The Parable of the Mustard Seed - Mark 4:30 - 32

Again, Jesus is describing what the kingdom of God is like. With this parable however, he is providing an insight as to the effect that God's kingdom, God's will is to have in our world. However, in order for things to change on a grand scale, what is required is that the minds and hearts of individuals be open not only to consider a new way of being, but to realize that the moment we are willing to consider something new, is the moment that change is about to happen, and we are that change.

In this parable, Jesus compares the kingdom of God to that of a mustard seed. Since most of us no longer possess an agrarian mindset, the radical nature of this parable may be lost on us. Consider this, the mustard plant that Jesus is referring to is an insidious and pervasive weed, that once taking hold of a field, you can basically say good by to your crop. Jesus is making a link between the kingdom of God and a weed. The people then, as we today, would never think of God's kingdom, let alone His will to be like a weed. There is nothing respectful, honourable, holy or "glamorous" about this. So, let us look closely at what Jesus maybe saying in this parable.

When he says it is "the smallest of all seeds on earth" (vs31b). He is immediately beginning to challenge their perception of the kingdom of God. Any kingdom of substance and influence has to be huge and expansive, larger than any other kingdom on earth. But Jesus says, the kingdom of God, like a mustard seed is: small, insignificant and of no apparent value. What is essential within the nature of the kingdom of God, is to be humble, not seeking to be powerful or important. If we do not begin with humility, then whatever follows, will never be God's kingdom, but mine.

He goes on to say that this weed is intentionally sown into the field. It is not by accident, but by design so that it will become in time, "the largest of all garden plants" (vs32). 'Largest' here has nothing to do with being important. Rather, if it is allowed to grow, the kingdom of God's impact (humility), can be far reaching and have a positive effect in our world. But who in their right mind plants a weed among your prized crop or garden? This weed will surely destroy everything, taking over by smothering everything out. But is this what Jesus is suggesting? That for the kingdom of God to come about, means it must destroy the world around it? Not destroy, not with violence, but to show us that it can peaceably and humbly be anywhere and everywhere. It is not however, meant to be a peaceful co-existence. It is meant to be a challenge to the world around it, offering a different vision life. Once the kingdom of God has taken root, and spreads its "big branches" then bir ds (the dis-enfranchised) may come to rest in its shade and even make a home for themselves. The farmer however does not want this unwanted bush and the birds that will gather. These guests will further diminish the productivity of his crop. If the farmer had it his way, he would uproot and burn every last mustard plant. And there is the crux of Jesus' message.

The kingdom of God is meant to challenge our notions of who we believe is of value and importance - who is to be welcomed or to be shunned as our neighbour. Those listening to Jesus, had a version of the kingdom of God that allowed them to be exclusive, dismissive and if need be, to rip up and remove anyone who did not fit their criteria. For Jesus, the planting of the kingdom of God is a conscious choice, and it is to be planted in the heart of the world, not on the fringe. Here, the kingdom of God, God's will of humility, kindness, charity and hospitality towards all, is to grow along side the hatred and ill will that is in our world. The reason for this is that the kingdom of God is not to be considered an add on or an after thought, that can work in some places, limited and controlled. Rather, the kingdom of God is to first provide a safe haven for the broken hearted people in this world, and ultimately, to invite us all to change our vision of the world. To bring about a world, where there are no longer broken hearted and disenfranchised people anywhere. For this vision of the kingdom to come about everyone, everywhere needs to participate. Things change, when we change. But if I have too much of myself invested in the way things are, why would I change? Perhaps it will happen when my love of neighbour is greater than my hatred for them. Am I not hating my neighbour, if I do not lift a finger to help bring about a loving change of universal dignity for all people? My world must change so that their world will change, and together, we are living in a new world.

This is Jesus Toughest Teaching / Rob Buckingham

What does it mean to be a disciple? The Greek word is *mathetes*. It's the word from which we get our English word mathematics, which means, "to apply yourself to study, learning and knowledge." Jesus frequently encouraged people to become his mathetes, his disciples who would use their mental effort to think things through, to count the cost of what it means to be his follower: somebody who applied themselves to study, learning and knowledge of the Scriptures, and the lifestyle they require. That is, a people who wouldn't just know the Bible, they'd learn it and then live it out in their daily lives. A disciple counts the cost of what it means to be a follower of Jesus. They ask themselves the question, "Is it worth it?" And they answer with a resounding YES!

On one occasion, large crowds were travelling with Jesus, and turning to them he said: "If anyone comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters-yes, even their own life-such a person cannot be my disciple. And whoever does not carry their cross and follow me cannot be my disciple ... those of you who do not give up everything you have cannot be my disciples" (Luke 14:25-33).

Note the three kinds of people who Jesus says, "cannot be my disciples." Those who love their family more than they love him; those who are not prepared to suffer hardship; and those who value possessions more than him. That is, if you hold onto your money and possessions even though you'd be well able to meet the needs of others, you cannot be Jesus' disciple. Whatever a disciple has is always on call for the Master's use.

A Disciple Counts The Cost

It's hard teaching that's just as necessary today as it has ever been. The contemporary church draws big crowds, but how many in that crowd have counted the cost to become a disciple? My guess is very few, just as it was in Jesus' day. When he faced the cross, they all deserted. After the resurrection they started drifting back, by the day of Pentecost there were 120. Where was the crowd?

I was speaking to a Christian leader this week who specialises in church health. He told me the story of a pastor who was very proud of his large church, until God spoke to him and said, "your church isn't big, it's fat." It's easy for us to look at a big church and to think all is well. But is it a crowd or is that church making disciples?

Are You A Disciple?

Jesus frequently attempted to convert crowds into disciples. Sometimes it worked, but invariably the masses moved away. So, are you part of the Christian crowd or are you a disciple? Is Jesus your Lord? Does he have control of and access to everything you are and all you have? When things get tough will you leave too?
