creating quilts to give away to various groups and organizations. If you already knew that, you might not know that after they complete their work each week, they spend a little bit of time engaging in a time of devotion with Vicar, Pastor, or myself. When I lead, I like to try to write my own devotions, if inspiration strikes. On this last occasion, based on a devotion I originally prepared for January that got a bit delayed in delivery, our conversation briefly turned toward Lent, and I thought I might share some of those insights here. I hope the quilters will forgive me for recycling.

For context, here is the part of the devotion that prompted these remarks:

"...so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin but to save those who are eagerly waiting for Him."

(Hebrews 9:28)

What type of new year resolution did you make this year?

At the start of a new year it is quite common to make resolutions to better ourselves in some way, right?

Usually resolutions are things like exercising more, eating better, quitting a bad habit, reading more, seeing the world, or spending more time with family and friends.

Our resolutions usually center on things that will help us live longer, look better, and be happier.

Just like at the new year, Lent is, at least for some people, an additional time to recommit to better practices. This usually plays out in the form of "giving something up for Lent" where in which you commit to abstaining from a poor practice that you typically enjoy. This is commonly referred to as a "fast," mirroring in a minor way the fast Jesus performed before being tempted in the wilderness. We, of course, do not give up food for forty days and forty night, but instead, we abstain from things like chocolate, soda, video games, television, or excess shopping. We give up, typically, bad habits that are enjoyable, sometimes a little too much, to prepare for the Lenten season.

Did you know, though, that the common practice, when performing a fast, is to replace the bad habit with, instead, a more beneficial spiritual discipline? Instead of just giving up chocolate, you could take the money that you would typically spend on that item and use it to benefit someone else, like the food pantry or Orphan Grain Train. Instead of just giving up playing video games for an hour each day, you could spend that hour reading devotions, studying God's Word, or engaging in prayer. In this way, this time of fasting can have the twofold benefit of both removing the bad and encouraging some new servant oriented and devotional practices.

At the same time, even if you choose not to refrain and abstain during Lent, you could still use the season to recommit to lapsed habits. Maybe you have a devotional that has been sitting on the shelf, and this can be your opportunity to dust off the cover and begin the study. If, on that note, you are looking for a new devotion, the Lenten booklets provided by the church, at least based on my prior experience, are quite good.

Now, as I close this message, I do want to add one more small note. I am sure that it has become clear at this point that some people like to engage in a fast during the season of Lent, and some people do not. As this is not commanded nor forbidden by the Bible, it is a matter of Christian freedom, and as such, each Christian is free to choose if they want to fast. With that in mind, Lent does not need to be an opportunity to boast, if you choose to engage in a fast, or a time to judge, if you know someone who does not. Lent is supposed to be a season of humble preparation for the great sacrifice that Jesus paid on the cross for the forgiveness of our sins, and with that, a fast should be nothing more than an opportunity to enrich our own faith walk as we take the time to contemplate this reality in prayer, praise, study, and worship.

This time of the year, at least for me, always seems to come with a lot of wonder. That means that Palm Sunday, Confirmation, Holy Week, and Easter are all fast approaching. Even with all of these fast approaching dates, including the ones like Confirmation that specifically impact the youth of this congregation, I don't want to get too ahead of ourselves and forget to see the opportunities that are currently taking place. With that in mind, we, here in the Zion Lutheran Church youth group planning department, have a lot of interesting opportunities planned for the next several weeks, and months, and we hope you take some time during this whirlwind time to join us for some events and meetings. That being said, the last several months have had a few opportunities for fun and excitement, as well. Enclosed are a few brief reminders and a quick recap of some things that have happened in regards to the Zion youth department lately. First, if any students would like a church worker from this church to try to attend an upcoming activity, make sure to let us know when these events will be taking place. As we quickly look toward the spring season, a few reminders would be very helpful for the people who love to show our support at games and shows. Speaking of activities, we hope you will continue to add our upcoming events to your calendar over this next season. We would love to see you at everything planned for the next few months, and we hope that you would like to share the fun by bringing a friend as well!

Speaking of events, we have several planned to take place here in the near future. First will be our regular monthly Fusion Youth Group meeting for 7th through 12th grade students planned to take place every month, usually the second or third Sunday of the month, usually from 5PM to 7PM at Zion Lutheran Church. Second will be an additional planned youth activity for 7th though 12th grade students to take place each month either here at Zion or at another destination, depending on the activity. Both of these events have differing schedules and time frames depending on what we are doing, and where we will be going. Third, we will likely be planning to hold a variety of different fundraisers throughout the year, depending on the month, so we can continue to fundraise for our various initiatives. We would love to have your help! As you might have noticed, at this point, the previous paragraph is a little vague. With that new ZionNews schedule being quarterly, as opposed to monthly, it is a little bit harder to pin down three months worth of opportunities, especially if plans have to change. With that in mind, I would highly encourage everyone to regularly review our weekly church announcements, our church Facebook page, and our church website for up to date information on a week by week basis.

With that business taken care of, here is a brief recap of a few unique events and fundraisers from the past few months, in addition to our monthly Fusion Youth Meetings. For instance, in the month of December we held our annual youth Christmas party which included a potluck, games, and a white elephant gift exchange. In the month of January, specifically on January 26th, we took a group of 18 participants, 12 youth and 6 chaperones, to Great Bear Ski Valley in Sioux Falls for a day of fun and fellowship on the slopes. Both of these events went very well, and I love how students are already commenting that they are excited for the next planned activity, including ones that are still months in the future. At this point, I would like to thank the youth who have worked hard to manage each of these events, the parents who give of their time and money to make these events run so smoothly, and this congregation for their generosity in supporting the youth programs of this church. Otherwise, besides offering coffee on Sunday mornings, we did not fundraise during the month of January. We do have a fundraiser planned for the month of February, namely our next instance of serving as the waitstaff at the Pizza Ranch in Norfolk on February 26th, and we would love your support of both our youth program and this fundraising partner. We, of course, fundraise with a purpose. In the short term, Vicar and I are planning to, once again, take a group of students to Camp Luther in Schuyler, NE as part of his yearly vicarage project. The students who attended last year had a great time, and we are very excited to be able to offer this opportunity again this year. Check further in this ZionNews booklet for more information about this upcoming event. We are also continuing to set aside money for the next National Youth Gathering, which will take place in New Orleans in the summer of 2025. Again, all of these types of events are in addition to our monthly Fusion Youth Group meetings in which we typically gather as a group, share a meal, discuss a Bible Study lesson, plan future youth initiatives, and have fun through fellowship activities. I am also continuing my Sunday School class for youth students on Sunday mornings. Anyone 7th through 12th grades are welcome!

There really is a lot going on here at Zion, and we would love for all of the youth of this congregation to be a part of all of these exciting experiences. #### The Old Rugged Cross

But we preach Christ crucified: a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles

1 Corinthians 1:23

Once there was a little girl who proudly wore a shiny cross on a chain around her neck. The cross was pretty and it found a special place over her heart. Things would have stayed that way, except that one day she was approached by a man-one of those crabby kind of guys that, thank heaven, you don't meet very often. The man said, with a gruff voice: "Young lady, I imagine you think Jesus died on a cross for you. If He did, I don't think that cross was pretty like the one you're wearing. It was a an ugly wooden thing. I don't think you should wear it as a pierce of jewelry. After all, you wouldn't wear a hangman's noose or an electric chair around your neck, would you?"

That little girl, quick on her feet with an answer beyond her years, responded with respect: "Yes, sir, I do believe Jesus died for me on a cross. And I know that His cross would not have been as pretty as mine. But I also know, sir, what they told me in Sunday School."

"And what was that?" the man queried. "In Sunday School, my teacher told me that whatever Jesus touches, He changes," she answered. "I believe that this is true for this cross. I know that it's true for me."

That crusty old man was absolutely right. The cross upon which Jesus died to save us was not a pretty thing. It was rough and rude and crude. It was an instrument designed to give torment to the one who hung upon it. Even as the grouch was right about the horror of the cross, the little girl was right as well. The death of Jesus transformed an ancient instrument of torture into God's saving purpose and a symbol of salvation His Son won for us at such a high cost.

Yet it is not just the old rugged cross that has been changed by Jesus' life, suffering and death. The power of His redeeming, forgiving sacrifice transforms all who are called to believe on Him in faith. Christians, whose souls were once blackened by sin, are by the

washing of Baptism, made white as snow. We who once were lost and without a family are-through the cleansing of Jesus' blood-found and adopted into God's family of faith. The old rugged cross on which Jesus died became the empty cross and became our symbol for forgiveness, life and salvation. For as Jesus rose, we too, shall rise. For we are people of the resurrection. That separates us from all other religions. We worship a rise Lord. Thanks be to God!
